T OFFICIAL BULLETIN

Acting upon a resolution offered at the Boston Congress, the General Board of Managers appointed Mr. H. V. A. Joslin, Dr. Moses G. Parker, and Mr. A. Howard Clark a committee to consider a method of publishing Society news of interest to the entire organization. The committee met at Worcester, Mass., on August 10, and agreed upon a plan, which has been approved by the President General, to issue from time to time as may seem expedient an Official Bulletin. This Bulletin will include information as to official action by the General officers, the Board of Managers, the Executive and other National Committees, notice of members deceased, records of new members enrolled by the Registrar General, and changes in officers and important doings of State Societies.

State Secretaries are requested to promptly communicate to the Secretary General brief abstracts of meetings or celebrations by their Societies.

BOARD MEETING.—The President General is considering the calling of a meeting of the General Managers and Executive Committee about the last of November.

INCORPORATION.—On June 9, 1906, President Roosevelt approved the Act of Congress incorporating the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. The incorporators named in the Act are the Past Presidents General and the General Officers, Executive Committee, and Presidents of State Societies at date of introduction of the Bill. Judge

Beardsley, Chairman of the Committee, will at the proper time call a meeting of the incorporators for action required by the charter. The Act provides that the property and affairs of the Society shall be managed by a Board of not more than sixty nor less than forty trustees, who shall be elected annually. The full text of the Act is printed in the Year Book for 1906.

NATIONAL YEAR BOOK.—By authority of the General Board the National Year Book for 1906 has been put in type, and the edition of 1,200 copies should be ready for distribution this month. It contains the usual lists of General and State Society Officers, the proceedings of the Boston Congress, and the records of new members registered from May 1, 1905, to April 30, 1906. The books will be divided pro rata among the State Societies.

THE BATTLE OF MONMOUTH was commemorated at Spring Lake, N. J., June 28, by about 200 members of the New Jersey Society, S. A. R., and other patriotic organizations. President General Pugsley, Historian General Wickes, President Fort, Rev. Dr. Tomlinson, and others delivered addresses.

Washington Statue.—The President General appointed Gen. J. C. Breckinridge, U. S. A., to represent this Society at the unveiling at Budapest, Hungary, on September 16, of a statue of Washington erected by Hungarian-Americans. The idea of raising this statue arose from the erection in Cleveland of a statue of Kossuth, the Hungarian patriot, who was received with distinction at Washington by the President and Congress on the occasion of his visit to the United States in 1851.

The Educational Committee (Rev. Rufus W. Clark, chairman) is preparing a circular to State Societies along the lines indicated in its report to the Boston Congress. By securing through State committees the coöperation of every State Society, the National Educational Committee will work toward the accomplishment of its outlined purposes: a. Education of Society members; b. Education of adult foreigners; c. Education of children of foreigners; d. Establishment of night schools, traveling libraries in foreign languages, and such other devices as may make for general patriotic education.

CALIFORNIA SOCIETY.—All the property, records, and accounts of the California Society were destroyed in the great earthquake and fire of April 18, but fortunately the duplicates of all the application papers are filed in the Registrar General's Office. The Society evidenced its patriotism on September 1 by following its usual custom of celebrating "Peace Day," the anniversary of the conclusion of the Treaty of Peace at Paris, September 3, 1783.

RHODE ISLAND EXCURSION.—On September 13 about 150 members of the Massachusetts and Rhode Island Societies united in a visit to Gaspee Point, Bristol Harbor, Common Fence Point, and other places about Narragansett Bay connected with events of the Revolution. Dr. Parker and Mr. Farnsworth, presidents of the respective Societies, and a joint committee executed a well-arranged program.

MICHIGAN SOCIETY.—The Historical Section of the Michigan Society was organized pursuant to a general plan and recommendation of the National Society, S. A. R., at its annual Congress at Washington, D. C. 1902. Order was taken at that Congress by the appointment of its Educational Committee for undertaking a wider dissemination throughout the country of a knowledge of the institutions of a free government as a safeguard for their preservation. Besides furnishing publications for distribution, the Educational Committee has asked of our State Societies that attention be given to the subject, at meetings held for the purpose, it being of special importance that there should be an understanding of the principles upon which our government was founded among men of influence and responsibility.

The Historical Section is composed of members of the Michigan Society appointed to read papers, those who entertain the Section, and all members of the Society who agree to be present at the meetings.

Meetings are held, as far as it is practicable, on Friday evenings, monthly, excepting during the summer months.



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number of the corporators named in the charter were present, and the meeting was organized by the election of Hon. Morris B. Beardsley as Chairman and Mr. A. Howard Clark as Secretary. Resolutions offered by Hon. Henry Stockbridge were duly seconded and adopted, accepting the charter of incorporation granted by Congress, and authorizing and directing the President and Secretary of the meeting, and of the corporation when elected, to execute and file in the office of the Secretary of State a certificate of the acceptance of the charter conformably to the provisions of section 6 of the Act.

A Constitution and By-Laws were then adopted and officers elected to serve until the next annual meeting of the corporation, to be held at the time of the Annual Congress of the National Society. The officers of the corporation elected were a President, five Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer, being the same persons as the corresponding General officers of the National Society.

The certificate of acceptance of the charter, signed by Morris B. Beardsley, A. Howard Clark, and Cornelius A. Pugsley, was filed in the office of the Secretary of State on November 23, 1906, thus perfecting the corporation.

MEETING OF GENERAL MANAGERS AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE NOVEMBER 26, 1006.

A meeting of the General Managers and the Executive Committee of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, duly called by the President General, certified by the Secretary General under the provisions of Art. V, Sec. 2 of the Constitution, was held at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, New York City, at 2 o'clock p. m., November 26, 1906. Those present were President General C. A. Pugsley, presiding; Vice-Presidents General Dr. Moses G. Parker, Hon. Henry Stockbridge, and Mr. Andrew W. Bray; Secretary General A. Howard Clark; Treasurer General I. W. Birdseye; President J. H. Moore of the District of Columbia Society; President William A. Marble, of the Empire State Society; Mr. Nelson A. McClary, Mr. Trueman G. Avery, Gen. Edwin S. Greeley, and Mr. H. V. A. Joslin, members of the Executive Committee; also Hon. Morris B. Beardsley, Chairman of the Charter Committee, Howard De Haven Ross, Chairman of the Recruiting Committee, and Vice-President L. B. Curtis of the Connecticut Society.

The minutes of the meeting of the General Managers held in Boston, May 1, 1906, were approved.

Mr. Beardsley reported for the Charter Committee that on June 9, 1906, President Roosevelt had approved the Act of Congress constitut-

ing the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution "a body corporate and politic, in the City of Washington, in the District of Columbia"; that the charter had been formally accepted by the Corporators at a meeting held in Washington, November 17; and that a certificate of acceptance of the charter had been duly filed in the office of the Secretary of State. Mr. Beardsley reported that the corporators had adopted a temporary Constitution and By-Laws and had elected officers to serve until the annual meeting of the Corporation, to be held at the time of the next annual Congress of the National Society.

After consideration of the report of Mr. Beardsley it was voted that the Committee on Revision of the Constitution and By-Laws, authorized by the Boston Congress, be requested in their work of revision to devise a practical plan for the consolidation of the Corporation and the present National Society. It was voted that Mr. Stockbridge be added to the Revision Committee.

The Chairman of the Committee on Education, in a letter to the President General, reported progress, and it was voted that it be suggested to that Committee to make arrangements through State Boards of Education for such instruction in public schools as shall teach true citizenship, and that the Committee formulate a plan for a wide distribution of the Society's tract on "A welcome to immigrants, and some good advice." through the United States Immigration Bureau.

Mr. Ross, for the Recruiting Committee, reported that letters had been received looking to the formation of new societies in Mississippi and some other States, and that interest was being aroused in North Carolina, South Carolina, and North Dakota.

Commander Moore, for the Naval Records Committee, reported that the measure recommended by the Boston Congress had been enacted into law and that the Secretary of the Navy was taking steps to bring together the Naval records of the Revolutionary War.

Mr. Joslin reported that the Publication Committee had formulated a plan for publishing National and State Society news in an Official, Bulletin, the first one having been issued under date of October 15. It is proposed to distribute the Bulletin as widely as the resources of the National Society will permit and, with the cooperation of any State Societies, it may be sent to all the individual members thereof.

After careful consideration and full discussion of invitations to hold the Congress of 1907 in Norfolk, Buffalo, and Denver, and other localities, it was decided that the next Congress should be held in the far West, and it was thereupon voted to accept the invitation of the Colorado Society and to hold the Eighteenth Congress in the City of Denver.

It was voted that \$500 be appropriated toward the expenses of the Denver Congress.

Mr. W. H. Bayly, Commander J. H. Moore, and Mr. A. Howard Clark were appointed a Committee to investigate and report to the next Congress upon the advisability, practicability, and possibility of estabdishing and maintaining in conjunction with other similar organizations in the City of Washington a central Bureau of Records, Research, and Information on the plan proposed by the Benjamin Franklin Chapter of the Ohio Society at the Boston Congress.

The resolution offered at the Boston Congress to make and establish the twenty-third of September as a day to be annually commemorated by the Navy of the United States, to be known as "Paul Jones Day," was referred to the Naval Records Committee for consideration and report.

The President General announced the death on July 19, 1906, of Walter Seth Logan, ex-President General of the National Society, and it was voted that General E. S. Greeley, Hon. Morris B. Beardsley, and Mr. William A. Marble be a Committee to report commemorative resolutions for action at the Denver Congress.

The President General also announced the death on November 12, 1906, of William Rufus Shafter, Major General U. S. Army, a member of the California Society, and it was voted that an expression of sorrow be entered on the records and communicated to the California Society.

The President General invited those present at the meeting to participate in the Annual Banquet of the Empire State Society at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel that evening.

There being no further business, the meeting then adjourned.

EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE.

The Educational Committee has received suggestions from various sources concerning the plan of work proposed in its report to the Boston Congress. The Committee issued on November 6, a circular letter requesting further suggestions in order that there may be an interchange of opinions among members, and that State organizations may have the benefit of each other's experience. The Chairman of the Committee is Rev. Rufus W. Clark, 24 Buhl Block, Detroit, Mich.

Among the suggestions and reports of work done are the following:

I think the work proposed is fundamental, and should be the first work undertaken by the Society.-Charles W. Needham, President of the George Washington University, Washington, D. C.

Educational work is worthy of the best efforts of our Society. The marking of historical sites and the preservation of documents have been

well done; there is much which is of equal importance. The condition of our country, subject as it is and will be to the influx of vast hordes of not too desirable foreigners, needs the constant care of our best people; unless we can Americanize them they will ruin us. To no set of people does the task appeal so much as to the descendants of early settlers. Patriotic societies can do no nobler work.—Morris B. Beardsley, Bridgeport, Conn.

My idea of what can be done is something like this: to have printed a namphlet embodying a brief statement of the views of the Committee: suggestions as to the study of local obligations and special meetings for the purpose. Statements also as to possible work in public schools.—W.

K. Wickes, Syracuse, N. Y.

The watchword of the Society should be "Patriotic Education," with emphasis on both words.-Dr. E. D. Gardiner, President of the Ohio

The Missouri Society is about to take up the subjects suggested by the Committee. We have published for general circulation 500 copies of an address by Rev. N. Luccock on "Revolution and Evolution." This is good educational work and has done the Society good.—Ashlev Cabell, President of the Missouri Society.

The Wisconsin Society's work is among the immigrants of 16 years of age and upwards; they who are already here and those who are to arrive need to be instructed as to the laws of and their duty to their adopted country. The roster of those who served in the Civil and Spanish wars is helping us in this work.—J. F. Pierce, President of the Wisconsin

The Michigan Society has brought the subject of instruction in our early history and the principles of American government before the authorities of our public schools in Detroit. They have the matter well in hand, and are seeing to it that the voter of the future is instructed in what is required of a citizen. It is important here, in Detroit, where not far from 70 per cent. are foreign born, or of foreign parentage.-Rufus G. Lathrop, Secretary of the Michigan Society.

WORK OF STATE SOCIETIES.

GRAVES OF THE SIGNERS .- At the Congress in Independence Hall in 1905, a resolution was discussed and referred to the Pennsylvania Society to provide for more fitly marking the grave at Chester, Pa., of John Morton, signer of the Declaration of Independence.

A committee was appointed by the Philadelphia Chapter, with Major Moses Veale as chairman, and the work accomplished is told in an illustrated pamphlet of twenty pages entitled "Graves of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence from Pennsylvania," with the following preface:

The Philadelphia Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, realizing how greatly the American people are indebted to the Signers of

the Declaration of Independence, and that every honor possible should be shown to their memories, have deemed it a very worthy and proper work to place in some permanent form the history of the graves of the Signers, where they are located, how they are marked, and what care is bestowed upon them; and, as far as possible, where the graves are not marked by some monument or tombstone, to create sufficient interest among the Sons of the American Revolution to have the graves properly marked.

The remains of James Wilson, one of the Pennsylvania Signers, brought from Edenton, North Carolina, were recently reinterred in Philadelphia with National and State honors. The ceremonies were in charge of the Governor of Pennsylvania and the James Wilson Memorial Committee. The Sons of the American Revolution were represented by a committee of the State Society.

A resolution will be introduced at the Denver Congress providing for a National Committee to carry forward in other States the work so well begun by the Philadelphia Chapter.

THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA SOCIETY held its initial meeting of the season on November 21, when Hon. Henry Stockbridge delivered an address on immigration. He urged the Society to take active steps to reach the masses of foreigners in our country, especially the aliens crowding in upon our shores, and to teach them practical lessons of patriotism and true citizenship. He urged reform in the naturalization laws. So long as it is possible in nine States that a foreigner after twenty-four hours' presence in this country can take out naturalization papers and cast his ballot, the institutions of the nation are alarmingly unsafe and insecure.

THE EMPIRE STATE Society held its seventeenth annual banquet at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, New York City, on the evening of November 26, the 123d anniversary of the evacuation of New York by the British in 1783. More than three hundred members, ladies, and other guests were present. President Marble delivered an address of welcome and presided as toastmaster. Among the speakers were President General Pugsley, Rev. J. Herman Randall, D. D., Hon. Charles E. Hughes, Governor-elect of New York, and Rev. Willard Scott, D. D.

President General Pugsley's address was as follows:

PATRIOTISM AND GOOD CITIZENSHIP.

Mr. President, Ladies, and Gentlemen: We glory, as Sons of the American Revolution, in the heroic deeds of our fathers, and we celebrate tonight one of the most important events in their struggle for independence, an event which was the consummation of their hopes, the evacuation by the British of the City of New York, the end at last of their mighty conflict for liberty.

But we do well, however, to remember, as we glory in the valor of our fathers, that-

"Those who on glorious ancestors enlarge, Produce their debt, instead of their discharge."

I do not wonder, when we dwell too much upon our ancestral lines that some one should slyly say: "When a man's talk is mainly of his ancestors you may know that the best of the family is under ground."

But we glory tonight not alone in the deeds of the patriots of '76, but in the perpetuation of those great principles and ideals of government for which our fathers battled, and which through all the years of our country's history have been maintained by the courage and the devotion

of patriotic men and women.

As I read the pages of our nation's history, of her great battlefields. I have but one sentiment, glory, eternal glory and honor for the American soldier and sailor, regular and volunteer alike, whose sublime daring from Lexington to Gettysburg and to San Juan Hill and into the Philippines means that America stands obedient to the divine behest that called her into being; means that amid all the commercialism of today the true blood of patriotism still flows; means that all the great problems now confronting us in our governmental life, whether internal or external, whether diplomatic or administrative, whether the control of gigantic corporations or the status of the Monroe Doctrine, will be solved in the interests of the people, will be solved as promptly as the importance of the problems will permit, will be solved by a wise statesmanship that has ever been ours, a patriotic statesmanship like that of James A. Garfield, who in a critical period of our nation's life stilled the tumultuous passions of men's hearts by the single sentence: "God reigns, and the Government at Washington still lives."

We may rejoice that patriotism belongs not alone to any age, but to every age, and not alone to war, but is a mighty factor in times of peace. It may lie far below the surface of our ordinary life, yet when the State or nation is imperiled, it breaks forth and sweeps before it all those influences that are detrimental or harmful to the body politic, and builds up those that are for the betterment of the State and Nation. It means a great deal for the stability of this republic if truth, honesty, duty, obligation to high ideals and lofty ambition, none of which may be measured by a monetary standard, are not lost, but still abide and inspire the people of these United States. Well did our most distinguished compatriot, Theodore Roosevelt, say: "It is of mighty small importance whether we are Republicans or Democrats, but it is of very real importance that we should be good Americans and do our duty in a straight

and decent fashion."

We are justly proud of our great State of New York; proud of our level-headed, honest Governor-elect, Charles E. Hughes, who is with us tonight; proud of her magnificent area, proud of her citizenship, proud of her educational and financial institutions,—yes, proud even of her life insurance companies. Ever has New York stood foremost in the history of the nation! Ever have her citizens been jealous of her honor among the States! Never, I believe, will they long permit her fair name to be sullied either by graft in politics, graft in commercial life, or graft in her great financial institutions. With that rugged honesty, which has been the heritage from our fathers, I believe that the people of this State and Nation, and especially the members of this great patriotic society, will stand and stand firmly for those great principles and ideals of govern-

ment that make for good American citizenship.

In the maintenance of those principles, which are as distinctly ours today as they were the early patriots', I believe that this organization, and other kindred organizations like that of the Daughters of the American Revolution, should, and do, play a most important part. These organizations are doing a magnificent work not only in building monuments, in marking battlefields, but they are instilling in the youth of this broad land principles of patriotism, and are educating our foreignborn population for good citizenship.

One of the greatest problems now confronting us is the Americanizing of the vast hordes of immigrants that are weekly landed upon our shores. I do not wonder that the wit of Ellis Island some time ago, when he saw something like 50,000 immigrants landed in New York in less than a week, said dryly: "I don't suppose they have left a soul in

Europe, except American tourists."

I believe we should gladly welcome to our shores the honest, upright sons of other lands, but we do not want the criminals, the paupers; the off-scourings of Europe. We do not want our citizenship weakened. We do not want our high ideals lowered. We do not want our American customs, our American institutions, our American Sunday disregarded. We do not want license masquerading as liberty. We want men of brawn, brain, muscle. We want men of integrity of character, high ideals, sturdy patriotism. We want the men who will become American in spirit, as well as American in citizenship. We have reason to rejoice that we have been so successful in Americanizing immigrants, and that their children go forth with ours from the public schools of the land with the Star Spangled Banner waving over their heads, singing "My Country, "Tis of Thee," Americans, every one of them.

Our fathers nursed those "household virtues," and so should we, "whereon rests the unconquerable State, and sung the cradle songs that

are the true foundations of anthems."

If this nation is to take the lead in the march of human progress, in the onward sweep of civilization along the higher plane of humanity, our boasted liberty must not degenerate into license, and we must know—

> "When to take occasion by the hand And make the bounds of freedom wider vet."

I believe that through an enduring patriotism, a patriotism born of moral courage, the people of these United States will behold with the republic's ever increasing years an ever increasing grandeur, majesty and power worthy of the men who in all its generations have stood for

the highest and best in our national life.

Behind this great organization, the Sons of the American Revolution, is a wealth of tradition. May it be so perpetuated that if the day demands it the State of Connecticut, represented here tonight by her Governor-elect and other worthy comparitots, will furnish another Nathan Hale. May it be so perpetuated that, if the day demands it, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts will furnish patriots like those that stood at Lexington, and Concord and Bunker Hill. May it be so per-

petuated, that the State of New York and the State of New Jersey will produce unnumbered heroes, while from other States and territories of this great land will come regiments and armies of fearless men of strong courage and sturdy patriotism, who will stand not alone for military prowess, but preëminent for good citizenship. And among them may there be found, if the day demands it, another Washington, another Grant, and another Lincoln.

Governor-elect Hughes, in his speech, said:

When we contemplate our ancestral stocks we are impressed with the variety of relations made possible under our democratic institutions by a wise selection of forebears. For mere pride of descent, however, I have scant respect. The distinction of ancestors is naught but humiliation for unworthy descendants.

It is our duty not simply to be ready to spring to the defense of the country; it is our duty not simply to exercise intelligently the right of suffrage; it is our duty not simply to obey the laws—it is the most paramount and patriotic duty to exhibit in simple, righteous and kindly living

the true American spirit.

There is too much vague love of country. What is needed today is love of country expressed in terms which men on the streets would understand. This would make the country's industrial life sweet and clean.

Some men would lay down their lives for their country in times of war, but in times of peace are content to promote their own benefit and to adhere only closely enough to right conduct to keep them out of jail.

We want men who will not be a menace in times of peace. We want patriots in finance and in the organization of corporations who are willing to share the burdens of their fellow-men and equalize the opportunities of society. The true American spirit makes brothers of us all.

THE HAWAHAN Society commemorated the 125th anniversary of the surrender at Yorktown, October 19, 1781, by the issuance of a circular summarizing the history of the Society and urging its members to renewed patriotic endeavor. The Society celebrated the Fourth of July, 1906, by appropriate exercises and was represented on a committee to award a prize to the teacher in the schools of the Territory who should give the best plan for a patriotic exercise.

The Illinois Society held its annual meeting at the Hamilton Club, Chicago, on December 3, the anniversary of the admission of Illinois into the Union. The Society numbers 526 members. The following officers were elected: President, Major Edgar B. Tolman, 108 La Salle St., Chicago; Vice-Presidents, Horace Kent Tenney and John Shepherd; Secretary, John D. Vandercock, 188 Madison Street; Treasurer, James H. Gilbert; Registrar, Porter B. Fitzgerald; Historian, James Edgar Brown; Chaplain, Charles Herbert Young; Sergeant-at-arms, Eames MacVeagh. There was presented to E. C. Sturges a medal of honor, awarded by the National Society for his patriotic service in the War with Spain. An oration on "Our Pilgrim Fathers" was delivered by Mr. Luther Laffin Mills.

THE MARYLAND SOCIETY ON October 19 elected the following officers: President, Hon. Henry Stockbridge; Vice-Presidents, J. Noble Stockett, Yates Sterling, Edwin Warfield, George W. Hyde, and George L. Van Bibber; Secretary, R. Fuller Shryock, 318 St. Paul Street, Baltimore; Treasurer, R. Ross Holloway; and Registrar, George W. McCreary, 300 St. Paul Street, Baltimore.

THE MICHIGAN SOCIETY Historical Section met on November 30 to discuss "The Critical Period Following the Treaty of Peace." Rev. Dr. R. W. Clark stated the conditions connected with the adoption of the preliminary treaty of 1782. The paper of the evening was by Harlow P. Davock on the difficulties attending the breaking down of local and provincial claims and prerogatives for the creating of a central government. He covered the period from 1782 to 1789. Frank D. Taylor led the discussion, dwelling upon the personnel of the time. Col. Oscar A. Janes related the part taken by the soldier and his settlement in this territory. James Cosslett Smith called to mind the compromises necessary at the time in dealing with social questions, more especially in dealing with slavery. C. M. Woodruff showed the prophetic character of the framers of the constitution. Charles Wright spoke of the problem of representation in the two houses of the legislative part of the Government. George W. Bates traced the principles of this representation to its sources; Dr. S. H. Knight pointed out the distinctions between a monarchial and representative government; and Dr. Connor showed what really had been accomplished in the substitution of a power in the place of a king, showing for the first time in the history of the world the enthronement of the principles of "religion, morality and knowledge" as set forth in the instrument of the organization of the territory of the northwest, the formation of this territory being the first act of the Government in its federal capacity.

The Paul Jones Club of Portsmouth, N. H., composed of members of the New Hampshire, Maine, and Massachusetts Societies, was organized November 1, 1896. At its annual meeting on November 2, 1906, the following officers were elected: President, William L. Hill; Vice-President, William A. Hodgdon; Secretary, George A. Wood; Treasurer, John K. Bates; Chaplain, William H. Smith; Historian, Oliver P. Remick; Auditor, Dr. William O. Junkins; Chairman of Board of Managers, Admiral Joseph Foster. A marker fund was established to provide markers for the graves of Revolutionary soldiers in the vicinity of Portsmouth. There was printed in the Portsmouth Herald of October 17, and reprinted in the Granite Monthly of November, 1906, an article

by Admiral Foster entitled "Burgoyne's Surrender—Portsmouth Revolutionary Tablets."

THE VERMONT SOCIETY held its annual meeting at Montpelier on November 21. The annual fee was increased from one dollar to two dollars, the additional revenue to be used for marking historic spots and the graves of Revolutionary heroes, and Lieutenant Governor Fisk. Hon, John A. Mead, and Mr. W. T. Dewey were appointed a committee to recommend the expenditure of this fund and were empowered to appoint a subcommittee of one in each county of the State. A committee was also appointed to urge an appropriation by the State for a monument to Col. Seth Warner, a leader of the Green Mountain Boys. The Secretary of the Society has compiled a list of 5,651 Revolutionary soldiers who lived and died in Vermont. The Society endorsed the proposal to celebrate the 300th anniversary of the discovery of Lake Champlain. Officers elected were as follows: President, William James Van Patten, Burlington: Vice-President, William E. Hawks, Bennington: Secretary, Walter H. Crockett, St. Albans; Treasurer, Clarence L. Smith, Burlington; Registrar, Henry L. Stillson, Bennington; Historian, George G. Benedict, Burlington; Chaplain, Rev. Milton L. Severance.

To Presidents of State Societies:

At a meeting of the General Board of Managers and of the National Executive Committee, held in New York City, on February 19, 1907, the Committee on Revision of the Constitution and By-Laws, consisting of Hon. Morris B. Beardsley, Mr. Nelson A. McClary, Mr. John Paul Earnest, and Hon. Henry Stockbridge, appointed by authority of the Boston Congress of 1906, submitted as its report a new Constitution and new By-Laws embodying such modifications of the present Constitution and By-Laws as seem to be desirable, and the changes necessary to conform with the Charter granted by Act of Congress approved June 9, 1906.

The Executive Committee thereupon carefully considered the proposed new Constitution and voted to recommend the same for adoption by the annual Congress of the National Society, and the Secretary General was directed to give notice of such recommendation under the provisions of Article VIII of the National Constitution.

The first session of the 18th Annual Congress will meet in Denver, Colorado, at 10 a. m., on April 30, 1907, and will adjourn, without the transaction of business, to meet in regular session in Denver, at 10 a. m., on Monday, June 3, 1907.

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CONSTITUTION OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

[Recommended by the Revision Committee and by the National Executive Committee.]

(For present Constitution and By-Laws and Charter, see National Year Book for 1906.)

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

The name of this organization shall be "The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution."

ARTICLE II.—PURPOSES AND OBJECTS.

The purposes and objects of this Society are declared to be patriotic, historical, and educational, and shall include those intended or designed to perpetuate the memory of the men who, by their services or sacrifices during the war of the American Revolution, achieved the independence of the American people; to unite and promote fellowship among their descendants; to inspire them and the community at large with a more profound reverence for the principles of the Government founded by our forefathers; to encourage historical research in relation to the American Revolution; to acquire and preserve the records of the individual services of the patriots of the war, as well as documents, relics, and landmarks; to mark the scenes of the Revolution by appropriate memorials; to celebrate the anniversaries of the prominent events of the war and of the Revolutionary period; to foster true patriotism; to maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, and to carry out the purposes expressed in the preamble of the Constitution of our country and the injunctions of Washington in his farewell address to the American people.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP.

Section I. Any man shall be eligible to membership in the Society who, being of the age of twenty-one years or over, and a citizen of good repute in the community, is the lineal descendant of an ancestor who was at all times unfailing in his loyalty to, and rendered active service in, the cause of American Independence, either as an officer, soldier,

seaman, marine, militiaman or minute man, in the armed forces of the Continental Congress, or of any one of the several Colonies or States, or as a signer of the Declaration of Independence; or as a member of a Committee of Safety or Correspondence; or as a member of any Continental, Provincial, or Colonial Congress or Legislature; or as a recognized patriot who performed actual service by overt acts of resistance to the authority of Great Britain.

Section 2. Applications for membership shall be made to any State Society, in duplicate, upon blank forms prescribed by the Board of Trustees, and shall in each case set forth the name, occupation and residence of the applicant, line of descent, and the name, residence and services of his ancestor or ancestors in the Revolution, from whom he derives eligibility.

The applicant shall make oath that the statements of his application are true, to the best of his knowledge and belief.

Upon the approval of an application by the State Society, to which it is made, one copy shall be transmitted to the Registrar General of the National Society, who shall examine further the eligibility of the applicant. If satisfied that the member is not eligible, he shall return the application for correction.

Until the State Society shall satisfy the Registrar General of the eligibility of such applicant, his name shall not be placed on the roll of membership.

Section 3. The official designation of the members of The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution shall be "Compatriots."

ARTICLE IV.-NATIONAL AND STATE SOCIETIES.

Section 1. The National Society shall embrace all the members of the State Societies of the Sons of the American Revolution now existing or which may hereafter be established under this Constitution.

Section 2. Whenever in any State or Territory in which a State Society does not exist, or in which a State Society has become inactive, or failed for two years to pay its annual dues to the National Society, fifteen or more persons duly qualified for membership in this Society may associate themselves as a State Society of the Sons of The American Revolution, and organize in accordance with this Constitution, they may be admitted by the Board of Trustees to the National Society as "The —— Society of the Sons of the American Revolution," and shall thereafter have exclusive local jurisdiction in the State or Territory or in the District in which they are organized, subject to the provisions of this Constitution, but this provision shall not be construed so as to

exclude the admisson of candidates residing in States where no Society has been organized.

Section 3. Each State Society shall judge of the qualifications of its members and of those proposed for membership, subject to the provisions of this Constitution, and shall regulate all matters pertaining to its own affairs. It shall have authority to establish local chapters within its own jurisdiction, and to endow the chapters with such power as it may deem proper, not inconsistent with the charter of the National Society or with this Constitution. It shall have authority, after due notice and impartial trial, to expel any member who, by conduct unbecoming a gentleman, shall render himself unworthy to remain a member of the Society.

Section 4. Each State Society shall submit to the Annual Congress of the National Society a report, setting forth by name the additions, transfers and deaths, and any other changes in the membership and the progress of the State Society during the preceding year, and making such suggestions as it shall deem proper for the promotion of the objects of the National Society.

Section 5. Whenever a member in good standing in his Society shall change his residence from the jurisdiction of the State Society of which he is a member to that of another, he shall be entitled, if he so elects, to a certificate of honorable dismission from his own State Society, in order that he may be transferred to the State Society to whose jurisdiction he shall have changed his residence; provided, that his membership shall continue in the former until he shall have been elected a member of the latter.

Each State Society shall, however, retain full control of the admission of members by transfer.

SECTION 6. Whenever the word "State" occurs in this Constitution, it shall be held to include within its meaning the District of Columbia and the Territories of the United States.

Section 7. A Society may be formed in any foreign country by fifteen or more persons who are eligible to membership under this Constitution, which shall bear the same relation to the National organization as the State Society, subject to the provisions of this Constitution.

ARTICLE V.—OFFICERS AND TRUSTEES.

Section 1. The General Officers of the National Society shall be a President General, five Vice-Presidents General (the order of seniority among whom shall be determined by lot at the time of their election), a Secretary General, Treasurer General, Registrar General, Historian General, and Chaplain General, who shall be elected by ballot by a vote

of a majority of the members present and entitled to vote at the annual meeting of the Congress of the National Society, and shall hold office for one year and until their successors shall be elected.

Section 2. The General Officers provided for in section 1, together with one member from each State Society, shall constitute the Board of Trustees of the National Society. Such Trustee from each of the several State Societies shall be elected annually at the Congress of the National Society, upon the nomination, or from a list of nominees, to be made by each of the State Societies and submitted to the National Society by the filing thereof with the Secretary of the National Society at least thirty days before the meeting of the Annual Congress of the National Society. And in the event that any one or more of the State Societies shall omit or neglect to make such nomination or submit said list of nominees, by the time herein required, then the President of the State Society so in default, shall, vertue officii, be chosen as and become the representatives of his State Society upon said Board.

Section 3. The Board of Trustees shall have charge of, and be charged with the care and custody of all property belonging to the National Society, and to that end shall be vested with the powers conferred by section 3 of the Act of Incorporation of the National Society: Provided, however, That it shall not have the power to sell, convey, or in any wise encumber any real estate belonging to the Society without the assent of three-fourths of the members of said Board. The Board of Trustees shall also have authority to adopt and promulgate the By-Laws of the National Society, to prescribe the duties of the General Officers, to provide the seal, to designate and make regulations for the issue of the insignia, and to transact the general business of the National Society during the intervals between the sessions of the Congress.

Meetings of the Board of Trustees may be held at the call of the President General, or in case of his absence or inability, at the call of the Senior Vice-President General, certified by the Secretary General. Meetings shall be called at the request of seven members. At such meetings seven shall constitute a quorum.

Section 4. An executive committee of seven, consisting of the President General as chairman, and six members to be nominated by him and approved by the Board of Trustees, shall, in the interim between the meetings of the Board, transact such business as may be delegated to it by a Congress of the Society or the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE VI.—DUES.

Each State Society shall pay annually to the Treasurer General, to defray the expenses of the National Society, fifty cents for each active member thereof, unless intermitted by the National Congress.

All such dues shall be paid on or before the first day of April in each year for the ensuing year, in order to secure representation in the Congress of the National Society.

ARTICLE VII.—MEETINGS AND ELECTIONS.

SECTION 1. The Annual Congress of the National Society for the election of the General Officers and for the transaction of business shall be held on the thirtieth day of April or on the first day of May in each year. The place of such meeting shall be designated by the Board of

SECTION 2. Special meetings of the Congress may be called by the President General, and shall be called by him when directed so to do by the Board of Trustees, or whenever requested in writing so to do by at least five State Societies, on giving thirty days' notice, specifying the time and place of such meeting and the business to be transacted.

Section 3. The following shall be members of all such annual or special meetings of the Congress, and shall be entitled to vote therein:

(1) All the General Officers and the ex-Presidents General of the National Society.

(2) The members of the Board of Trustees and the President or Senior Vice-President of each State Society.

(3) One delegate at large from each State Society.

(4) One delegate from every fifty members of the Society within a State and for a fraction of twenty-five or over.

Section 4. State Societies shall be represented at meetings of the National Society only by members of their own State Society, either duly elected, or who in the absence of regularly elected delegates, may be chosen by the regularly elected attending delegates of such State Society from the members of such State Society who may be present at any meeting of the National Society.

ARTICLE VIII.—AMENDMENTS.

This Constitution may be altered or amended at any meeting of the Congress of the National Society, provided that sixty days' notice of the proposed alterations or amendments, which shall first have been recommended by a State Society, or by a prior Congress, or by the Board of Trustees, or by the Executive Committee of the National Society, shall be sent by the Secretary General to the President of each State Society.

A vote of two-thirds of those present shall be necessary to their adoption.

PROPOSED BY-LAWS.

The Revision Committee also recommended that the General Board of Managers adopt the following new By-Laws in place of those now in force. By direction of the Board they are here printed for the information of State Societies. Action thereon will be taken by the Board at the Denver Congress, under the provisions of Article XVIII of the National By-Laws.

BY-LAWS OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

ARTICLE I.—ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

All nominations of General Officers shall be made from the floor, and the election shall be by ballot. A majority shall elect. The nominations may be acted upon directly or may be referred to a committee to examine and report.

ARTICLE II.—OFFICERS.

The duties of the General Officers shall be such as usually appertain to their offices, and they shall have such other duties as are hereinafter imposed or shall be delegated to them by an annual Congress or by the Board of Trustees.

They shall report at the annual meeting, and at such other times as they may be required to do so by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE III.—PRESIDENT GENERAL.

SECTION 1. The President General, in addition to his general duties, shall be ex officio chairman of the Board of Trustees, and of the Executive Committee, and a member of every other Committee.

Section 2. At each annual meeting he shall appoint the following standing committees:

Committee on Auditing and Finance,

Committee on Credentials.

Memorial Committee,

Committee on Organization,

Committee on Education.

The duties of the above committees shall be such as usually pertain to committees of like character, and such as may be defined by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE IV.—VICE-PRESIDENTS GENERAL.

Section 1. In the absence of the President General, the Senior Vice-President General present shall preside at the Annual Meeting.

Section 2. In the prolonged absence or inability to act of the President General, the executive authority shall be vested in the Vice-Presidents General in order of precedence.

ARTICLE V.—SECRETARY GENERAL.

The Secretary General, in addition to his general duties, shall have charge of the seal, and give due notice of all meetings of the National Society or Board of Trustees. He shall give due notice to all General Officers and State Societies of all votes, orders and proceedings affecting or appertaining to their duties. He shall distribute all pamphlets, circulars, rosettes and supplies, as directed by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE VI.—TREASURER GENERAL.

Section I. The Treasurer General shall collect and receive the funds and securities of the National Society. He shall deposit the same to the credit of the "Society of the Sons of the American Revolution," and shall draw them thence for the use of the National Society, as directed by it or by the Board of Trustees, upon the order of the President General, countersigned by the Secretary General. His accounts shall be audited by a committee to be appointed at the Annual Meeting.

Section 2. He shall give bond for the safe custody and application of the funds, the cost of such bond to be borne by the National Society.

ARTICLE VII.—REGISTRAR GENERAL.

The Registrar General shall keep a register of the names and dates of the election, resignation or death of all members of the several State Societies, and shall have the care and custody of all duplicate applications for membership. He shall issue upon the requisition of the Secretary or Registrar of the several State Societies certificates of membership and insignia to every member entitled thereto, through such Secretary or Registrar.

ARTICLE VIII.—HISTORIAN GENERAL.

The Historian General shall have the custody of all the historical and biographical collections of which the National Society may become possessed and shall catalogue and arrange the same, and shall place the same in a fireproof repository for preservation.

ARTICLE IX.—CHAPLAIN GENERAL.

The Chaplain General shall be a regularly ordained minister, and shall open and close all general meetings of the National Society with the services usual and proper on such occasions.

ARTICLE X.—STATE SOCIETIES.

Every State Society shall-

- (1) Notify the Secretary General of the election and appointment of all officers, nominees for Board of Trustees and delegates.
- (2) Pay to the Treasurer General on the first day of March or within thirty days thereafter, the sum of fifty cents for each active member thereof.
- (3) Transmit to the Registrar General duplicate applications of all accepted members, and notify him of the resignation or death of all members thereof.

ARTICLE XI.—BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

Section I. The Board of Trustees shall prepare and carry out plans for promoting the objects and growth of the Society; shall generally superintend its interests, and shall execute such other duties as shall be committed to it at any meeting of the National Society. It shall have charge of the printing of the Diploma and the manufacturing of the Insignia, and shall determine the price at which the same shall be issued.

Section 2. It shall have the authority to admit or reorganize as a State Society any association of fifteen or more persons duly qualified for membership in the Society.

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Section 4. It shall have authority to make, alter and amend the By-Laws as hereinafter provided.

Section 5. The President General may call meetings of the Board of Trustees at any time he may deem necessary, and shall call such meetings upon the written request of any five members thereof, provided that of any meeting, other than such as may be called during the session or immediately upon the adjournment of an annual or special Congress of the National Society, not less than five days' notice of the time and place of such meeting shall be given.

ARTICLE XII.—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

A meeting of the Executive Committee may be called at any time by the President General, and such meeting shall be called upon the written request of three members thereof. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to exercise the powers, and perform the duties committed to it by any annual or special Congress or by the Board of Trustees; to control and supervise all arrangements for the holding of the annual or any special Congress, and the social and other functions connected therewith; it shall upon the request of the proper committee of the National Society or of the Board of Trustees, assist in the organization of new State Societies, and increasing the membership of weak State Societies, and for these purposes may incur its necessary expenses, limited to such amounts as may be in the Treasury unappropriated, and not required for the current expenses of the National Society during the year.

ARTICLE XIII.—SEAL.

The seal of the Society shall be two and three-eighths of an inch in diameter, charged with the figure of a minute man, grasping a musket in his right hand, and surrounded by a constellation of thirteen stars, who shall be depicted in the habit of a husbandman of the period of the American Revolution, and as in the act of deserting the plough for the service of his country; the whole encircled by a band three-eighths of an inch wide, within which shall appear the legend, "National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, organized April 30, 1889."

ARTICLE XIV.—CERTIFICATES.

All members of this Society, wherever admitted, shall be entitled to a certificate of membership duly attested by the President General. Secretary General and Registrar General, countersigned by the President, Secretary, and Registrar of the State Society to which such member shall have been admitted.

ARTICLE XV.—INSIGNIA.

The insignia of the Society shall comprise (1) a cross surmounted by an eagle in gold, (2) a rosette.

Section I. The cross shall be of silver, with four arms, covered with white enamel and eight gold points, same size as a Chevalier's Cross of the Legion of Honor of France, with a gold medallion in the center bearing on the obverse a bust of Washington in profile, and on the reverse the figure of a minute man, surrounded by a ribbon enameled blue, with the motto "Libertas et Patria" on the obverse, and the legend "Sons of the American Revolution" on the reverse, both in letters of

gold. The cross shall be surmounted by an eagle in gold and the whole decoration suspended from a ring of gold by a ribbon of deep blue, with white and buff edges, and may be worn by any member of the Society on ceremonial occasions only, and shall be carried on the left breast, or at the collar if an officer of the National Society, or the President, active or past, of a State Society.

Section 2. The rosette shall be seven-sixteenths of an inch in diameter, of usual pattern, displaying the colors of the Society, blue, white and buff, and may be worn by all members at discretion in the upper left-hand buttonhole of the coat.

ARTICLE XVI.—INDEBTEDNESS.

No debts shall be contracted on behalf of the National Society. Every obligation for the payment of money, except checks drawn against deposits, executed in the name or on behalf of the National Society shall be null and void.

ARTICLE XVII.—ORDER OF BUSINESS OF THE ANNUAL CONGRESS.

PROCEEDINGS OF MEETING OF GENERAL MANAGERS AND EXECUTIVE COM-MITTEE, FEBRUARY 19, 1907.

A meeting of the General Managers and the Executive Committee, duly called by the President General, certified by the Secretary General, under the provisions of Article V of the Constitution, was held at the Park Avenue hotel, New York city, at 2 o'clock p. m., February 19, 1907. Those present were President General C. A. Pugsley, presiding; Vice-Presidents General Henry Stockbridge and Andrew W. Bray; Secretary General and Registrar General A. Howard Clark; President W. A. Marble of the Empire State Society; President W. J. Van Patten of the Vermont Society; Gen. Francis Henry Appleton and Mr. Trueman G. Avery of the Executive Committee; Hon. Morris B. Beardsley, representing the President of the Connecticut Society; Mr. W. W. J. Warren, representing the Treasurer General, and Mr. James de la Montanye, representing the Historian General.

The minutes of the meeting of the General Managers and the Executive Committee, held November 26, 1906, were approved as printed in Official Bulletin of December 15, 1906.

Mr. Beardsley, Chairman of the Committee on Revision of the Constitution and By-Laws, consisting of Hon. Morris B. Beardsley, Mr. Nelson A. McClary, Mr. John Paul Earnest, and Hon. Henry Stockbridge, appointed by authority of the Boston Congress of 1906, submitted as the report of that committee a new Constitution and new By-Laws embodying such modifications of the present Constitution and By-Laws as seem to be desirable, and the changes necessary to conform with the Charter granted by Act of Congress approved June 9, 1906.

The new Constitution was then carefully considered, section by section, and on motion by Mr. Beardsley, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the following new Constitution, proposed by the Revision Committee, be recommended by the Executive Committee for adoption by the National Society as a substitute for the present Constitution, and that the Secretary General be, and is hereby, instructed to give notice of such recommendation to the President of each State Society under the provisions of Art. VIII of the National Constitution for action at the next Annual Congress.

CONSTITUTION OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

The name of this organization shall be "The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution."

ARTICLE II.—PURPOSES AND OBJECTS.

The purposes and objects of this Society are declared to be patriotic, historical, and educational, and shall include those intended or designed to perpetuate the memory of the men who, by their services or sacrifices during the war of the American Revolution, achieved the independence of the American people; to unite and promote fellowship among their descendants; to inspire them and the community at large with a more profound reverence for the principles of the Government founded by our forefathers; to encourage historical research in relation to the American Revolution; to acquire and preserve the records of the individual services of the patriots of the war, as well as documents, relics, and landmarks; to mark the scenes of the Revolution by appropriate memorials; to celebrate the anniversaries of the prominent events of the war and of the Revolutionary period; to foster true patriotism; to maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, and to carry out the purposes expressed in the preamble of the Constitution of our country and the injunctions of Washington in his farewell address to the American people.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP.

Section 1. Any man shall be eligible to membership in the Society who, being of the age of twenty-one years or over, and a citizen of good repute in the community, is the lineal descendant of an ancestor who was at all times unfailing in his loyalty to, and rendered active service in, the cause of American Independence, either as an officer, soldier,

seaman, marine, militiaman or minute man, in the armed forces of the Continental Congress, or of any one of the several Colonies or States, or as a signer of the Declaration of Independence; or as a member of a Committee of Safety or Correspondence; or as a member of any Continental, Provincial, or Colonial Congress or Legislature; or as a recognized patriot who performed actual service by overt acts of resistance to the authority of Great Britain.

Section 2. Applications for membership shall be made to any State Society, in duplicate, upon blank forms prescribed by the Board of Trustees, and shall in each case set forth the name, occupation and residence of the applicant, line of descent, and the name, residence and services of his ancestor or ancestors in the Revolution, from whom he derives eligibility.

The applicant shall make oath that the statements of his application are true, to the best of his knowledge and belief.

Upon the approval of an application by the State Society, to which it is made, one copy shall be transmitted to the Registrar General of the National Society, who shall examine further the eligibility of the applicant. If satisfied that the member is not eligible, he shall return the application for correction.

Until the State Society shall satisfy the Registrar General of the eligibility of such applicant, his name shall not be placed on the roll of membership.

Section 3. The official designation of the members of The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution shall be "Compatriots."

ARTICLE IV.—NATIONAL AND STATE SOCIETIES.

Section I. The National Society shall embrace all the members of the State Societies of the Sons of the American Revolution now existing or which may hereafter be established under this Constitution.

Section 2. Whenever in any State or Territory in which a State Society does not exist, or in which a State Society has become inactive, or failed for two years to pay its annual dues to the National Society, fifteen or more persons duly qualified for membership in this Society may associate themselves as a State Society of the Sons of The American Revolution, and organize in accordance with this Constitution, they may be admitted by the Board of Trustees to the National Society as "The —— Society of the Sons of the American Revolution," and shall thereafter have exclusive local jurisdiction in the State or Territory or in the District in which they are organized, subject to the provisions of this Constitution, but this provision shall not be construed so as to

exclude the admisson of candidates residing in States where no Society has been organized.

Section 3. Each State Society shall judge of the qualifications of its members and of those proposed for membership, subject to the provisions of this Constitution, and shall regulate all matters pertaining to its own affairs. It shall have authority to establish local chapters within its own jurisdiction, and to endow the chapters with such power as it may deem proper, not inconsistent with the charter of the National Society or with this Constitution. It shall have authority, after due notice and impartial trial, to expel any member who, by conduct unbecoming a gentleman, shall render himself unworthy to remain a member of the Society.

Section 4. Each State Society shall submit to the Annual Congress of the National Society a report, setting forth by name the additions, transfers and deaths, and any other changes in the membership and the progress of the State Society during the preceding year, and making such suggestions as it shall deem proper for the promotion of the objects of the National Society.

Section 5. Whenever a member in good standing in his Society shall change his residence from the jurisdiction of the State Society of which he is a member to that of another, he shall be entitled, if he so elects, to a certificate of honorable dismission from his own State Society, in order that he may be transferred to the State Society to whose jurisdiction he shall have changed his residence; provided, that his membership shall continue in the former until he shall have been elected a member of the latter.

Each State Society shall, however, retain full control of the admission of members by transfer.

SECTION 6. Whenever the word "State" occurs in this Constitution, it shall be held to include within its meaning the District of Columbia and the Territories of the United States.

Section 7. A Society may be formed in any foreign country by fifteen or more persons who are eligible to membership under this Constitution, which shall bear the same relation to the National organization as the State Society, subject to the provisions of this Constitution.

ARTICLE V.—OFFICERS AND TRUSTEES.

President General Officers of the National Society shall be a President General, five Vice-Presidents General (the order of seniority among whom shall be determined by lot at the time of their election), a Secretary General, Treasurer General, Registrar General, Historian General, and Chaplain General, who shall be elected by ballot by a vote

of a majority of the members present and entitled to vote at the annual meeting of the Congress of the National Society, and shall hold office for one year and until their successors shall be elected.

Section 2. The General Officers provided for in section 1, together with one member from each State Society, shall constitute the Board of Trustees of the National Society. Such Trustee from each of the several State Societies shall be elected annually at the Congress of the National Society, upon the nomination, or from a list of nominees, to be made by each of the State Societies and submitted to the National Society by the filing thereof with the Secretary of the National Society at least thirty days before the meeting of the Annual Congress of the National Society. And in the event that any one or more of the State Societies shall omit or neglect to make such nomination or submit said list of nominees, by the time herein required, then the President of the State Society so in default, shall, vertue officii, be chosen as and become the representative of his State Society upon said Board.

Section 3. The Board of Trustees shall have charge of, and be charged with the care and custody of all property belonging to the National Society, and to that end shall be vested with the powers conferred by section 3 of the Act of Incorporation of the National Society: Provided, however, That it shall not have the power to sell, convey, or in any wise encumber any real estate belonging to the Society without the assent of three-fourths of the members of said Board. The Board of Trustees shall also have authority to adopt and promulgate the By-Laws of the National Society, to prescribe the duties of the General Officers, to provide the seal, to designate and make regulations for the issue of the insignia, and to transact the general business of the National Society during the intervals between the sessions of the Congress.

Meetings of the Board of Trustees may be held at the call of the President General, or in case of his absence or inability, at the call of the Senior Vice-President General, certified by the Secretary General. Meetings shall be called at the request of seven members. At such meetings seven shall constitute a quorum.

Section 4. An executive committee of seven, consisting of the President General as chairman, and six members to be nominated by him and approved by the Board of Trustees, shall, in the interim between the meetings of the Board, transact such business as may be delegated to it by a Congress of the Society or the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE VI.—DUES.

Each State Society shall pay annually to the Treasurer General, to defray the expenses of the National Society, fifty cents for each active member thereof, unless intermitted by the National Congress.

All such dues shall be paid on or before the first day of April in each year for the ensuing year, in order to secure representation in the Congress of the National Society.

ARTICLE VII.—MEETINGS AND ELECTIONS.

Section 1. The Annual Congress of the National Society for the election of the General Officers and for the transaction of business shall be held on the thirtieth day of April or on the first day of May in each year. The place of such meeting shall be designated by the Board of Trustees.

Section 2. Special meetings of the Congress may be called by the President General, and shall be called by him when directed so to do by the Board of Trustees, or whenever requested in writing so to do by at least five State Societies, on giving thirty days' notice, specifying the time and place of such meeting and the business to be transacted.

SECTION 3. The following shall be members of all such annual or special meetings of the Congress, and shall be entitled to vote therein:

- (1) All the General Officers and the ex-Presidents General of the National Society.
- (2) The members of the Board of Trustees and the President or Senior Vice-President of each State Society.
- (3) One delegate at large from each State Society.
- (4) One delegate from every fifty members of the Society within a State and for a fraction of twenty-five or over.

Section 4. State Societies shall be represented at meetings of the National Society only by members of their own State Society, either duly elected, or who in the absence of regularly elected delegates, may be chosen by the regularly elected attending delegates of such State Society from the members of such State Society who may be present at any meeting of the National Society.

ARTICLE VIII.—AMENDMENTS.

This Constitution may be altered or amended at any meeting of the Congress of the National Society, provided that sixty days' notice of the proposed alterations or amendments, which shall first have been recommended by a State Society, or by a prior Congress, or by the Board of Trustees, or by the Executive Committee of the National Society, shall be sent by the Secretary General to the President of each State Society.

A vote of two-thirds of those present shall be necessary to their adoption.

The Revision Committee also recommended that the General Board of Managers adopt the following new By-Laws as a substitute for the present By-Laws of the National Society. The proposed By-Laws were read in full, and notice thereof was ordered entered on the minutes of the Board for action at the next meeting under the provisions of Art. XVIII of the National By-Laws.

On motion, the Secretary General was directed to print the redraft of the Constitution and the By-Laws in the notice to be sent at once to State Society Presidents and in the next Official Bulletin.

SECTION 2. It shall have the authority to admit or reorganize as a State Society any association of fifteen or more persons duly qualified for membership in the Society.

Section 3. It shall have power to fill any vacancy occurring among the General Officers, and an officer so elected shall act until the following annual election and until his successor shall be elected.

Section 4. It shall have authority to make, alter and amend the By-Laws as hereinafter provided.

Section 5. The President General may call meetings of the Board of Trustees at any time he may deem necessary, and shall call such meetings upon the written request of any five members thereof, provided that of any meeting, other than such as may be called during the session or immediately upon the adjournment of an annual or special Congress of the National Society, not less than five days' notice of the time and place of such meeting shall be given.

NATIONAL SOCIETY, S. A. R. ARTICLE XII.—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

A meeting of the Executive Committee may be called at any time by the President General, and such meeting shall be called upon the written request of three members thereof. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to exercise the powers, and perform the duties committed to it by any annual or special Congress or by the Board of Trustees; to control and supervise all arrangements for the holding of the annual or any special Congress, and the social and other functions connected therewith; it shall upon the request of the proper committee of the National Society or of the Board of Trustees, assist in the organization of new State Societies, and increasing the membership of weak State Societies, and for these purposes may incur its necessary expenses, limited to such amounts as may be in the Treasury unappropriated, and not required for the current expenses of the National Society during the year.

ARTICLE XIII.—SEAL.

The seal of the Society shall be two and three-eighths of an inch in diameter, charged with the figure of a minute man, grasping a musket in his right hand, and surrounded by a constellation of thirteen stars, who shall be depicted in the habit of a husbandman of the period of the American Revolution, and as in the act of deserting the plough for the service of his country; the whole encircled by a band three-eighths of an inch wide, within which shall appear the legend, "National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, organized April 30, 1889."

ARTICLE XIV.—CERTIFICATES.

All members of this Society, wherever admitted, shall be entitled to a certificate of membership duly attested by the President General, Secretary General and Registrar General, countersigned by the President, Secretary, and Registrar of the State Society to which such member shall have been admitted.

ARTICLE XV.—INSIGNIA.

The insignia of the Society shall comprise (1) a cross surmounted by an eagle in gold, (2) a rosette.

SECTION I. The cross shall be of silver, with four arms, covered with white enamel and eight gold points, same size as a Chevalier's Cross of the Legion of Honor of France, with a gold medallion in the center bearing on the obverse a bust of Washington in profile, and on the reverse the figure of a minute man, surrounded by a ribbon enameled blue, with the motto "Libertas et Patria" on the obverse, and the legend "Sons of the American Revolution" on the reverse, both in letters of

gold. The cross shall be surmounted by an eagle in gold and the whole decoration suspended from a ring of gold by a ribbon of deep blue, with white and buff edges, and may be worn by any member of the Society on ceremonial occasions only, and shall be carried on the left breast, or at the collar if an officer of the National Society, or the President, active or past, of a State Society.

Section 2. The rosette shall be seven-sixteenths of an inch in diameter, of usual pattern, displaying the colors of the Society, blue, white and buff, and may be worn by all members at discretion in the upper left-hand buttonhole of the coat.

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No debts shall be contracted on behalf of the National Society. Every obligation for the payment of money, except checks drawn against deposits, executed in the name or on behalf of the National Society shall be null and void.

- 15. Provided, That for a special purpose the Congress may, by a vote of two-thirds of those present and voting, suspend the above order of business.

ARTICLE XVIII.—AMENDMENTS.

These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a vote of three-fourths of the members present at any meeting of the Board of Trustees, notice thereof having been given at a previous meeting.

President General Pugsley called attention to letters from the officers of the Colorado Society and from the Committee of Arrangements and Executive Committee for the Denver Congress, urgently suggesting the advisability of postponing the regular business session of the Congress from April 30 to the month of June, when weather conditions would be far more favorable.

On motion by General Appleton, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the 18th Annual Congress be called to meet in Denver, Colorado, at 10 a. m. on April 30, 1907.

On motion by Mr. Van Patten, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That it is the sense of the General Managers and Executive Committee that the opening session of the 18th Annual Congress on April 30 should adjourn without the transaction of business to meet in Denver at 10 a. m. on Monday, June 3, 1907.

On motion, duly seconded, it was voted that the Treasurer General be authorized to pay to the Colorado Society, at such time as it may desire, the appropriation of five hundred dollars (\$500), voted by the General Board on November 26, toward the expenses of the 18th Annual Congress.

The following report was received:

NAVY DEPARTMENT, WASHINGTON, February 6, 1907.

Sir: In obedience to a resolution of the Society of Sons of the American Revolution at its annual meeting in Boston, May 1, 1906, your committee on the subject of "Paul Jones Day" in the Navy, begs leave to report that a bill "To Establish Paul Jones Day in the Navy" (Senate, No. 8240) has been introduced in the Senate by Senator Burnham, of New Hampshire. The bill designates the twenty-third day of September in each year as "Paul Jones Day," on which occasion "all vessels of the Navy lying in United States ports shall dress ship."

The bill does not create a holiday, nor does it cause any expenditure of money. As it does not apply to ships in foreign ports, the commanding officers of the ships of the Navy abroad will not be required to observe the day or to ask foreign ships to participate in such observance.

Judge Stockbridge invited the Board and the Executive Committee to visit Annapolis on June 16, on the occasion of the unveiling of a tablet in memory of Thomas Johnson, the Revolutionary War Governor of Maryland.

Mr. Van Patten announced the purpose of the Vermont Society to invite the 20th Congress to meet in Vermont in 1909, the ter-centennial anniversary of the discovery of Lake Champlain.

The President General invited those attending the meeting to be his guests at the dinner of the Empire State Society that evening on the occasion of "Ladies Night."

The meeting then adjourned.

FLAG COMMITTEE.—In the case of certain liquor dealers in Omaha, charged with selling beer in bottles decorated with national colors, the United States Supreme Court, on March 4, upheld the right of a State to protect the flag, the emblem of the nation's power, against indignities, and the Nebraska law was declared to be constitutional.

PROCEEDINGS OF STATE SOCIETIES.

The Arizona Society on February 22 elected as President George D. Christy, and Secretary C. F. Leonard, of Phœnix. The Chaplain General, Julius W. Atwood, has transferred his membership to Arizona, his present residence.

THE CALIFORNIA SOCIETY has elected 20 members during the past year, its roll now numbering 420. The Treasurer reports receipts aggregating \$1,732.25 and a balance on hand of \$1,220.66.

The Colorado Society is active in preparation for the Annual Congress, which it is hoped will bring together a large attendance of enthusiastic members, particularly from the central and western States. The Society on January 16 presented a flag to the Garfield school in Denver, when patriotic addresses were delivered. The Historical Register of the Colorado Society, 1896-1906, is a handsome volume of a hundred pages.

THE CONNECTICUT SOCIETY celebrated Washington's Birthday by a banquet at Hartford, which was attended by upward of 300 members

and guests. Col. John M. Holcombe was the toastmaster. Governor R. S. Woodruff spoke on the responsibilities of the Society; Mayor Henney on immigration; Speaker Tilson of the Connecticut House of Representatives, on the General Court: President Jonathan Trumbull on the Connecticut Society of Sons of the American Revolution; Judge Simeon E. Baldwin on the judiciary and what we owe to the bench and courts during the period of the Revolution. President General Pugsley delivered an address on American statesmanship and American citizenship as illustrated by the lives of Washington and Lincoln, and emphasized the importance of Americanizing the throngs of foreigners settling in our country. More men of true patriotism are wanted in business activities. Through an enduring patriotism born of moral courage, the people of the United States will behold an ever increasing grandeur, majesty, and power with the Republic's ever increasing years, worthy of the men who in all its generations have stood for the highest and best in our national life.

The District of Columbia Society on January 16 observed "Ladies Night," when addresses were delivered by Hon. Seth Shepard and Hon. James T. Du Bois. The annual meeting was held on February 22, when William L. Marsh was elected President, John E. Fenwick Corresponding Secretary, and Albert D. Spangler Registrar. The Society has issued a register, giving the names of members and their Revolutionary ancestors, and a long list of deceased compatriots. At the monthly meeting on December 19 an address was delivered by the Hon. George Edmund Foss, Chairman of the House Committee on Naval Affairs, on the Continental Navy, in which he gave the history of naval warfare during the Revolution. About 800 vessels of all kinds were captured by American cruisers, privateers, and private armed vessels.

The Empire State Society on February 19 observed "Ladies Night." A reception was held in the parlors of the Park Avenue hotel, followed by a banquet and an address by President Edward A. Steiner, of Iowa College, Grinnell, Iowa, on "The New American and the New Problems," in which he discussed various immigrant races coming to America and the process of their assimilation into the body politic and social, relating his extensive personal experiences in studying the progress made by groups of foreigners throughout the country. The annual church service was held at the church of the Divine Paternity, in New York city, on the evening of February 24. The officiating clergyman was Rev. Frank Oliver Hall, D. D., chaplain of the Society.

At a meeting of the Newburgh Chapter on January 21 an address was delivered by its chaplain, Rev. Francis Washburn, on the Magna Charta and the principles of the Constitution of the United States.

The Buffalo Chapter, Mr. Trueman G. Avery, President, on February 20 presented to the Lafayette High School a copy of Stuart's portrait of Washington, when addresses were delivered by Mr. Hamilton Ward and others of the committee of presentation.

THE ILLINOIS SOCIETY has published a memorial address on George Rogers Clark, delivered before the Society on May 24, 1906, by Mr. Merritt Starr.

THE KANSAS SOCIETY, at its annual meeting on January 23, elected for President John M. Meade; for Secretary and Historian, D. W. Nellis, and for Registrar, J. L. Eldridge, all residents of Topeka.

THE KENTUCKY SOCIETY has elected for its President the Very Rev. Charles E. Craik, D. D., Dean of Christ Church, Louisville, and for Secretary Mr. Donald R. Jacob, corner of 4th and York streets, Louisville.

The Maine Society's annual meeting and banquet was held at Riverton on February 22. The officers elected included President, George Emory Fellows, L.L. D., of Orono, Me.; Senior Vice-President, Hon. Frederic E. Boothby, of Portland; sixteen Vice-Presidents in various parts of the State; Registrar and Secretary, Nathan Goold, of Portland. The membership now numbers 304; eleven new members were added during the year and a like number died. The retiring President, Rev. Dr. Henry S. Burrage, delivered an address on the patriotism and privations of the soldiers of the Revolution, and Rev. Dr. David N. Beach spoke of New Jersey and Vermont in the Revolution, discussing particularly the battle of Bennington and its effect on the war for independence. The Society voted to assist in the preservation of the historic Burnham Tavern at Machias, where plans were laid for the capture of the British frigate Margaretta in 1775.

The Massachusetts Society celebrated Washington's Birthday with a banquet and patriotic addresses in Faneuil Hall. The Hon. John S. Wise, of Virginia, spoke of the rights and privileges accorded the States under the Constitution and of the achievements of the United States since the nation came into existence. Vice-President General Parker urged the preservation of the Old State House in Boston. Prof. W. K. Wickes, Historian General, spoke on Washington as a Statesman and on the United North and South of today, and addresses were delivered by Gen. Francis Henry Appleton and Mr. Solon W. Stevens.

The Michigan Society on February 6 held a banquet in Detroit in celebration of the French Alliance of February 6, 1778, when addresses were delivered by President General Pugsley on "Patriotism and Good Citizenship;" by a special guest of the occasion, the Vicomte Charles de Chambrun, a descendant of Lafayette, secretary of the French embassy at Washington, who spoke of "French feelings toward America;" by Hon. E. O. Randall, of Ohio, on "The fleur de lis in the Northwest," and by Rev. Lee S. McCollester on "Lafayette."

An address was delivered by Rev. W. M. Lawrence on "Was the American Revolution justified from the standpoint of the 20th century." The Official Bulletin, issued from time to time as may seem expedient, records action by the General officers, the Board of Managers, the Executive and other National Committees, lists of members deceased and of new members, and important doings of State Societies. State Secretaries are requested to communicate to the Secretary General accounts of meetings or celebrations by their Societies. The Bulletin is sent to the General officers and Managers and the National Committees, to new members whose records are printed therein, to a number of newspapers, and a moderate supply to State Secretaries for general distribution. Additional copies will be furnished to State Societies, in any number desired, at three cents each. The next Bulletin will be issued in June, and will contain an abstract of the business of the Denver Congress.

EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL CONGRESS.

As announced in previous Bulletins and circulars, the Annual Congress will be held in Denver, Colorado, beginning June 3. A pro forma session was held in Denver on April 30, the date fixed by the Constitution, and adjourned without the transaction of business to meet at 10 A. M. June 3 at the Brown Palace Hotel.

The Legislature of Colorado, by resolution passed separately by both Senate and General Assembly, has extended a hearty welcome to the National Congress. The Denver Chamber of Commerce and other civic bodies and the Daughters of the American Revolution will aid in making the occasion a memorable one.

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As this will be the first Congress under the National Incorporation Act, approved June 9, 1906, it is hoped that all State Societies will be well represented, and that Societies in the West will send full quotas of delegates and members to Denver.

Headquarters will be at the Brown Palace Hotel, where accommodations may be obtained on the European plan at \$1.50 up, per day; other hotels on the European plan are the Savoy, \$1.50 up; the Albert and the Plaza, \$1.00 up; on the American plan, the Adams, \$3.00 to \$5.00; and the Albany, Metropole, and Shirley from \$2.75 to \$4.00 on the American plan or \$1.00 to \$2.50 on the European plan. The Denver committee, Dr. Clarkson N. Guyer, chairman, will be glad to arrange for delegates, or correspondence may be had direct with the hotels.

The Order of Business for the Congress is provided by the By-Laws. Among important matters to be acted upon is a new Constitution, announced in circular of February 26th and in Official Bulletin of March 15th. This Constitution was carefully prepared by a special committee, appointed by order of the Boston Congress, and has been drafted to accord with the terms of the National Charter. It is recommended by the National Executive Committee, as required by the present Constitution.

The corporators named in the Charter, and the General Board of Managers will hold meetings during the Congress.

PROGRAMME.—The National Executive Committee has placed the details of arrangements for the Congress in direct charge of a committee of the Colorado Society, which has, with great care, prepared an attractive programme, including the following items:

SUNDAY, JUNE 2.—At 8 P. M., special service in St. Mark's Episcopal Church, with sermon by Rev. J. H. Houghton.

Monday, June 3.—At 10 a. m. the Congress convenes at Brown Palace Hotel. The Governor of the State and others will welcome the assemblage.

After adjournment the afternoon may be devoted to automobile rides or other outdoor entertainment.

In the evening there will be a reception to members and ladies by the Daughters of the American Revolution at the Woman's Club.

TUESDAY, JUNE 4.—At 10 A. M. session of the Congress at the Brown Palace Hotel.

At 8 P. M. banquet to Delegates, with addresses by the President General and others.

Wednesday, June 5.—Mountain excursion, from Colorado Springs to Cripple Creek and return, given to the delegates by the Colorado Society. This excursion will be free to delegates, but friends and visiting members may join the party at a slight expense. This excursion will give a most excellent view of the mountains, and is planned to be a special feature of the Congress.

THURSDAY, JUNE 6.—The mayor, council, and leading citizens of Colorado Springs will entertain the delegates with a breakfast at The Antlers at 9. A. M., a reception at the City Hall at 10:30, and carriage rides to the Garden of the Gods, Manitou, and other interesting points.

All delegates and visiting members should not fail to buy their tickets through to Colorado Springs and return via the Colorado and Southern if coming via the Union Pacific or Burlington, or arrange for stop-over privileges on the return trip if coming over the Rock Island, Missouri Pacific or Santa Fe Railway.

"Few spots equal and none surpass this 'Glen of the Rockies' at the foot of Pike's Peak. It presents to the tourist more objects of scenic interest than any other similar place in the old or new world. Here are to be found soda and iron springs, and, near by, the Garden of the Gods, Cheyenne Cañon, Cave of the Winds, Grand Caverns, Green Mountain Falls, Ute Pass, Cascade Cañon, Glen Eyrie, Cheyenne Mountain, and other attractions too numerous to mention."

For those who desire to stop in Colorado Springs the following hotels

are recommended:

Antlers, European, \$1.50 per day and up. Alamo, European, \$1.00 per day and up; American, \$2.50 to \$4.00 per

Alta Vista, European, \$1.00 per day and up.

Transportation.—Every endeavor has been made to make the very best arrangements possible for the transportation of delegates and their friends to Denver. The lines east of Chicago have not authorized the customary rate of a fare and a third for the round trip. The Western Passenger Association, however, announces that summer tourist rates, effective June I, will be more satisfactory than rates on the certificate plan. This summer tourist rate is \$30.00 from Chicago to Denver, Pueblo, or Colorado Springs, Colo., and return, and \$25 from St. Louis. It is expected that all the railroads east of Chicago will also authorize round-trip rates in connection with the summer tourist rates authorized from Chicago and St. Louis, so that members and their friends should have no trouble in arranging for tickets from initial point to Denver. If these tourist tickets are not on sale by Eastern line agents before June I, the regular fare may be paid to Chicago or St. Louis, where these sum-

mer tourist tickets may be obtained. Since the Society expects to visit Colorado Springs, delegates should secure tickets through to Colorado Springs with stop-over privilege at Denver. From all points west of Chicago summer tourist rates will prevail. Summer-rate tickets are good till October.

The "Burlington Route" has agreed to run a special train, if the number will warrant it, leaving Chicago at 5 P. M. (instead of 9 A. M. as heretofore announced), Saturday, June I, and arriving at Denver, Sunday evening, June 2, at 7:30 P. M. instead of 4 P. M. This will be a standard Pullman train, with a dining car attached. There should be, at the lowest estimate, 100 in the party to assure its success, and special parties organized from Eastern points and the Middle West having special cars can attach same to the special train at Chicago. The Burlington Route advises that tickets reading via their line on the return to Chicago will be honored either via Omaha, St. Joseph, or Kansas City, so that a change of route can be arranged for. The change in time is made to better accommodate parties from the east.

Any of the Eastern line ticket agents will sell you through tickets and make your sleeping car reservations to Chicago. A berth from Chicago to Denver will cost \$6.00, a section \$12.00, and drawing-room \$21.00, and it is important that reservations for the special train be made as quickly as possible by those who will join the train at Chicago. Those who will journey in through cars to be attached to the special train will not need to write for reservations, but should advise the Secretary General, so that arrangements may be made to have these cars attached to the special. Requests for reservations should be sent to Mr. H. A. Cherrier, City Passenger Agent, Burlington Route, 220 Clarke street, Chicago, Ill., who will advise as to what space has been reserved. In writing Mr. Cherrier advise him that accommodations are wanted on the Sons of the American Revolution special train.

In case members wish to continue their trip to the Pacific Coast it would be advisable for them to purchase through tickets via Chicago and Denver for the special.

The Northern Pacific Railroad announces that Yellowstone Park will open this year on Monday, June 10, and it is possible that some may wish to extend their trip to that region, in which case the best plan would be to buy round-trip tickets to Yellowstone Park from Denver via "The Burlington's" line to Billings, and Northern Pacific to Gardiner, thence through the Park. Tickets will no doubt be on sale by the time the Congress adjourns.

Delegates from the Pacific Coast will have the advantage of the regular nine months' excursion rates.

THE NAVAL RECORDS COMMITTEE reports that the law passed through the efforts of the Committee, upon the recommendation of the Boston Congress, has resulted in bringing together in the Navy Department a large amount of material from the several Executive Departments. The Library of Congress has in press a volume containing names of captains. bondsmen, etc., of Revolutionary privateers. The printed records of the soldiers and sailors of Massachusetts and Pennsylvania each contains the names of about 6,000 sailors, and other State records, mainly in manuscript, contain many more. Revolutionary papers are deposited in the Office of Library and Naval War Records, Navy Department, under the charge of Compatriot Charles W. Stewart. The work of collecting and cataloguing authentic naval records of the Revolution has been begun and it is estimated that nearly 100,000 new names will be added to the lists of those who served affoat by the passage of the law enacted through the efforts of this Society.

Doctor Needham then discussed the question of control by the government of the organization and capitalization of great corporations, which as creatures of the State have no right to be organized except as the law gives that right, and since the law is responsible for their existence, the correction of evils therein is in the enactment of better incorporation laws.

The anniversary of the battles of Lexington and Concord was celebrated by the District of Columbia Society by holding a large patriotic gathering, to which the Continental Congress of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the general public were invited. Addresses were made by Judge John Goode, Mrs. Donald McLean, and others.

If an aristocracy is ever formed in this country, it will surely be an aristocracy of character and merit, rather than an aristocracy based upon mere wealth."

THE MICHIGAN SOCIETY celebrated April 19th by a meeting of the historical section. The subject for the evening was "The Immigration Question as Related to Public Welfare." The paper was read by Mr. E. A. Barnes, and gave the most recent information on the subject, showing the growth of the foreign population, the dangers from too rapid influx of undesirable people, and the relation of the immigrant to crime.

V ABSTRACT OF PROCEEDINGS OF DENVER CONGRESS

The Eighteenth Annual Congress was called to order in regular session at the Brown Palace Hotel, Denver, Colo., at 10 A. M., June 3, 1907, by President General C. A. Pugsley. The Rev. R. W. Clark, of Michigan, led the Congress in prayer.

The President General appointed Mr. Vandercook, of Illinois, Mr. Pierce, of Wisconsin, and Mr. Burgess, of Connecticut, a committee on credentials. The total number of members of the Congress present was 92, including the President General, the Secretary General, Vice-President General Bray, and delegates as follows: Alabama, 1; California, 2; Colorado, 6; Connecticut, 2; District of Columbia, 6; Illinois, 7; Indiana, 1; Iowa, 1; Maine, 1; Maryland, 2, and 1 substitute; Massachusetts, 5, and 19 substitutes; Michigan, 4, and 5 substitutes; Minnesota, 1; Nebraska, 2; New Jersey, 7; Empire State, 5, and 1 substitute; Ohio, 1; Pennsylvania, 1; Rhode Island, 1; South Dakota, 2; Vermont, 1; Washington, 1; Wisconsin, 3.

Addresses of welcome to Colorado were delivered by Lieutenant Governor E. R. Parker, Acting Mayor A. J. Spengel, of Denver, and Dr. William F. Slocum, President of the Colorado Society. The President General responded to the words of welcome, and reviewed the work of the Society during the year, particularly in the line of patriotic education of our foreign born population.

Col. A. S. Hubbard was introduced as one of the founders of the Sons of Revolutionary Sires in California in 1875, the basis of the present organization.

The regular order of business was then taken up.

The report of the General Board of Managers reviewed the business of the year, concluding with the action of the Executive Committee on February 19, in recommending a new Constitution and new By-Laws, proposed by the Revision Committee appointed by authority of the Boston Congress.

By unanimous consent the regular order of business was suspended and the Congress considered the final report of the special committee on the National Charter. Mr. Beardsley, chairman of the committee, announced that the Act of Incorporation had been approved by President Roosevelt on June 9, 1906. The committee submitted an engrossed copy of the charter, certified to by the Secretary of State, Compatriot Elihu Root. The report was accepted, and to the Charter Committee was voted the thanks of the National Society.

Mr. Beardsley further reported that the granting of the charter rendered necessary certain amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws.

By unanimous consent the regular order of business was further suspended to receive the report of the Revision Committee, which was read in full, and Chairman Beardsley explained in detail the reasons for the few variations from the old Constitution and By-Laws.

The Congress thereupon considered the new Constitution by articles and sections, and certain amendments were agreed to, full discussion being given to objections. The Congress then adopted the entire Constitution, but the motion was reconsidered to allow further discussion by the California delegates and others. Mr. Beardsley then moved that the report of the Revision Committee be adopted; that the entire present Constitution be repealed, and that the new Constitution as amended be adopted as a whole.

The motion was seconded, put by the President General, and carried. A recess of five minutes was then taken, during which time a meeting of the General Board was held, and the new By-Laws were duly adopted.

The Congress being called to order, Mr. Beardsley announced that the Society had adopted a Constitution not repugnant to the National Charter, and that the Board had adopted a set of By-Laws so amended as to be in accordance with it. He thereupon submitted a certificate, signed by the President General, the Secretary General, and the Chairman of the Charter Committee, setting forth these facts.

Mr. Beardsley then submitted, for adoption by the Congress, the following resolutions, preceded by a preamble, reciting the action of the Corporators in organizing under the charter, etc.:

Resolved, That each and every, the acts so made and done by the said persons named as incorporators in said act, and such other persons, if any, as they may have associated with them, be and the same are hereby affirmed, adopted, ratified, and approved by this Congress, to have the same effect as if the same had been made and done by this Congress, or by and in pursuance of its sanction and authority previously given.

Resolved, That the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, as the same has heretofore existed, hereby accepts, ratifies and adopts the charter granted by an Act of Congress, approved June 9, 1906, as and for the charter of this Society, to the end that this Society may be merged in, and be and become the body politic and corporate created by the said act.

On motion, duly seconded, the preamble and resolutions above cited were unanimously adopted, and the entire organization was declared to

be an incorporated Society under the provisions of the Act of Congress of June 9, 1906.

The amendments to the Constitution as printed in the Official Bulletin are: (1) The modification of Art. IV, Sec. 2, so that applicants may continue, as heretofore, to join any State Society they desire; (2) Art. VII, Sec. 4, was made effective after the adjournment of the Denver Congress, and (3) Art. IX was added: "This Constitution shall take effect upon its adoption."

The Constitution now in force omits the words "civil officer" as a basis for eligibility. By Art. III, Sec. 2, names shall not be placed on the roll of membership of State Societies until the application papers have been approved by the Registrar General. The General Board of Managers has become the Board of Trustees, elected by the Congress. State Societies are hereafter to be represented in the Congress only by members of their own State Society.

The Congress then, at I o'clock P. M., adjourned for the day, and reconvened at 9 A. M., Tuesday, June 4. The first business in order was the reports of the General Officers.

The Secretary General read, in abstract, his annual report, reviewing the doings of the National Committees and of the State Societies, which have been set forth from time to time in the Official Bulletin.

The Registrar General reported that the number of new members registered during the year was 709, the largest numbers being 120 in the Empire State Society; Massachusetts, 86; Ohio, 49; Connecticut, 46; Illinois, 38; Hawaii, 26. The total active membership is 11,118, and the total enrolment since 1889 has been 18,192. The Massachusetts Society ranks first with 1,557 active members; Empire State second, 1,276; Connecticut third, 971; District of Columbia fourth, 538; Illinois fifth, 529. From the sale of badges, rosettes, and ribbon the Society received a commission aggregating \$332. Five medals were awarded for patriotic service in the war with Spain, making a total of 647 since 1899. Three hundred and eighty-three certificates of membership were engrossed.

In commenting on the Registrar General's report Commander Moore urged that since one of the chief objects of the Annual Congress is to come together and get a little more enthusiasm, the delegates should this year go back to their State Societies and try to increase the roll by at least a thousand new members. Mr. McClary urged the organization of Societies in North and South Carolina, Georgia, Mississippi, North Dakota, Wyoming, Idaho, and in the territories not now represented in the National Society.

In the absence of the Treasurer General in Europe, by reason of ill-

health, his report was read by Mr. Beardsley. The report showed a cash balance on April 27, 1906, of \$6,997.99; receipts during the year, \$6,517.62; total receipts, \$13,515.61. The disbursements aggregated \$4.016.36, and the balance of cash on hand, May 24, 1907, was \$9,499.25.

On motion by Commander Moore, seconded by Colonel Lyman and Colonel Armes, of the District of Columbia, a resolution, recommended by the Naval Records Committee and approved by the General Board of Managers, was adopted favoring the passage of a law establishing a Record and Pension Office in the Navy Department, where the Naval records of the United States may be permanently preserved, carded, and indexed

Rev. R. W. Clark, chairman of the Educational Committee, reported in detail on work done in the distribution of three publications: (1) A Welcome to Immigrants, (2) Patriotic Education, Historical Topics for Discussion by State Societies, and (3) Public School Tests, a Program for the Use of Schools. Extracts from letters of State Societies were read, showing the needs of various communities. Sub-committees working in coöperation with the National Committee have been appointed by several State Societies.

The remarks, on the educational report, by Mr. Hubbell, of New Jersey; Admiral Baird, of the District of Columbia; Major Tolman, of Illinois; Mr. Marble, of New York; Colonel Penny, of Pennsylvania; Mr. Webster, of Nebraska; Mr. Hersey, of Colorado; Mr. Dewey, of Vermont; Colonel Lauman, of Illinois, and Major Tebbetts, of Alabama, showed a widespread interest in the work of the Educational Committee in promoting patriotic advancement and education.

The following resolutions, recommended by the Committee, were unanimously adopted:

1. Resolved, That the National Educational Committee be instructed to prepare programs of topics relating to American history, citizenship, and the general welfare of the country, for consideration by State Societies at their regular meetings.

2. Resolved, That the officers of the State Societies are requested to ascertain what public school instruction is given in American History, the form of government and the spirit of the laws of the United States, in order that—

(a) such instruction be introduced if now neglected and (b) if done imperfectly that it may be improved upon.

3. Resolved, That it is recommended that State Societies arrange for public lecture courses on the constitutional system and principles of the American Government, to be delivered in the public schools in the interest, primarily, of the adult foreign born population, to give them a proper conception of our institutions and form of government.

4. Resolved, That it be recommended to the State Societies to provide for the reading of papers on the Federal Constitution, or on laws of

the several States, the inter-relations of the Federal and State governments, and the several constitutional guarantees of individual liberty, for consideration at local meetings of the Society.

A report was received from Mr. W. V. Cox, chairman of the Committee on National Parks, reviewing the work of the State Societies in the preservation of historic spots and in the erection of memorials of events of the Revolution.

On the recommendation of the Committee a resolution was adopted, approving bills introduced by Senator Lodge in the U. S. Senate, and by Representative Bradley in the House, authorizing the appointment of a Commission on Revolutionary National Parks; and a resolution commending the work of the various State Societies in preserving and marking the battle-fields of the War for Independence, and specially commending the efforts of the Empire State Society of the Sons of the American Revolution and the American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society to establish a National Park in the Highlands of the Hudson in commemoration of the Revolution.

From Mr. Joslin, chairman of the Publication Committee, was received a report setting forth the establishment of the Official Bulletin as a means of disseminating Society news and recommending that the plan be made permanent. The first Bulletin was distributed under date of October 15, the next December 15, and others March 15 and May 15, aggregating 103 pages of matter pertaining to the work of the Society and recording new members added to the roll. The size of the Bulletin and the number of copies that might be issued is limited only by the funds available. The regular edition has been one thousand copies, and several hundred additional copies have been printed for distribution by those State Societies that subscribe for the Bulletin at three cents per copy.

Commander Moore presented a report from the Naval Records Committee, stating that a law had been enacted in the form recommended by the Boston Congress for bringing together in Navy Department the Naval records of the Revolution. He reported that much material had already been gathered, and estimated that nearly 100,000 new names will be added, by the passage of this law, to the lists of those who served afloat during the War of the Revolution.

A committee, appointed by the Board, consisting of Gen. Edwin S. Greeley, Mr. Morris B. Beardsley, and Mr. W. A. Marble, presented a tribute to the memory of Hon. Walter Seth Logan, ex-President General, who died July 19, 1906, and after remarks by Mr. Beardsley and Mr. Marble, the tribute was adopted by a rising vote.

Major Tolman, in behalf of the Illinois Society, presented a resolu-

tion, which was discussed and referred to the Board of Trustees, recommending the publication and distribution by the Government of the rolls of all soldiers and sailors who have served in the Army or Navy of the United States during any war in which this country has been engaged.

Mr. Trueman G. Avery, President of the Buffalo Chapter of the Empire State Society, extended an earnest invitation to hold the Congress of 1908 in Buffalo, and a letter was received from the Bureau of Publicity of Niagara Falls, inviting the Congress to meet at that

Mr. Shryock presented a communication from the Maryland Society, inviting the next Congress to meet in Baltimore.

Mr. Dewey, in behalf of the Vermont Society, invited the Congress of 1000 to meet in that State.

The Washington Society, through its President, Judge Hanford, invited the 1909 Congress to meet in Seattle on the occasion of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition.

Major Tebbetts, President of the Alabama Society, invited the Congress to meet in Mobile in 1911, the two hundredth anniversary of the founding of that city.

Colonel Hubbard extended an invitation from San Francisco for some future Congress.

These several invitations were, under the rules, referred to the Board of Trustees for action.

The Congress next proceeded to the election of General Officers, resulting as follows:

ABSTRACT OF PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

The Board of Trustees met at 3 o'clock P. M., June 4, President General McClary presiding.

The President General nominated the following to comprise the Executive Committee, and they were approved by the Board:

The President General, chairman ex officio; Gen. Francis Henry Appleton, Boston, Mass.; Hon. Morris B. Beardsley, Bridgeport, Conn.; Judge Henry Stockbridge, Baltimore, Md.; Commander J. H. Moore, U. S. N., Washington, D. C.; Col. George C. Batcheller, New York, N. Y.; Mr. Theodore H. Eaton, Detroit, Mich.

The resolution adopted by the Congress recommending the establishment of a Record and Pension Office in the Navy Department, was referred to the special committee on Naval Records for action.

A resolution from the Illinois Society, calling for the publication and distribution by the Government of the rolls of soldiers and sailors who have served in the army or navy of the United States in any of the wars in which the United States has engaged, which was referred to the Board by the Congress, was considered and referred to the Executive Committee.

Invitations for the Congress of 1908 were considered, and it was unanimously voted that the Nineteenth Annual Congress convene at Buffalo, New York, on April 30, 1908.

The Board discussed methods for largely increasing the membership, and the Executive Committee was requested to formulate and carry into effect such plans as should appear the most effective to this end.

It was voted that to the Executive Committee be delegated power to act on such matters referred to the Board by Congress or such new business as in the judgment of the President General may not require the action of a meeting of the Board of Trustees.

ANNUAL BANQUET

The banquet at the Savoy Hotel, on the evening of June 4, given by the Colorado Society, was presided over by Mr. Howard T. Vaille as toastmaster. Addresses were delivered by Mr. Henry J. Hersey, Dr. William F. Slocum, Governor Henry A. Buchtel, of Colorado; the retiring President General, Mr. Pugsley; President General McClary, Mr. Joseph F. Tuttle, Jr., of Denver; Mr. Daniel M. Lord, of Chicago; Mr. W. E. Sweet, President of the Sons of the Revolution in Colorado;

Major William Frye Tebbetts, of Alabama; Colonel George A. Armes. U. S. A., of the District of Columbia, and Col. Charles A. Williams. U. S. A. An address by Dr. Moses Greely Parker, who was unable to be present, was read by Mr. Pettingill, of Colorado Springs.

In the course of his address Mr. McClary said:

"The thought occurred to me that I would like to say a word or two on 'looking forward.' Perhaps as a Society we have been given a little too much to looking backward. Still it is but natural. The primary reason we organized for was to look backward in history

"With our new charter we should begin a somewhat new era, and I have noted that spirit in this Congress * * * Nearly all the speeches that have been made today in this Congress have been with reference to the future. * * * It is proper tonight to look forward, and, taking our new charter as a beginning, to consider what we can do to broaden

the influence of this great Society in the United States.

"The need of today, I believe, if it could be expressed in two or three words, would be of sane men, sober-minded men. * * At a time when labor unions seek in some cases to dominate politics, to dominate labor, to reduce everything to a dull, dead level; at a time when some corporations do not realize that they are public servants; at a time when some politicians find the greatest of powers in the setting of class against class; * * * at a time when to be thrifty and acquire a competance is a disgrace; at such a time we need sane men. Where can we better look for that kind of sanity than to an organization of this kind. Purely American, our oldest and our best stock.

"And that brings me to the practical question. In order to exercise the influence which is our due in this country we must increase our membership many fold. One man can do something; many can do considerable individually; but to really accomplish things in a great country containing many millions of people, we require a careful, complete, and large organization. We have everything but the last. I therefore will end my remarks by appealing to all present to seek to largely increase the membership of our State Societies. It would more than double our

"The Board of Trustees, this afternoon, considered methods by which they could assist the State Societies in this campaign for more members. We need not fear for lack of principles, because they are already formulated, and we are already moving along those lines, but we certainly should greatly increase our numbers and strengthen our organization, and thereby greatly increase the number of sane men working along similar lines to correct, guide, to make, and to lead public opinion."

Mr. Tuttle, in his address, reviewed the history of Colorado from the time of Coronado's march in his quest of the Seven Cities in 1541, when he probably visited the present site of Denver. He rehearsed the story of Marcus Whitman's ride from the far Northwest through the Colorado country to Washington City in 1843 to save Oregon for the United States, and pictured the wonderful development of our Nation in the great West.

CHURCH SERVICE, RECEPTIONS, ETC.

NATIONAL SOCIETY, S. A. R.

On Sunday, June 2, at 8 P. M., special services were held at St. Mark's Church, with sermon by the Chaplain of the Colorado Society, Rev. I. H. Houghton. The service was attended by many of the delegates who had arrived in Denver that evening.

On Monday evening at the Woman's Club there was a reception to delegates and ladies, given by the Daughters of the American Revolu-

Wednesday morning, June 4, members of the Congress left Denver as the guests of the Colorado Society on a trip to Colorado Springs, and proceeded by special train to Cripple Creek, where they were received by the Mayor. A meeting was held in the City Hall, where brief addresses were made by the Mayor, by Mr. McClary, and Mr. Pugsley, and a golden key to the city was presented to the Society.

Wednesday night was spent at Colorado Springs. Thursday morning the delegates were the guests of Gen. William J. Palmer at a breakfast at the Antlers Hotel, after which they were formally received at the City Hall by Mayor Heizer, President Fertig, of the City Council, and other officials. To each delegate was presented one of the medals struck in commemoration of the Pike Centennial. Carriages were then taken for a ride through Palmer Park, the Garden of the Gods, and Manitou.

In the afternoon a reception in honor of the delegates was given at her home by Mrs. Elizabeth Cass Goddard, granddaughter of General Cass, and Regent of the Zebulon Pike Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, assisted by the State Regent and others. A reception was also given by President and Mrs. W. F. Slocum at their home at Colorado College.

THE TRAVELING BANNER

The Board of Managers of the Colorado Society, on June 19, adopted the following resolution, which has been approved by a majority of the National Executive Committee, as an incentive to recruiting work:

Resolved, That the Colorado Society offer as a prize to the National Society a banner, to be known as the "traveling banner," to be awarded to any State organization of the Sons of the American Revolution having a membership of one hundred or more, for the largest percentage of increase in numbers during the year preceding, said banner to be assigned annually to such State Society at the annual meeting of the National Congress.

The banner will be made ready in time for the next Congress at Buffalo, 1908.

Doings of State Societies

THE MICHIGAN SOCIETY has issued a list of committees for 1907–1908, defining the duties of each committee, and a calendar of the Historical Section with the following program of topics:

The Minnesota Society has issued a souvenir pamphlet of the celebration of the 175th anniversary of Washington's Birthday by that Society at Peoples Church, St. Paul, including patriotic addresses by President John Day Smith, and Most Rev. John Ireland.

The New Jersey Society took a prominent part in the Orange Centennial Celebration on June 14, the principal event of the day being the unveiling in the Colonial cemetery at East Orange of a statue of "The Dispatch Rider." The State Society and the Orange Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, escorted by the "Old Guard" of New York, marched at the head of the civilian column in the parade, under command of Justice J. Franklin Fort. Compatriot David L. Pierson, who conceived the idea of the celebration and the statue, made an address at the unveiling, in which he said, in part:

"In the dawn of this newer patriotism, coming from the clear constellation of noble souls that have graced the pages of our American history, out of the mystic past, there has come this beautiful figure, the Dispatch Rider of the American Revolution, conceived in the great crucial days of our Revolutionary War and designed by the cunning hand of the man of Concord, Frank Edwin Elwell, the sculptor. In the strong spiritual lines of this young man who did such heroic work in carrying messages from army to army, and in sounding the alarm which called the minute men to duty and warned the women and children of the advance of mercenaries employed by the British, we see the highest type of American manhood; his manly brow, his clear-cut eye, his sharp, strong chin, and withal, the pathos depicted in his countenance, telling us that there is in our great American republic a type of citizenship that is willing to sacrifice for American principles."

Frank Edwin Elwell, the sculptor, in his address, said:

"The greatest tribute that we can pay to our ancestors is not in bronze or stone, but in emulating that stalwart and splendid honesty which was the sure foundation of this great nation, and has been its bulwark and its strength."

There were also addresses by Mrs. Donald McLean and John Temple Graves.

Under the auspices of the New Jersey Society a memorial tablet marking the site of the Monmouth Courthouse, used as a hospital in the battle of Monmouth, on June 28, 1778, was unveiled on July 4th. The bronze tablet depicts in bas-relief the original courthouse. The stone was taken from Washington's headquarters at Rocky Hill. The tablet was designed by James E. Kelly, of New York. Colonel C. J. Wright, proprietor of the New Jersey Military Academy, made the address of the day. Samuel C. Cowart, in behalf of the Monmouth Battle Monument Commission, made the presentation speech, and Halstead H. Wainright, counsel for the Board of Freeholders, accepted the marker in another historical address. Orchestral music was provided, and Vredenburgh Rifles, Company G, N. G. N. J., fired a military salute. Rev. Arthur W. Remington, pastor of the Freehold Presbyterian Church, made the invocation and prayer.

The address of Col. J. R. Mullikin, Secretary of the New Jersey Society, is changed from 58 Spruce Street to 312 Belleville Avenue, Newark.

THE RHODE ISLAND SOCIETY on May 30 held patriotic exercises at Hopkins Park, Providence, assisted by 200 school children of foreign parentage, who, grouped before the statue of Admiral Esek Hopkins, renewed pledges of patriotic allegiance to the Stars and Stripes. The program opened with an address by President George F. Weston, of the Rhode Island Society, who said that this was one of the annual visits paid to such spots in order that one of the principal anniversaries of the nation might be fittingly observed. He then went on to show that the strength of a nation lay in the strength of its people, and described how in a few minutes' time one of the best armies ever raised was assembled at Lexington and Concord. A volunteer army of today would be as eager to respond to the call of patriotic duty as was ever that of the 18th century, he believed. Mr. Weston closed with a reference to Gen. Grant's famous observation that some of the nation's greatest victories were achieved in times of peace, citing the Geneva arbitration as an example.

After prayer by Chaplain Webb, a recitation on What Constitutes a State, was given by Emilio J. Rocchio, one of the school children, which was followed by an original essay on Esek Hopkins and His First Naval Victory, by Miss Retha Izora Hermann, also a public school pupil.

Miss Hermann's essay was then given in Italian by James Ricco, a

pupil of the Classical high school. He interpreted clearly and concisely the language of the address for the hundreds of his countrymen gathered about the statue, making it possible for all to participate understandingly in the exercises.

Following the singing of "Memorial Day" by the school came the ceremony of formally decorating the spot with the flag, followed by the flag salute, in which a child of Italian parentage, bearing a small flag, recited in perfect English a bit of verses by George T. Packhard,

The response was by the pupils of the school. With one accord they raised the flags with which each had been equipped and, waving them enthusiastically, answered in concert:

"I pledge allegiance to my flag and to the republic for which it stands; one nation, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

With bared heads, all present who understood the language, then sang "The Star Spangled Banner."

Mayor P. J. McCarthy was introduced as the orator of the occasion. He began by thanking the Sons of the American Revolution for inviting him to be present and to speak at the foot of a monument to one who had been a foremost figure in the war for the achievement of independence.

"We are assembled here on Memorial Day to honor the memory and life work of men who served the country in times of war, who made patriotic sacrifices for the welfare of the nation, to the end that all our people might enjoy life, liberty, and happiness. Memorial Day was ordained as a national holiday, dedicated to the observance of patriotic ceremonies in commemoration of the services of deceased soldiers and sailors who served the country on land and sea in times of danger. The good works of men live after them, and we are assembled to sing the praises of our dead, who have earned the gratitude of past, present and all future generations of Americans. Commodore Hopkins served us during the Revolution and in recognition of that service, more than 100 years later, we are assembled at his monument to honor him.

"I am pleased to notice the school children here, led by their teachers, and instructed in the lessons suggested by the day and what it signifies—each scholar bearing a flag. An address in the Italian language has been delivered on the history of Commodore Hopkins. This suggests the thought that our citizenship represents all races, all blended together in one title, the highest civic honor man can attain, that of American citizenship, which means a citizen of a free country, whose flag represents freedom, equality, government of, for, and by the people, for which we should first thank God and then thank the soldiers and sailors who served the country from first to last.

"I wish to impress upon the school children that the American flag means much to the oppressed of all nations—equality. To fully appreciate the blessings to mankind which it signifies we must read the history of the United States and the lives of its warriors and statesmen.

"For my own part, I was born in the Emerald Isle, came here an

infant, found friends, support, education, and equal opportunity. For myself and my race I thank God and the Revolutionary fathers and the noble men who gave their lives to establish this republic, and for the divine blessing this country has been to us. I am modestly proud of the part my race has taken in the struggle for American independence. In the abolition of slavery and the establishment of our United States as a nation, they did their part side by side with other races, all equally zealous for our common good. My race ever was and ever will be true to the Stars and Stripes, and I know that if ever the flag is in danger from within or without, men of my race will be found on the firing line in its defence.

"Let us, therefore, thank God for the national blessings we enjoy, and spend the day in prayerful remembrance of the good deeds of our

PROCEEDINGS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, OCTOBER 1, 1907.

A meeting of the National Executive Committee, duly called by the President General, was held at the Hotel Knickerbocker, New York City, at 3 o'clock p. m., October 1, 1907. Present: President General McClary, presiding; Gen. Francis Henry Appleton, Judge Henry Stockbridge, Commander John H. Moore, U. S. N., and Col. George C. Batcheller, members of the Committee, also ex-President General Pugsley, William Allen Marble, President of the Empire State Society; Maj. William Frye Tebbetts, President of the Alabama Society, and chairman of the Committee on Organization, and Secretary General A. Howard Clark.

The President General announced the acceptance by him in behalf of the Executive Committee, after correspondence with each member of the Committee, of an indemnity bond of \$10,000 for the Treasurer General, and of a "travelling banner," offered by the Colorado Society. The Executive Committee formally approved such action.

It was voted that Vice-President General Trueman G. Avery, Mr. W. A. Marble, and Col. Geo. C. Batcheller be a Committee on Arrangements to have charge of the Buffalo Congress, under the provisions of Art. XII of the By-Laws, with power to appoint local committees as may seem desirable, and that five hundred dollars (\$500) be appropriated by the National Society toward the expenses of the Buffalo Congress, to be placed to the credit of the Committee of Arrangements.

Commander Moore announced the death on September 22 of Vice-President General William Hamilton Bayly, and presented a tribute to his memory, which was adopted. An engrossed copy was ordered to be sent to the family.

To the Memory of William Hamilton Bayly.

The Executive Committee of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution with sadness records the death at Washington, on September 22, 1907, of William Hamilton Bayly, Vice-President General, elected at the Denver Congress, June 4, 1907.

Mr. Bayly became a member of the District of Columbia Society in 1891, and was its President in 1905. His patriotic work was earnest and practical. His great aim, for many years, was to preserve and classify the records of individual service of the many thousands of soldiers of the Revolution in the archives of the U. S. Bureau of Pensions, of which he was chief clerk for many years,

He was a quiet, unassuming man, of sturdy character, sound legal training, and an exceptional example of good American citizenship.

His compatriots in this Society have lost a valued friend and counsellor.

Commander Moore reported progress with reference to the Illinois resolution favoring the publication by the Government of the rolls of soldiers of the Revolution.

Upon the recommendation of Major Tebbetts, Chairman of the Committee on Organization, it was voted that not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500) be appropriated, under the provisions of Art. XII of the By-Laws, for the necessary expenses of the Committee on Organization in forming new State Societies and strengthening weak Societies, to be expended in carrying out plans approved by the President General.

Upon motion by Judge Stockbridge it was voted that a letter be issued in the name of the Executive Committee to each State Society, urging the need of extending the influence of the organization by largely increasing the membership.

It was voted that a recruiting circular be prepared, under the direction of Commander Moore, for distribution to such State Societies as will agree to send it to each of its members, to be issued in the name of the Executive Committee.

It was voted that the Secretary General communicate with the Secretary of each State Society concerning a plan to increase the circulation of the Official Bulletin. To each Society that will undertake to distribute one issue of the Bulletin to each of its members a supply will be furnished free, provided the State will agree to subscribe for the three other issues of the year at cost of printing.

After a full discussion of the great need of distributing information to immigrants in the form of a suitable leaflet, the Executive Committee approved a form submitted by Judge Stockbridge and Commander Moore, subject to such changes as may be necessary after conference with officials of the Government Departments.

Upon motion by Judge Stockbridge, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to consist of Commander John H. Moore, U. S. N., Col. Chas. Lyman, and Mr. A. Howard Clark to enter into and perfect with the several Departments of the Government, an arrangement whereby the leaflet on "The United States," approved by this committee, shall be distributed among all immigrants who can read, through the U. S. Immigration Bureau at the various ports of entry; or, if it shall be found practicable, at the ports of embarkation.

Resolved, That said Committee be further authorized to cause the same to be translated into the principal languages spoken by the immi-

grants, and when so translated to have electrotype plates made of the same, such plates to remain the property of the Society, and that said Committee be further authorized to cause to be printed editions in such languages, of such size, as upon conference with the Bureau of Immigration shall be sufficient to ensure a copy of the same, in his native tongue, being placed in the hand of every incoming immigrant who can read.

Resolved. That when the leaflet for the information of Immigrants shall have been approved by the Departments of the Government, that it be first printed in the English language, and that the Secretary General send to each State Society 25 copies thereof, accompanied by a request that the State Societies shall confer with the Boards of Education in their respective States, with the view through the co-operation of the Educational Boards of distributing the same to the children of foreign born parents who are already residing among us; and that such State Societies be requested after such conference to report whether they can so make use of the same and in what languages.

Resolved, That for the purpose of carrying the foregoing resolutions into effect, a sum not to exceed thirty-five hundred dollars (\$3,500) be and is hereby appropriated to be paid out of any funds of the Society not otherwise appropriated.

There being no further business, the Committee then, at 6.30 o'clock, adjourned.

Subscriptions are being received for the erection of a Bay in the "Cloister of Colonies" for the Washington Memorial Chapel at Valley Forge.

THE RHODE ISLAND SOCIETY on Monday, July 29, dedicated a shaft and tablet to mark the spot near Rochambeau Avenue, Providence, where "The French Troops, commanded by Count Rochambeau, were encamped in 1781, on their march from Newport to Yorktown, and in 1782 on their march from Yorktown to Boston, where they embarked for France."

The shaft, 6 feet high and 3 feet wide, was erected by the Rhode Island Society, and the tablet, 40 by 20 inches, was furnished by the State of Rhode Island. The dedication program included addresses by President W. H. Munro, of the Rhode Island Historical Society; President G. F. Weston, of the Rhode Island Society S. A. R., and Hon. Charles Warren Lippitt, ex-Governor of Rhode Island and Vice-President of the Rhode Island Society S. A. R. There was also an address by John P. Farnsworth, ex-President of the Rhode Island Society S. A. R.

The Rhode Island Society, together with five other historical and patriotic societies, have organized the General Greene Memorial Association of Rhode Island, to procure a memorial for the late Gen. Nathanael Greene. It is planned to raise \$100,000 for this purpose. The Sons of the American Revolution are represented by John Edward Studley, Henry Van Amburgh Joslin, Arthur Wellington Dennis, William Chace Green, and George Franklin Weston. Ex-Gov. Charles Warren Lippitt is President of the Association, and Mr. H. V. A. Joslin is Secretary.

THE UNITED STATES: INFORMATION FOR IMMIGRANTS.

At a meeting of the National Executive Committee held in New York October I the leaflet prepared by Judge Stockbridge on Information for Immigrants was approved. Since then the leaflet has been approved and adopted by the U. S. Department of Commerce and Labor, which has had it translated into Yiddish, Italian, Hungarian, and Polish. A small edition of 15,000 copies was printed in English for the use of the different State Societies, so as to inform our members of the nature of the work. It has been set up in type in the four languages mentioned, and as soon as the proof has been corrected, it will be printed. A contract has been made for the printing of one million copies, 400,000 of them in Italian and 200,000 in each of the three other languages. These copies will be distributed by our State Societies to the aliens now in this country. The Department of Commerce and Labor will publish from a set of electrotypes furnished by our Society an edition of its own, which will be distributed to the incoming immigrants. It is planned in the near future to distribute the leaflet to the immigrant as he arrives aboard ship. It is also planned to publish it in other languages, so as to be able to reach the vast majority of those arriving in our country.

Fifty copies of the leaflet in English have been sent to the Secretary of each State Society, advising them to consider means of distributing the circular in various languages among aliens in their region, and particularly to members of societies or associations of foreigners.

The special committee on printing and distribution desires a wide circulation of the leaflet in this country, and requests that information be sent to the Secretary General as to the number of copies that can be successfully placed in the various cities.

One thousand copies of the leaflet in English have been sent to Chicago, where they are being used as a reader among the adult foreign pupils of the night schools. A request has been received from Omaha for 3,000 copies in nine different languages for distribution in the night schools of that city.

RECRUITING CIRCULARS.

Twelve thousand copies of a circular letter, signed by the President General, under date of November I, have been sent to State Secretaries for distribution to members. The letter calls on members to use every possible effort to increase the efficiency of the Society's patriotic work by securing recruits. A similar letter has been addressed to each State Society, by order of the Executive Committee, suggesting 'practical means of increasing the Society's growth.

Additions to Membership.

Two hundred and forty-nine new members have been enrolled by the Registrar General as follows from June I to December I, 1907: New York, 40; Massachusetts, 38; Illinois, 23; Ohio, 21; New Jersey, 11; Connecticut, 10; District of Columbia, 9; Minnesota, 9; Pennsylvania, 9; Iowa, 9; Indiana, 8; Washington, 7; Hawaii, 7; Colorado, 7; New Hampshire, 5; Maine, 5; Maryland, 5; Vermont, 5; Kansas, 4; Rhode Island, 4; Utah, 3; Arizona, 2; Nebraska, 2; Missouri, 2; Wisconsin, I; Montana, I; Texas, I, and Oklahoma, I.

NATIONAL YEAR BOOK FOR 1907.

The National Year Book has been published in an edition of 1,500 copies, and by order of the Board of Trustees has been distributed pro rata to the State Societies. It makes a volume of 398 pages, containing a list of General Officers and National Committees for 1907, Officers from 1889 to 1906, Charter, Constitution, and By-Laws, Officers of State Societies and Local Chapters, Proceedings of the Denver Congress, June 3 and 4, 1907, and records of 709 members enrolled from May 1, 1906, to June 1, 1907. A limited number of copies is available to members on application to State Secretaries.

THE BUFFALO CONGRESS OF 1908.

The Buffalo Chapter of the Empire State Society held a meeting on November 19 at the residence of Mr. Trueman G. Avery. The meeting was called for the purpose of making plans for the entertainment of the National Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution, which is to be held in Buffalo April 30 and May 1, 1908. It was decided that the Buffalo Chapter should resolve itself into a committee of the whole with power to appoint committees to carry on the plans, with the President of the Chapter as general chairman. It was also decided that several subcommittees be appointed to carry out the details of the arrangements to be made and the general chairman was instructed to select these committees. It is the desire of the Chapter to increase the membership materially before the Congress in April, and in order to do this a membership committee was appointed with Frank B. Steele as chairman to further this work.

John Paul Jones.

DOINGS OF STATE SOCIETIES.

The California Society on October 19 celebrated the 126th anniversary of the surrender at Yorktown by a banquet. Addresses were delivered by Mr. George C. Sargent, Vice-President; Mr. Walter MacArthur, and Mr. Alfred Holman on "The Spirit of '76 and its Relations to Modern Strikes and Boycotts."

President Pelham W. Ames, of the California Society, is now residing at 776 Beacon street, Boston, Mass.

The District of Columbia Society on November 20 held its first meeting of the season at the Arlington Hotel. There was an attendance of about 140. Nine new members were announced, including Rear Admiral Charles Mitchell Thomas, U. S. Navy, and ten applicants were proposed for membership.

Addresses were made by Judge Stockbridge, Hon. Terrence V. Powderly, and Ambassador David Jayne Hill.

Mr. Powderly, head of the information division of the Bureau of Immigration, said that he had admitted long since that he was wrong in the declaration that our doors should be shut to the foreigner for ten years, or until we could take account of stock. He said that the immigrants of today will be the good Americans of tomorrow. He pronounced the immigrant leaflet, prepared by the Sons of the American Revolution, to be one of the best means ever devised for the enlightenment of aliens on the principles of the Government of the United States, and on the opportunities afforded to law-abiding citizens of this country.

Ambassador Hill commented upon the wide sympathy shown by the American delegates at the Hague Peace Conference. He said that this was due largely to the fact that the strains of many bloods run through the American people. "The composite character of our Nation is an advantage in that it gives to it a variant energy and a distinctive type of American character."

In his address on the future of the National Society, Hon. Henry Stockbridge, of the National Executive Committee, said:

The position of the patriotic society in our country today is not clearly apprehended, and, strange as it may seem, that is true to some extent even among the members of this and kindred societies. If these societies are to thrive, or continue to exist, they must demonstrate a reason for their existence. It is well to commemorate in pillars of marble or tablets of bronze and to inscribe on the pages of history the deeds of self-sacrifice and heroic achievement of a century and a quarter ago, but patriotism does not consist in that; historical societies in every State of this Union are doing this very thing. It is laudable to cherish, preserve, and record the deeds of our ancestors, and to trace out the mazy lines of descent through successive generations, but this is not of itself a patriotic work; genealogical associations are formed and exist for this very purpose. No people have ever shown greater regard and reverence for their ancestors than the Chinese, yet they are today a subject race, and the Manchu lords it over them.

True patriotism is an ever-living principle—a vitalizing force in the present, using the past, but using it only as a source from which to draw inspiration for action in the present, or to profit by the lessons which history may teach. It is this which as individuals we are too prone to forget, which as members of so-called patriotic societies we are apt to ignore. The patriotic society, if it would be such in fact as well as in name, if it is to be anything more than a social organization, if it is to continue to exist and prosper under such an appellation, must demonstrate its raison d'être not only to its membership, but before all peoples. It must have not only a definite aim, but even more be actively engaged upon a definite work in the present, and such work should be in the direction of counteracting the influences or tendencies which are or may be fraught with danger to the Republic today. No organization should be called or regarded as patriotic which is not thus actively at work.

To the close observer of this country the problem of the proper assimilation and education of our vast immigrant population is one of great seriousness. Of the population of this country today not less than 16 per cent is foreign born. The annual accession to this number is in the neighborhood of a million. This is a force within our body politic which cannot safely be ignored and may sooner or later have to be reckoned with. Let there be no misunderstanding. It is not intended to be suggested that this vast number of people are of vicious tendency or inimical to a well-ordered condition of society or state; but many of them are impressionable and possess but a meager education, and it is of vast importance, looking to the future well-being of our country, whether they become citizens or not, that they acquire a correct understanding and appreciation of these United States, its institutions and manner of government. It is therefore of vital moment to the State whether their first impression of our country and its institutions shall be that derived from some demagogue or professional agitator, or be intelligent and comprehensive. It may make all the difference between a law-abiding resident and a law-defying resident. Is there not here an opportunity, a duty even to be performed just as patriotic as serving a gun in action or bearing the starry banner on a march?

So it has seemed to your Executive Committee, and, thanks to the most valuable assistance of Compatriot John H. Moore, of this Society, the plan proposed by the Executive Committee has received the hearty and cordial co-operation of the Department of Commerce and Labor, and this Society may congratulate itself that it is pointing the way for other patriotic societies to render a real and important patriotic work.

The plan now in operation is not, however, adequate to meet the situation. It comprehends the furnishing of first instruction to those who shall hereafter land

on our shores. But what of the twelve millions or more who are already here? In some manner they, too, should be reached and given, perhaps not the same but similar instruction. And here lies a most important field of labor and usefulness for our State Societies. With a small percentage contact may be had through the schools. But there is another way not hitherto properly appreciated or availed of. Certain events in our national history are commemorated by holidays. Washington's Birthday, flag day, the Fourth of July, are instances. What are we doing in proper observance of these days? * * * Partial investigation made has shown that but a very small percentage of our foreign-born population can, if called on, give any intelligent conception of that which is intended to be commemorated by the days which have been set apart in our bustling life to honor and perpetuate the great achievements in our history as a nation-achievements which are the more important because they involved or established some great fundamental principle of our government, and so serve as milestones in the march of human progress. These anniversaries should therefore be made to serve a double purpose, the paramount one being to instruct all, whether citizens or not, in the vital fundamental principles upon which our government rests. * * *

But who is to do this work, who will create the sentiment which shall take practical form? To whom have the citizens of this country to look for such a step, if we, calling ourselves patriotic organizations, and boasting our descent from patriots, proved in the time of the country's need, stand supinely by and make no move? * * *

Does the vastness of the work afford any palliation for delay in entering upon it? Does it not rather suggest that our privileges have been and are great, and that our duty is to be measured by the standard of our opportunities and the rights we enjoy? It is undeniably true that a membership of eleven thousand is too small for the work which we as a Society should be doing in a people numbering more than eighty millions. But those entitled to membership with us are many times our present number, and in view of our responsibilities the paramount duty at this time is a most material increase of our membership in order that we may properly respond to our obligations.

Just in proportion as our membership grows, in an even greater proportion will it become possible to adequately perform our obligations to our country, to become a patriotic society no less in fact than in name, and a potent force for a higher citizenship.

The District of Columbia Society has appointed a committee, with General Vincent as chairman, to secure the enactment of a law to prevent the desecration of the American flag in the District of Columbia and the territories of the United States.

THE HAWAIIAN SOCIETY has elected as President, John Effinger, Bishop street, Honolulu; Secretary, Lyle Alexander Dickey, 35 S. King street, Honolulu; Registrar, Sidney Miller Ballou, Judiciary Building, Honolulu, and Treasurer, Robert James Pratt, Atherton street, Honolulu.

THE ILLINOIS SOCIETY held its annual meeting and banquet at the Hamilton Club, Chicago, on December 3, the 89th anniversary of the admission of Illinois into the Union. About 150 members attended.

President General McClary made an address, urging more active work in recruiting membership. He said that the total enrolment of nearly 20,000 members since 1889 had been reduced by death and other causes to less than 12,000.

Mr. Charles P. Megan, superintendent of the city's night schools, and Prof. John H. Loomis, principal of the McLaren school, spoke briefly. Maj. Edgar Bronson Tolman, the retiring president, gave a stereopticon lecture on views he took during the trip to the Colorado Congress last June. Officers were elected as follows: President, Horace E. Horton, 10206 Longwood avenue; Vice-Presidents, John Shepherd and Porter B. Fitzgerald; Secretary, John D. Vandercook, 108 La Salle street; Treasurer, James H. Gilbert; Historian, James Edgar Brown; Registrar, Fred F. Loomis; Chaplain, Charles Herbert Young; Sergeant-at-arms, Llewellyn R. Atkins.

The National Society has awarded a medal and diploma to Compatriot Percy B. Coffin, First Sergeant of Company A, First Illinois Infantry, U. S. Volunteers, for patriotic service in the war with Spain in 1898.

The Iowa Society on November 13 entertained President General McClary at a reception in Des Moines. Addresses were made by Mr. McClary, Mr. Willard Secor, President of the Iowa Society, and Treasurer General, and by Capt. E. D. Hadley, Secretary of the Society.

The reception was under the auspices of the Ben Franklin Chapter, of which Captain Hadley is President, and was given at the residence of Mr. Hubbell. Mr. McClary talked upon the objects, work, and needs of the Society and the desirability of increasing the membership. Particular stress was laid upon the work taken in hand of educating the immigrants flocking to our shores in the rights and duties of citizens of this Republic.

The Chapter has in hand the enterprise of engaging the colleges of the State in a competition for a bronze medal offered by the State Society for the best work in each college in the study of the history of the United States.

during the Revolutionary War. The unveiling of the monument upon the historic camp ground is the first step that any State has taken to erect memorials there for its heroes of the Revolution. The monument is a polished granite block, six feet high and five feet wide, and weighs 134,000 pounds. The inscription states that the boulder is erected by the State of Maine under the auspices of the Maine Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

THE MARYLAND SOCIETY at its annual meeting, on October 19, elected the following officers: President, Hon. George R. Henry Stockbridge, 11 N. Calhoun street, Baltimore, and Chaplain, Rev. Henry Branch, Ellicott City.

On Saturday, October 19, "Peggy Stewart Day," the Society went to Annapolis to assist the Daughters of the American Revolution in marking a tree on the campus of St. John's College, to be known as the Liberty Tree. Under it Generals Washington and Lafayette are said to have held conferences prior to the Yorktown campaign.

The Maryland Society subscribed to a fund for the purchase of ten historic guns, which, with ten tablets, were unveiled on October 16, at Fort McHenry, Baltimore, in the presence of several thousand people. It is proposed to establish this historic fort as a National Park. The program included addresses by Compatriots Governor Warfield, Judge Stockbridge and others. A tablet was erected by each of the patriotic subscribing societies, one of them reading: "This tablet is here placed by the Maryland Society of the Sons of the American Revolution to commemorate its coöperation with the people of Baltimore in the retention of the old battery in these works. J. D. Iglehart, Chairman of Committee; Henry Stockbridge, President; R. Fuller Shryock, Secretary, 1907."

The Massachusetts Society has in press nearly ready for distribution a new register of its society, the first issued in three years. The frontispiece, in colors, will show a reproduction of a historical painting by Clyde O. Deland, of Philadelphia, representing the "Raising of the First American Union Flag on Prospect Hill, Somerville, Mass., January 1, 1776." The book has been compiled by the Society's Registrar, Herbert Wood Kimball. There are other illustrations, including a reproduction from a photograph of the boulder and tablet erected at

Dracut by Old Middlesex Chapter, S. A. R., of Lowell, in honor of the Dracut men who fought in the Revolutionary War. A picture of the famous Old Elm in Cambridge will be included.

The Society has subscribed \$250 toward preserving the Royall House in Medford, the former country seat of Governor Winthrop, the first Governor of the Massachusetts Bay Colony, and, during the siege of Boston, the headquarters of General Stark.

THE MICHIGAN SOCIETY held meetings of its Historical Section on October 25 and November 15. At the first meeting Mr. Theodore H. Eaton, of the National Executive Committee, outlined a plan for securing new members. A paper was read by Mr. Oscar James on Benjamin Franklin and the valuable services rendered by that great statesman during the Revolution, and the subject was discussed by Mr. George W. Bates and others.

At the November meeting Dr. Hal C. Wyman read a paper on "Our Duties to Recent Territorial Acquisitions." Dr. J. E. Emerson described some features of the Hawaiian Islands from personal observation, with particular reference to taxation, tariff, and relations with the United States.

THE NEBRASKA SOCIETY held its annual banquet at Omaha on October 14. James H. Adams, President of the Society, acted as toastmaster.

President General Nelson A. McClary responded to the first toast, "The Sons of the American Revolution." He gave a short sketch of the purposes and objects of the Society and the work that it had already accomplished, both educationally and in the matter of providing appropriate tablets for marking the locations of many of the revolutionary battlefields. An essential purpose of the Society was to provide pamphlets for the information and instruction of immigrants coming into the country, relative to American customs and the opportunities afforded for education and to instill in them a patriotic interest in the country, and hereby increase their value as citizens.

Dr. George L. Miller responded to the sentiment of "The Oregon Trail," and paid a glowing tribute to the soldiers of peace who sixty-four years ago gave to the United States this western empire.

W. F. Gurley responded to the sentiment of the "Modern Patriot" in an eloquent address.

Rev. Frank L. Loveland was the closing speaker. He talked upon the "Righteousness of the Revolution." "No logic has yet developed the fact that war is wrong. If a single combatant is at liberty to assert a right by force, how much greater is the right of combined effort to adjust wrongs of tryanny and oppression," said he, "and the world can

never repay the embattled farmers of the Revolution for what they did. Washington and his compatriots were but instruments of God to accomplish a mighty task and they did it well. War will continue as long as tyranny seeks to throttle human rights."

The Society has requested from the National Committee a supply of 3,000 immigrant leaflets, in nine languages, for distribution in the public night schools of Omaha.

THE NEW JERSEY SOCIETY has been honored by the election of its President, Hon. J. Franklin Fort, to the office of Governor of the State of New Jersey. While the Society very properly takes no part in partisan politics, and strictly refrains from asking its members to do so, its entire membership, irrespective of political affiliations, feels highly gratified that the people of the State have chosen its respected President for the chief executive office of this old commonwealth.

The active interest of the Society in its work has been kept up to the standard of former years. Meetings have been held by the Chapters; earnest efforts have been made to secure the balance of the funds necessary to complete the erection of the Princeton Battle monument and the relocation of the "Old Sow" boulder and tablet, placed in charge of a committee for adjustment with the purchasers of the property.

The annual meeting of the Society will be held on the anniversary of the battle of Princeton, January 3, 1908, at the rooms of the New Jersey Historical Society, in Newark, on which occasion an historical address will be delivered by a prominent member of the National Society, to be followed by an elaborate luncheon to be given by the Society to all the members present in lieu of the annual banquet which will be given at a later date.—J. R. MULLIKIN.

The Empire State Society gave its eighteenth annual banquet at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, on November 25, celebrating the anniversary of the evacuation of New York City by the British. About 350 members and guests attended. President Marble delivered the address of welcome. Other speakers were President General McClary, extending greetings from the National Society; Rev. Nehemiah Boynton, on "The Sons of the American Revolution and the Needs of Today;" Rev. Charles F. Aked, on "Some Present Day Tendencies;" Hon. Job E. Hedges, President J. Franklin Fort, of the New Jersey Society, and Hon. Henry E. Howland. Rev. Dr. Aked is an Englishman recently settled in this country. In the course of his address he said:

"English hearts have rejoiced over your triumphs and have seen in the sunlight that gleams in these folds of your flag the smile of God upon a people He loves. Men have dared to dream of war between us. If you could get half a dozen of the editors and the swashbucklers of the two countries out in a field and shoot them that would make for the

peace of the world.

"Let us dream the dream—the federation of the English-speaking people of the world. It is said to be difficult to get an idea into an Englishman's head, but if it takes fifty years to get it in it takes 100 years to get it out; and even the governing classes are learning something."

The Buffalo Chapter is active in preparation for the next Congress. A meeting was held on November 19, when committees were appointed as noted above.

THE VERMONT SOCIETY held its annual meeting at Burlington on November 13, when the officers of the past year were re-elected. Mr. Hiram Carlton was elected as Historian to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. George G. Benedict. A resolution was adopted extending an invitation to hold the National Congress of 1909 in Vermont. The Society endorsed the plan that the Secretary should write a history of Vermont's part in the Revolution.

PROCEEDINGS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING, FEBRUARY 24, 1908.

A meeting of the Executive Committee, duly called by order of the President General, was held at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, New York, on Monday, February 24, 1908. The meeting was called to order at 3 o'clock p. m. by President General McClary, who presided. Members of the Committee present were: The President General, Judge Stockbridge, Judge Beardsley, Dr. Clinton B. Batcheller, and Mr. Theodore H. Eaton, also ex-President General Pugsley and Secretary General Clark.

The proceedings of the meeting of October 1, 1907, were approved as printed in the Official Bulletin of October 15.

A report from Maj. Wm. Frye Tebbetts, chairman of the Committee on Organization, was read, showing progress made toward the establishment of State Societies in North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, and Mississippi. A large number of letters have been written to persons known to be eligible to membership or interested in the work.

A report from Dr. Rufus W. Clark, chairman of the Committee on Education, told of the educational work in Iowa, Oklahoma, Oregon, Ohio, New York, Michigan, Wisconsin, and Minnesota through the offering of prizes and medals for patriotic essays, through the distribution of circulars entitled "A Welcome to Immigrants and Some Good Advice;" through the presentation to public schools of portraits of eminent Americans, and through assisting in patriotic celebrations.

Letters were received from the Trustees of most of the State Societies, in response to requests by the President General, reporting on their present condition and patriotic work proposed, suggesting methods for increasing the membership, and in general for the advancement of the national organization. These letters were carefully considered, and steps were taken to profit by the recommendations offered.

After discussion of the condition of the Chapters in the several States, it was voted that Judge Stockbridge be appointed a committee of one to

prepare a resolution to be offered at the Buffalo Congress looking to the formulation of National By-Laws covering in general the organization of local Chapters under the authority of State Societies.

A report was received from Col. Ralph E. Prime, chairman of the Flag Committee, showing progress made in the enactment of legislation to prevent the desecration of the flag of the United States. The Executive Committee, on recommendation of the Flag Committee, thereupon adopted a resolution endorsing and approving the bills now before Congress, Senate Bill No. 565, and House Bill No. 220, for the protection of the flag, and the Secretary General was instructed to send copies of this resolution to the chairmen of the Senate Committee on Military Affairs and of the House Committee on Judiciary. The resolution to the Senate is as follows:

Resolved, by the Executive Committee of The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, That this Committee cordially approve and heartily commend to the Senate Committee on Military Affairs the Bill now pending before that Committee (Senate Bill No. 565) for the protection of the National flag, and respectfully, but earnestly, urges upon the Committee favorable action upon and the speedy enactment into law of this measure.

It was voted that fifty dollars be appropriated towards the expenses of the Flag Committee, and an order on the Treasurer General was authorized for that amount, to be paid to the order of Ralph E. Prime, chairman.

The Committee on Printing and Distribution of the leaflet "Information to Immigrants" (Commander John H. Moore, U. S. N., chairman; Col. Charles Lyman, and A. Howard Clark), appointed by the Executive Committee at the meeting on October 1, reported that 15,000 copies had been printed in English, and 1,000,000 copies in Italian, Yiddish, Magyar, and Polish, and that translations into German, Slovak, Croatian, Greek, Slovenian, and other languages were in progress. The Committee reported that the leaflet has been adopted as an official publication of the Department of Commerce and Labor, and that through the Division of Information of the Bureau of Immigration, it will hereafter be printed and distributed by the United States Government to immigrants en route to America and to aliens now resident in this country. The National Society will cooperate with the Government in the preparation of the leaflet in various languages and in its distribution to the best advantage. The Government editions of the leaflet will give due credit to the Sons of the American Revolution for its preparation.

It was voted that the President General, with another member to be

selected by him, be authorized to visit Tennessee for the purpose of reviving interest in the work of the Society in that State.

A report was received from Gen. Thomas M. Vincent, U. S. A., showing progress by the Committee on Pension and Muster Rolls. It is estimated that after one year's more work of compilation the Committee may submit a definite report, and that the United States Congress may then be urged to make an appropriation to print "the genealogical and historical material connected with about 63,000 pensioners of the War of the Revolution."

The Committee on Publication reported that 2,000 copies of the Official Bulletin for July 8, 1907; 6,500 copies for October 15, and 6,000 copies for December 16, had been printed and distributed at a gross cost of \$499.18, and a net cost to the National Society of about \$400. Thirteen State Societies have subscribed to the Bulletin for all their members, representing nearly half the total membership of the National Society. It was voted that the Committee on Publication consider and report to the Buffalo Congress, on the advisability, possibility, and cost of sending the Official Bulletin to every member at the expense of the National Society, and the possibility of mailing them as second-class matter.

Letters were read from Mr. Trueman G. Avery and Mr. Frank B. Steele, showing progress made in preparation for the Buffalo Congress. A provisional program was considered and approved subject to necessary changes.

The Committee then at 7.10 o'clock adjourned.

NAVAL RECORDS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

The Library of Congress has issued a volume of Naval Records of the American Revolution, citing the action of the Continental Congress in relation to the navy, and including an alphabetical list of names of some 2,000 vessels commissioned under letters of marque and the names of the bondsmen and owners in each case. This work may be purchased at one dollar a copy from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C.

DOINGS OF STATE SOCIETIES.

THE ALABAMA SOCIETY held its fifth annual meeting at Mobile on February 22, when Maj. William Frye Tebbetts was re-elected President. It was decided to award gold medals as first and second prizes for essays by any public school pupils in the State on The Revolutionary War and the Future Effects of Immigration on the Nation.

THE ARIZONA SOCIETY held its twelfth annual banquet at Phœnix on February 22. The toasts were: "Liberty and Law," "Patrick Henry, the Father of the Republic," "The Siege of Yorktown," "The American Navy," and "Our Presidents." Officers were elected as follows: President, E. E. Ellinwood, Bisbee; Vice-President, Isaac T. Stoddard, Phœnix; Secretary, C. F. Leonard, Phœnix; Treasurer, Lloyd B. Christy, Phœnix; Historian, Rev. J. W. Atwood, Phœnix; Chaplain, Rev. Winfield Scott, Scottsdale.

THE CALIFORNIA SOCIETY, on January 14, 1908, elected as President, George C. Sargent, Crocker Building, San Francisco; senior Vice-President, R. M. Sims; junior Vice-President, J. S. Manley, died January 28; Secretary, J. Mora Moss, 930 Green street; Treasurer, Edwin Bonnell; Registrar, Col. A. S. Hubbard, 565 Fourth avenue; Marshal, Edward M. Adams.

The California Society has offered a prize to the member who brings in the most new members during the year. The prize to be a badge of the Society or the remission of dues for three years.

A banquet was given by the Society on February 22, when a movement was launched to erect in California a monument to George Washington. A subscription fund was started and a committee was appointed to solicit contributions.

George C. Sargent, President of the Society, reminded the diners that there was no monument to George Washington within the State, and that the perpetuation in stone of the memory of the great American patriot on the Pacific Coast was greatly to be desired. He predicted that it would be easy to arouse public interest in the project, and that there would be no lack of funds.

There were more than 100 Sons and Daughters of the Revolution and invited guests at the banquet, which was an elaborate affair given in the white and gold room of the Fairmont.

The honor guest was Prof. Henry Morse Stephens, who delivered an address after the dinner on the subject "George Washington, the Great Peacemaker."

THE COLORADO SOCIETY has held meetings each month since October. Patriotic exercises and a banquet were held on February 22. The Society is specially interested, and is making every effort to increase its own membership and to stimulate recruiting throughout the country. Special endeavors are in progress to secure new members in Wyoming and New Mexico to form nuclei for new Societies in those States.

It is announced that the Travelling Banner presented by the Colorado Society is ready to be awarded at the Buffalo Congress to the Society numbering one hundred members or more that shows the largest percentage of gain during the year. The Colorado Society itself withdraws from competition.

THE CONNECTICUT Society held its nineteenth annual dinner at New Haven on February 22, when over 250 members and guests were present. Among the speakers were President Louis B. Curtis; Governor I. Franklin Fort, of New Jersey, and President of the New Jersey Society; President-General Nelson A. McClary, of Chicago; Hon. Gifford Pinchot, of Washington; Hon. Everett T. Lake, Lieutenant Governor of Connecticut. Mr. Curtis spoke of several historic sites in the State to be marked with suitable memorials, and urged members to renewed enthusiasm in behalf of the Society. Governor Fort's address was on "Washington and the Constitution of 1787." In conclusion he said, "For 120 years the constitution has stood the test of three foreign wars, of a civil strife, and a period of expansion. Every people looking for freedom the world over take our constitution as a model. France follows us; Mexico follows us; Switzerland follows us; the South American republics all follow us; Cuba, the island republic of our creation, follows us; Panama follows us. All hail the memory of Washington! extol the constitution! Our inheritance in liberty is rich indeed. Let us rise to the full height of the nobility of the citizenship in such a republic."

Mr. McClary spoke of "the real patriotism, the practical patriotism necessary to free institutions. The subjects of an absolute monarchy may be patriotic; they often have been; but their government will not necessarily fall even if they are somewhat lacking in this respect. Citizens of a free country must be patriotic, or their government will become a farce, and anarchy, more to be dreaded than despotism, will prevail.

A corner-stone of free institutions is fair regard for the rights of others. Practical patriotism forbids wealth to oppress poverty and forbids poverty to violate the rights of property. The corporation which sells goods that are not as represented or which resorts to unfair methods of competition is unpatriotic. The labor unionist who withholds his full efficiency or denies to his fellow-laborer the right to work is unpatriotic. The farmer who thinks his neighbor should hold his

crop for a certain price and enforces that opinion by violent methods is of mankind. The golden rule is not the rule of the savage or of the ignorant. Fairness of this kind results only from education, self-impossible to any people below a certain standard of education and in is because of this fact that the absorption by this country of ignorant foreigners more rapidly than they can be assimilated constitutes a function of the institutions founded by our fathers.

"I would not be understood as advocating the exclusion of the aliens now coming in such great numbers. I believe that they have the natural right to thus better their condition and we need them industrially, and their children, and giving them something of our American point of view."

In the course of his address Mr. Pinchot said:

"Besides all their other great qualities of loyalty, vigor, and devotion to ideals, the people of Connecticut have one distinctive mark. Somemake the best use of what you have. It is the inventiveness, the intelligence, and the perseverance to get the best results from the opportunities at hand. There is just beginning a great movement throughout the United States to inoculate all the other States and Territories of application to our natural resources.

"In the last analysis, the well-being of any community depends on the character of its natural resources and the character of its people, as expressed in their institutions and conduct. I shall speak today about the conservation of natural resources, and shall say very little about the conservation of institutions or people, although the two are essentially one great movement. The question is, 'How shall we use what for today and tomorrow?' Whether that question applies to forests, law, institutions, and opportunities, it is in its essence the same. It is play in dealing with men and laws. The two great phases of the great problem which is being worked out under the far-sighted statesmanship of President Roosevelt are foresight and fair play."

THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA SOCIETY ON January 16 held a "Lafayette meeting," the occasion being "ladies' night," when nearly three hundred members and guests were present. An address was delivered by Rev. Dr.

Samuel H. Woodrow on "The Influence of Early Settlers Upon National Life." Dr. Woodrow analyzed the nature of the immigration which gave its specific character to each of the colonies that formed the original thirteen States, laying stress upon the religious life which, whether through steadfastness or schism, led to extension of settlements on either theocratic or republican principles, and tracing the influence of each. Thus the various traits which go to make up the Americanism of real Americans were followed back to their fountain heads, and the speaker suggested that a fusion of them all lead to the best results.

Hon. W. E. Andrews, auditor for the Navy Department, then pronounced a eulogy on Lafayette, telling of the love for liberty which prompted the young noble to leave court and cross the seas to help the struggling colonists, in spite of the objections of his family. The speaker had with him and exhibited to the interested audience, the warrant issued by the Treasury, drawn in favor of Gen. Lafayette, and endorsed by him, for \$200,000, in appreciation of his services during the revolution.

Justice A. B. Hagner spoke of Lafayette and his patriotic service to America and urged that Sixteenth Street in Washington City, extending from the White House to the border of Maryland, in which State Lafayette was made a citizen in 1784, should be renamed Lafayette Avenue.

On February 22, at the annual meeting, the following officers were elected: President, Thomas H. Anderson, Justice of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia, 1531 New Hampshire Avenue; Vice-Presidents, Justice A. B. Hagner, E. B. Moore, Commissioner of Patents, and W. A. De Caindry; Recording Secretary, Henry P. Holden, 1217 I Street; Corresponding Secretary, J. E. Fenwick; Treasurer, Philip F. Larner; Registrar, A. D. Spangler, 72 S Street; Assistant Registrar, Chester M. Clark; Historian, Selden M. Ely; Librarian, Paul Brockett, and Chaplain, Thomas S. Childs.

The Society has appointed a special committee with Gen. Thomas M. Vincent, U. S. A., as chairman, to make every effort to secure legislation by Congress for the protection of the National flag, and to this end urges the enactment of identical bills now pending before the Senate Committee on Military Affairs (S. 565) and the House Committee on Judiciary (H. R. 220).

THE HAWAHAN SOCIETY has added fourteen new members to its roll since the Denver Congress. President Effinger writes:

"We have a greater problem before us, in proportion to our size, than any other Society, in that in these Islands we have more of a mixed population than in any other State or Territory; and that we are

trying in every way to reach the children of the public schools, Japanese, Korean, Chinese, Porto Rican, Spanish, Hawaiian, Italian, and all the others, whose parents were brought here by the planting interests, and who are now by their birthright full fledged eligibles for the suffrage.

"By the observance of our patriotic anniversaries, and the dissemination of patriotic and historical literature we shall hope to inculcate in these children of our 'Happy Isles' that which will make them useful citizens of our great Republic.

"It is not too much to ask that we 'The Cross Ways of the Pacific'

be especially in your care and attention.

"We are in the position of a buffer between the Asiatic and Caucasian civilization. We do not know how long before this buffer will cease to exist and these Islands become the theater for a struggle in which you may assume correctly that the Hawaiian Society of the Sons of the American Revolution will not be found wanting!"

THE ILLINOIS SOCIETY has been active in arranging for a wide distribution of the leaflet "Information for Immigrants" among the masses of aliens in Chicago, and particularly among the foreign elements in the night schools.

THE IOWA SOCIETY is active in the study of American history. At the December meeting of the Ben Franklin Chapter at Des Moines, Mr. Alson Secor read a paper on the Revolutionary Press, in which he reviewed the history of the newspaper press in the old world and America, and showed its power in this country in preparing the people for the struggle for freedom and in keeping patriotism alive duing the long contest. Papers announced for monthly meetings from January to May, included the following topics: "The Women of the Revolution," "Philadelphia and the British," "Private Life and Character of John Paul Jones," "Washington, the Man," and "The Surgeons of the Revolution" "The Old Continental," published monthly by the Iowa Society, records much of importance to the membership.

There has been issued in the name of the Society an attractive invitation, bearing the badge in colors, addressed to persons known to be eligible to membership, and calling upon them to affiliate with the Society in its patriotic work.

THE KANSAS Society at its annual meeting at Topeka, January 15, re-elected last year's officers. On February 22, its annual banquet was held, at which sixty-five were present.

THE LOUISIANA SOCIETY at its annual meeting in December, opened a campaign for "a proper appreciation of American citizenship," and to this end named a membership committee for the purpose of canvassing the State for new members. At the same time it arranged for the distribution among all aliens who come to Louisiana, of pamphlets showing the duties, opportunities, responsibilities, privileges, and meaning of true American citizenship. President Peter F. Pescud and other officers were re-elected. The annual banquet was held on February 22, when addresses were delivered by President Pescud who presided; by Vice-President Edward Rightor on "Our Country;" by Prof. Alcée Fortier on "Lafayette;" by Louis A. Lagarde on "The Common Cause," and by T. D. Miller on "Washington."

THE MAINE Society held its annual meeting and dinner at Riverton on February 22. The officers elected included: President, Hon. Frederic E Boothby, of Portland; Senior Vice-President, Judge Oliver G. Hall, of Augusta; a Vice-President for each county; Secretary, Rev. Joseph Battell Sheperd, of Portland; Registrar, Nathan Goold, of Portland; Treasurer, Philip F. Turner, of Portland; Librarian, Albert R. Stubbs; Historian, Hon. A. F. Moulton, of Portland; Chaplain, Rev. William G. Mann, of Westbrook.

A committee was appointed to ask the legislature to take measures that shall lead to the preservation of the graves of Revolutionary soldiers. The Board of Managers was made a committee to increase the membership. Retiring President Fellows delivered an address on the principles of the American Government, and in conclusion said:

"No aristocracy should creep into this organization, but such as may legitimately come from superior merit of usefulness. To make the sacrifices of these ancestors worth while is the duty of the descendants of the American Revolution, if there be a real reason for any organization based on birth. The Sons of the American Revolution should be students of American problems, the tariff, socialism, finance, suffrage, the legal system, and all problems connected with the welfare of society at large. There are a few in our colleges and universities making special study of these problems. It is a hopeful sign that these students and scholars are being listened to more and more in the conduct of practical business and government. But instead of the few confined to educational institutions, or at the head of some influential organizations, there should be a vast army of students of all these social problems. This army should include every member of the Sons of the American Revolution, and the Sons of the American Revolution should include every individual whose eligibility may be established, and the real honor of the Society would not be in its numbers, in its birth, in distinction of any kind other than in usefulness to the Nation."

THE MASSACHUSETTS Society has rigorously protested against the proposed changing of the name of historic "North Square" in Boston to "Scigliano Square." On February II, there was formally presented to the Bostonian Society by the Massachusetts Society a portrait of the Revoluntionary patriot, James Otis. This portrait was painted by Gilman Page, a member of the Sons of the American Revolution.

On February 22 the members of the Society assembled at the State House in Boston and were tendered a formal reception by Compatriot Governor Guild. At the Hotel Vendome the Society listened to an address by Rev. Dr. Frederick E. Emrich, on "What Can the Sons of the American Revolution do for the Pilgrims of the Twentieth Century."

Dr. Emrich dwelt particularly upon the reverence which foreignborn people of America have for the name of Washington, illustrating by the fact that in the morning, before he came to the meeting, he had seen among his treasured relics an engraving of George Washington, which was one of the first purchases of his father when he came to America.

It was not the descendants of the Puritans alone, he said, to whom the country was indebted for the preservation of the Union. It was the men who fought under Siegel and Shields and Kearney and Sheridan, and others like them, of foreign lineage, who saved the country.

"I would put on the walls of our school houses the pictures of Kossuth, Lafayette and other great men of foreign lands from whence many of the pupils come, so as to make them happy, for thus they will become more sincere American patriots, for they will be no less Americans because they love the memory of their own lands; the spirit of loyalty to their own parentage will make them reverence more the American people.

"In other States they are just beginning to open night schools for the benefit of immigrants and their children, but thank God Massachusetts has many such schools, in which thousands of men and women, as well as children, are learning the English language and the American system of government, citizenship and civilization.

"There is nothing better for the Sons of the American Revolution to do than to help in opening the door, trusting to our Heavenly Father who is able to work all things for good, and will

"Sons of the American Revolution—Be true to the traditions of the past—that America has liberty for all in its system of education, a standard of true religion, and a reverence for God, man, and democracy."

Others who spoke were Vernon A. Field, of Chelsea; Secretary George W. Mehaffy, of the Boston Y. M. C. A.; Rev. Lewis W. Hicks, and Pelham W. Ames, of California, Vice-President General of the National Society.

The Massachusetts Board of Managers appointed a special committee on recruiting, and sent out notices to each member of the Society inviting him to send to the Secretary the names of eligibles. The result up to March I was the enrollment of eighty-eight new members.

Five hundred dollars has been appropriated from the treasury of the Massachusetts Society, provided the additional sum of \$1,500 required could be raised by subscription to build a Bay in the "Cloister of the Colonies," now building at Valley Forge in connection with the Washington Memorial Chapel.

An appropriation of \$250 has been made toward the preservation of the Royall mansion at Medford, and there is in contemplation the erection on April 20, in the Old South Church, Boston, of a tablet descriptive of that edifice.

THE MINNESOTA SOCIETY reports a net membership of 496. The annual election and banquet took place on December 26. It was voted to send the Official Bulletin to all members during the year, and that the Secretary make a personal appeal to each member to bring in one or more new members by "asking if such member can or will use a set of application blanks if sent to him." The officers elected included: President, Hon. Charles Keith, of Princeton, Minn.; Vice-Presidents, Ellis J. Westlake, of Minneapolis, and James P. Gribben, of St. Paul; Secretary, Charles H. Bronson, 48 East Fourth Street, St. Paul; Assistant Secretary, Harry C. Judson, of St. Paul; Treasurer, Edward S. Stringer, of St. Paul; Registrar, Charles Stees, of St. Paul; Historian, Rev. Edward C. Mitchell, of St. Paul, and Chaplain, Rev. Dr. Maurice D. Edwards, of St. Paul.

In educational work the Society has made especial effort in the celebration of Washington's Birthday, by the children of the public schools. Five hundred children on one occasion joined in patriotic songs. Arrangements are made with the street cars to take the children to one of the churches, and under efficient leadership, good results have been obtained. It is intended to have the same plan extended among the schools throughout the State, and to have appropriate addresses, together with the singing of patriotic songs.

The Nebraska Society has prepared a series of contests among the pupils of the high schools of the State. There was appropriated \$25 to pay for two prizes to be awarded in Lincoln and Fremont for the best essays on "The Causes which Led Up to the War of the American Revolution." The officers elected at the annual business meeting on February 22 were: President, Ralph W. Breckenridge, of Omaha; Vice-Presidents, Paul W. Kuhns and Jefferson W. Bedford; Secretary and Registrar, Pressly J. Barr, Omaha; Treasurer, John F. Flack, and Historian. Iames Richardson.

THE NEW HAMPSHIRE SOCIETY has appointed a committee, with Mr. Fred W. Lamb, of Manchester, chairman, to arrange for the distribu-

tion of the leaflet "Information to Immigrants" among the foreigners in the factory cities and towns of the State. A bill is pending before the United States Senate Committee on Library (S. 44), introduced by Mr. Gallinger, appropriating \$40,000 for the erection of an equestrian statue of Major General John Stark in the city of Manchester.

The New Jersey Society, at its annual meeting on January 3, elected the following officers: President, Governor John Franklin Fort, of East Orange; Vice-Presidents, Edward S. Atwater, of Elizabeth, and Andrew W. Bray, of Newark; Secretary, Col. James R. Mullikin, 312 Belleville avenue, Newark; Treasurer, Capt. Oscar H. Condit, of East Orange; Registrar, John Jackson Hubbell, 810 Broad street, Newark The net membership in good standing on January 3 was 367. Special efforts are being made to secure new members, 20 having been added between June 1 and March 1. A committee was appointed to consider terms and conditions under which male members of the Society of Children of the American Revolution might be admitted upon their attaining the age of 21 years. Full proceedings of the meeting have been distributed in pamphlet form.

The New Jersey Society united with the other patriotic societies of the State in celebration of Washington's Birthday at the capitol in Trenton. An elaborate program had been prepared by the local committee, which was fully carried out.

The anniversary was observed first through the gathering and services by the several societies at their respective headquarters. The Society of the Sons of the American Revolution established its headquarters at the Windsor Hotel, where the members assembled and enjoved a social hour. At II a. m. it proceeded in a body to the First Presbyterian Church, where the joint religious services were held. Rev. Dr. Henry Collins Minton, pastor of the church, conducted the services, which opened with "Hail, Columbia," "America," and a "Patriotic Hymn," composed by Hamilton Schuyler, and sung by the entire congregation. The sermon by Dr. Minton was a learned discourse on the national traditions which have been handed down to us by our Revolutionary fathers. He said that our forefathers based this government on a profound moral scale, and as such it has been handed down to us of this generation. He characterized the United States as a Christian nation, and that this heritage was the outcome of the Revolutionary days, when our forefathers lived in an atmosphere of right living. In conclusion, he urged that the aim of all truly patriotic Americans, under whichsoever banner or society they rallied, should ever be to hold forth to those who turned their faces to this land of

Christian and constitutional liberty, honor for God's laws and for those of the Republic.

At the close of the sermon the Societies proceeded to the State House, where a salute of twenty-one guns was fired by a detachment of the Sons of Veterans, by order of the Governor (the President of the New Jersey Society, S. A. R.), and under the direction of the military authorities of the State. An address was made by Hon. Clement H. Sinnickson, who presided, in the absence of Governor Fort, at the meeting of the Connecticut Society, S. A. R., in New Haven. The following program was rendered at the State House: Prayer. "Recessional," Rudyard Kipling, sung by Miss Newkirk. "Roll Call" of the following Societies: Society of the Cincinnati, Colonial Wars, Colonial Dames, Sons of the American Revolution, Daughters of the American Revolution, Sons of the Revolution. Presentation of the flags of the several Societies before the presiding officer, accompanied by the several color-guards. This was a very beautiful ceremony, and elicited a burst of patriotic enthusiasm which lasted for some minutes. The address delivered by Professor Winthrop M. Daniels, of Princeton University, dealt with the life of Washington and the mission of patriotic societies. It was a masterly presentation of the more salient characteristics of the life of Washington.

THE EMPIRE STATE SOCIETY is working for the increase of its membership along the line of personal application, and had secured 73 new members up to March I. Measures are under consideration for a wide distribution among the masses of foreigners in New York of the leaflet on "Information for Immigrants."

Over three hundred were present at a meeting at the Hotel Knickerbocker on February 18. It was "Ladies' Night." Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis, pastor of Plymouth Church, Brooklyn, gave a lecture on "Oliver Cromwell and the Rise of the Five Liberties of New England."

A leaflet of general information on the work of the Society, marked No. I, was issued under date of February I.

In a circular distributed to the newspapers of the State, the Empire State Society records its protest against the proposed action of the State government to locate a State prison on the former site of Forts Montgomery and Clinton, "a spot made sacred by the blood of our patriotic dead":

"We but express the opinion of scores of other historic and patriotic societies and earnest legislators when we most emphatically condemn this apparently needless affront to the sentiments and wishes of every citizen who reveres the memory of those who on this spot sacrificed their lives for the sacred cause of liberty.

"On the west shore of the Hudson, just opposite Anthony's Nose in October, 1777, were located Fort Montgomery and Fort Clinton, and they were in the immediate command of Gov. George Clinton and his brother, Gen. James Clinton; and across the river at this place was stretched on booms of logs the famous iron chain of the Revolution. and for its protection there was a little two-gun battery, located a short distance up the hill. Such was the situation when, on October 4th, the British general-Sir Henry Clinton-sailed up the river from New York with more than three thousand troops and landed at Ver Planck's Point-a few miles below Peekskill-then the headquarters of General Putnam, who commanded all the highland posts. The British deceived our forces by a feigned attack, and on the 6th, in a dense fog, crossed over the river to Stony Point, marched around west of the Dunderberg and Bear Mountain, and fell upon Forts Clinton and Montgomery, demanding their immediate surrender, which was unhesitatingly refused.

"Although hopelessly outnumbered, our small garrison of six hundred Continental troops made a fierce resistance until half their force and one hundred and forty of the enemy had christened the ground with their blood. The forts were taken, the chain across the river was broken, and the Hudson opened to the British fleet. Governor Clinton fled at night to Putnam's camp, while his brother James, badly wounded, made his way with great difficulty over the mountains to his home at New Windsor. Some American vessels, anchored above the chain, and unable to escape, were burned by their crews, their flaming hulks furnishing a great light, by which our fugitive garrison found their way over the mountains to the settlement beyond. Such, in brief, is the story of that bloody and eventful fight, and its record is a most important part of the history of this State, and the places made famous by heroic deeds should be preserved as sacred for all time. Here heroes died that we might be citizens of a free and honorable country, and we need to possess more of their spirit of self-sacrifice and patriotic devotion.

"In this hurried, restless, greedy age, let us not forget that there is a moral force in history holding men, whether they will or not, to the results of their actions, and this force is as relentless as it is eternal, and from it there is no escape. May all our legislators in Albany take, heed of this, especially those whose ancestors fought in the Revolution. Let each one remember that he is now inscribing his own leaf in the great volume of mankind, and if he, by his political action, now does anything that militates against the best interests of his State or its historic places, those who shall come after him will be sure to recall his acts and hold him and his memory to a just reprobation.

"We urge that the press and the public insist that no State prison shall desecrate this battlefield christened by the blood of our Revolutionary heroes, but for all time it shall be preserved as a hallowed shrine."

The Ohio Society is working on the principle, learned by experience, that the best way to increase the membership is to give the members work to do. Eight thousand copies of a pamphlet has been distributed to foreigners with the view of educating them as to the Amer-

ican form of government. The graves of many Revolutionary soldiers have been located within the State, and under provisions of the State law bronze markers have been placed on these graves at the expense of the county commissioners. A copy of the Ohio law has been sent to the president of each State Society, with a view to furthering the enactment of a similar law in other States. There are nine local chapters in Ohio, and two more are in process of organization. Forty-two new members have been enrolled since June 1.

The Society publishes at intervals an official bulletin recording items of national and State importance in connection with the work of the Society.

THE OKLAHOMA SOCIETY reports that much material can be utilized in that State, but the deep interest in business affairs and in matters pertaining to the admission of the territory as a State of the Union has diverted immediate attention from the objects of this Society. The condition is changing, however, and it is hoped that plans now being formulated will be fruitful.

THE OREGON SOCIETY has accumulated a library of books on Revolutionary history. Prizes have been awarded to school children of the State for essays on patriotic topics. The competition has been interesting, and many of the essays show merit.

The annual meeting and banquet of the Oregon Society was held on February 22. The officers elected for the ensuing year were: President, Wallace McCamant, Portland; Vice-President, Stephen A. The banquet was the most successful in the history of the Society. The speakers were Hon. Hannis Taylor, ex-Minister to Spain from 1893-1897, counsel for the Spanish Claims Mission, and also Professor of International Law in the George Washington University; Mr. Dwight M. Lowrey and Major Moses Veale, of the Philadelphia

Chapter. Dr. Taylor spoke on "The Political Genius of the Revolutionary Epoch, Pelatiah Webster." He said:

"The truth of the Revolutionary period has not all been written. In history we are constantly making discoveries that enable us to read the story of bygone days with a truth and accuracy of which our fore-fathers had no conception. The discovery of the Rosetta stone in the delta of the Nile opened up the whole history of Egypt. As we study and compare, throw out the false and retain the true, we arrive at a real knowledge of our heroes' claims to greatness. Some names, indeed, remained for centuries in oblivion until at last truth conquered and enshrined them forever in the hall of fame. So I may hope that the name of Pelatiah Webster in the years to come may receive from every American citizen that veneration to which his achievements so justly entitle him."

Mr. Lowrey's topic was Washington's interest in the internal improvements of the nation:

"The best tribute we can pay to a great man gone, is to heed the counsels of his intelligence, and take to heart the lessons of his life, applying them all to the problems of the present. The keynote to the character of Washington was his brooding love for American nationality, and his faith in the future of a united American people.

"He was never troubled with doubt as to the functions and duty of government to promote the general welfare, where common interests were involved and a common advantage was to be gained. On one great question he took an early and decided stand, a question which is forcing itself every day more insistently on the attention of the Americanican nation—the question of the avenues of commerce by land and water. What I have now particularly in mind is the improvement and development of both inland and seaboard waterways."

Major Veale responded in an appropriate manner to the toast "Washington," in which he outlined the salient features in the character of the Father of his Country.

The president of the Society calls attention to the importance of well-defined plans for patriotic work such as would attract general attention, and thereby increase the growth and efficiency of the societies.

Retiring President George Franklin Weston in his address said:

"Our mission should be to plan a campaign of education along civic lines for the foreigners who come to our shores. Last year 1,328,000 immigrants came to this country, more than enough to make five cities the size of greater Providence. It sometimes seems remarkable that there is enough of the old Yankee stock left to assimilate this yearly influx. No greater work could be undertaken as the Society's own than that of making immigrants good citizens. See to it that no unworthy traditions attach themselves to our body."

The president read as a part of his address the pamphlet prepared and distributed by the National Society, containing information for immigrants.

The report of the secretary, Christopher Rhodes, showed the admission of 14 new members during the year and the loss of 16, making a net loss of 2 and a present membership of 291.

At the annual dinner on the same date the speakers were Edwin Aylesworth Burlingame, historian of the Society; Hon. Patrick J. Mc-Carthy, Mayor of Providence; Hon. Carroll D. Wright, William Chace Greene, poet of the Society, and W. H. P. Faunce, president of Brown University.

The topic of Mr. Wright's address was "The Public Conscience," in which he pointed out that a close study of the actual conditions of the past and of the present day warrants the assertion that crime has not increased in nearly as great a proportion as the population, and that the character of the American people is not now so debased as would appear from many public statements.

Mayor McCarthy said:

"The Sons of the American Revolution and all citizens have a rich heritage to guard and cherish. Good government alone will perpetuate our Republic, good government is the best system of politics and policy, and good government is possible only with honesty, patriotism, and a high sense of public duty actuating the men elected to national, State, and municipal office."

President Faunce, of Brown University, contrasted the characteristics of Washington and Lincoln, describing them as men utterly unlike, yet to both of which types this country offered a full career.

"It is one of our first duties," he said, "to keep the way open from the very bottom of the ladder to the top for every American boy that is born. America asks of every man, not where he comes from, but where he is going to.

"The real question before us is whether we can preserve the splendid initiative of our forefathers and at the same time enter into the corporate effort and responsibility that the conditions of the present day require. Every man is today a member of the whole body we call our common country."

The Society has been particularly active in the distribution of the leaflets on "Information for Immigrants" among the many foreigners in the factory cities and towns of the State.

OFFICIAL NOTICES.

The Executive Committee calls the special attention of State Societies, Chapters, and members to the importance of increasing the membership of the Society.

While the numerical growth during the last year has been most gratifying, the fact remains that our Society should be at least four times as great as at present. Without a large increase, the accomplishment of the patriotic purposes of our Society, and the effective carrying on of the work already begun, will be seriously hampered and delayed.

State Societies, Chapters, and members are therefore urged to continue, and if possible increase their efforts to add to the membership of the Society.

The Executive Committee announces that through the generosity of a member of the Society, a full-size gold insignia of the Society is offered to the State Society which, during the year ending April 30, 1909, shall, in proportion to its numerical size, enroll as members the largest number of sons of present members.

The "traveling banner," presented to the National Society by the Colorado Society, will be awarded at the next Annual Congress to the State Society of one hundred members or more, that shows the largest percentage of increase in members during the year ending April 30, 1909.

The twentieth annual Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution, will be held in the city of Baltimore, April 30 and May 1, 1909.

PROCEEDINGS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, APRIL 29, 1908.

A meeting of the Executive Committee, duly called by order of the President General, was held at the Hotel Iroquois, Buffalo, N. Y., at 8.30 p. m., April 29, 1908. Present: President General McClary, who presided; Mr. Eaton, Commander Moore, Judge Stockbridge, Mr. Marble, and Dr. Batcheller, as members of the Committee; also Ex-President General Greeley, Vice-President General Avery, and Secretary

The minutes of the meeting of February 24, 1908, were approved.

The Committee voted to recommend to the Trustees that the publication by the Government of rolls of soldiers and sailors of the Revolution is not advisable until made complete by securing original rolls now in possession of some of the States and historical societies.

A report from the special Committee on Information for Aliens was recommended to the Board of Trustees for adoption.

Judge Stockbridge presented a report and resolution, prepared at the request of the Executive Committee, providing for a special Committee to consider the development and regulation of local Chapters. The report and resolution were approved for presentation to the Congress.

It was voted to recommend to the new Board of Trustees that the OFFICIAL BULLETIN be mailed direct from Washington to every member entirely at the expense of the National Society.

On motion by Mr. Eaton it was voted that the suggestion be made to the ensuing Board of Trustees to take such action as they may deem most efficient for improving the matter of State reports, as well as the keeping of accounts of the Treasurer and of the Secretary and Registrar of the several State Societies.

The Executive Committee then, at 9.30 o'clock p. m., adjourned. A. HOWARD CLARK, Secretary General.

PROCEEDINGS OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES, APRIL 30, 1908.

A meeting of the Board, duly called by order of the President General, was held at the Hotel Iroquois, Buffalo, at 9 o'clock a. m., April 30, 1908. Present: President General McClary, who presided, and about twentyfive members of the Board and delegates.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board at Denver, Colo., June 4, 1907, were approved.

The action of the Executive Committee at its meetings in New York on October 1, 1907, and February 24, 1908, was ratified and confirmed.

The recommendations of the Executive Committee at its meeting in Buffalo, April 29, 1908, concerning the work of the Committee on Information for Aliens, the development and regulation of local Chapters, the general distribution of the Official Bulletin, and the standardization of State reports, were approved.

Acting upon a petition of twenty-two members of the Colorado Society resident in Wyoming, asking that the Wyoming Society, organized by these members, be granted a charter and admitted to the National Society, the Board voted that a charter be granted under the provisions of Art. IV, Sec. 2 of the Constitution. It was ordered that a telegram be sent to the temporary Secretary of the new Society announcing the granting of the charter and expressing the greetings of the National

The thanks of the Board were voted to the Colorado Society, and particularly to Dr. Clarkson N. Guyer and others of the Colorado Committee for their efficient work in forming the Wyoming Society.

It was voted that in the National Year Book for 1908 there be published the names of all actual sons of soldiers of the American Revolution who have been members of this Society, to be arranged alphabetically by State Societies.

A paper received from ex-President General Breckinridge on patriotic instruction, was received and referred to the new Executive Committee.

It was voted that Wm. A. De Caindry, of Washington, D. C., represent this Society on the Board of Trustees of the Alexander Hamilton

A communication presented by Mr. Ames, of the California Society, concerning methods of transfer between State Societies, was referred to The Parameter of the North Parameter of the Parameter o

The Board then, at 9.55 o'clock, adjourned.

Abstract of Proceedings of Buffalo Congress.

The Nineteenth Annual Congress was called to order in regular session at the Hotel Iroquois by President General McClary at 10 a. m., April 30, 1908.

In the absence of Chaplain General Randall, prayer was offered by ex-Chaplain General R. W. Clark, of Michigan.

Addresses of welcome were made by Mayor J. N. Adam, of Buffalo, who was introduced by Vice-President General Avery, President of the Buffalo Chapter, and by Hamilton Ward, Vice-President of the Buffalo Chapter. President General McClary responded on behalf of the National Society.

General Clinton L. Riggs, in behalf of the Maryland Society, presented to the President General a gavel made from the hulk of the "Peggy Stewart," a tea-ship burned in Chesapeake Bay, October 19, 1774.

The President General delivered the annual address on the condition and needs of the Society. The present actual membership was annunced as 11,493, 854 new members having been enrolled since June 1, been organized in Wyoming. The Tennessee Society has been re-

organized, through a visit of two members of the Executive Committee to Nashville. Attention was called to the advantage of increasing the number of local Chapters and the desirability of making the Chapter plan more uniform than at present.

Mr. Vandercock, Chairman of the Credential Committee, reported 160 members of the Congress in attendance, including President General McClary, Vice-Presidents General Avery, Ames, and Guyer, Secretary General Clark, Treasurer General Secor, ex-Presidents General Greeley, Warfield, and Pugsley, and delegates as follows: Alabama, 1; California, 1; Colorado, 2; Connecticut, 15; Delaware, 1; District of Columbia, 9; Florida, 1; Illinois, 9; Indiana, 1; Iowa, 1; Maine, 4; Maryland, 8; Massachusetts, 15; Michigan, 8; Missouri, 2; Nebraska, 1; New Hampshire, 1; New Jersey, 7; New York, 26; Ohio, 12; Oklahoma, 1; Oregon, 1; Pennsylvania, 12; Rhode Island, 2; Vermont, 6; Virginia, 1; Wisconsin, 2.

The Secretary General read the report of the Board of Trustees, reviewing the work of the year.

A tribute to the memory of the late Vice-President General William Hamilton Bayly, adopted by the Executive Committee October 1, 1907, was adopted by the Congress.

The Congress considered a resolution, offered at the Denver Congress, concerning the printing of muster rolls and information as to persons who gave service in the Revolutionary War, and it was voted that the matter be referred to the Board of Trustees, to be elected at this Congress, with instructions to them to take such action as may, in their judgment, be necessary to bring to the attention of the various State, municipal, and other authorities, the desirability of placing at the disposal of the War Department at an early date all records of such service as may be preserved in those States, and thus facilitate their publication by the Federal Government.

A report to the Executive Committee on the work accomplished by the Committee on Information for Aliens (John H. Moore, Charles Lyman, and A. Howard Clark), in the printing and providing for the distribution of one million copies of a leaflet on "The United States: Information for Immigrants" in thirteen different languages, and suggesting that a second pamphlet, on naturalization, be prepared during the present year, was approved by the Congress, and was referred to the new Executive Committee for action thereunder.

The Committee reported that the leaflet on "The United States" was approved by the U. S. Department of Commerce and Labor for publication as one of the bulletins of the Division of Information to be dis-

tributed among newly admitted aliens and others in conformity with section 40 of the Act approved February 20, 1907.

The distribution of the leaflet is being made wherever it is thought it will do good and applications for it have been received from all parts of the country.

Your Committee was appointed at the psychological moment. The National Society having increased its dues to 50 cents per capita, had funds in its treasury, and by the act of February 20, 1907, the Government was in a position to be of great assistance. Your Executive Committee appreciating the seriousness of the problem confronting it, appropriated over 60 per cent of its annual revenue towards this work. After one year's experience your Committee is of the opinion that it would be wise and patriotic to extend the work by a further publication for the information of aliens in the form of a leaflet explaining "How to Become Citizens, What is Required, Rights and Duties." We most earnestly recommend the publication of such a leaflet, and that it be translated and issued in as many foreign languages as the present one.

The Sons of the American Revolution are to be congratulated upon

having taken up this great and patriotic work.

According to the best authorities we have today in our country about 40 million people who are descendants of the 3,800,000 who lived here at the close of the American Revolution. With over a million and a half aliens arriving on our shores last year, and with the majority of the remaining 45 millions of our population foreigners by birth or parentage, it would appear to your Committee that the greatest work to be performed by a patriotic society is to educate the alien and endeavor to instil into him the high ideals for which patriotism stands. Our forefathers left us a priceless heritage. It is our duty to preserve it by every means in our power and to turn it over to our children and grandchildren in stainless condition. We have as great if not a greater duty to perform today than they had in their time. It rests with us as the great patriotic Society of this country to take up the burden and solve some of the many problems that are assailing us on every side.

While your Committee approves most heartily of the preamble of the Constitution of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, we believe most firmly that the greatest duty of all is the education and assimilation of the alien, thereby preserving the ideals and traditions of the past, so that when we have completed our work and reached our three-score years and ten we can turn the work over to our children in as good, if not better, condition than when we took up the burden as sons of those who had fought to make possible this great

country of ours.

The following resolution, prepared by Judge Stockbridge at the request of the Executive Committee and submitted to the Congress with favorable recommendation, was adopted:

Resolved, That the President General be authorized to appoint a Committee of three, to communicate with the several State Societies as to the practicability of a general regulation governing the establishment of local Chapters, subsidiary to the State Societies, which said Committee shall report to the Executive Committee of this Society its conclusion, and with the approval of the Executive Committee, said special Committee shall prepare a plan for such general regulation of local Chapters in the form of an amendment to either the Constitution or By-Laws. But no such plan shall become operative or obligatory until it shall have received the approval of a Congress of this Society.

Dr. Moses Greeley Parker, of Massachusetts; Frank B. Steele, of New York, and Isaac F. Mack, of Ohio, were subsequently appointed a Committee on Chapters under the foregoing resolution.

Upon recommendation of the Trustees it was ordered that the attention of State Societies be called to the importance of a strict compliance with Art. IV, Sec. 5, of the Constitution, providing for the transfer of members between State Societies.

It was ordered that the names and ancestor's service of all actual sons of soldiers who have been enrolled in the Society be published in the Year Book for 1908.

The Congress considered a report from the Board of Trustees concerning the Official Bulletin, and it was voted to recommend to the New Board of Trustees to send the BULLETIN to every member direct from Washington, entirely at the expense of the National Society.

The Secretary General announced action of the Trustees in regard to the standardization of State Society reports.

Announcement was made that a charter had been this day granted by the Board of Trustees to the Wyoming Society. The action of the Board was ratified and greetings of the National Society were ordered to be telegraphed to the Secretary of the new Society.

Treasurer General Secor read his annual report and it was referred to the Auditing Committee, Waldo Pettengill, of Maine; W. A. De Caindry, of District of Columbia, and Mr. Sherwood, of Connecticut. The report showed cash on hand July 27, 1907, \$9,499.25; receipts, \$6,347.32; total, \$15,846.57. Disbursements, \$7,539.34; cash on hand April 24, 1907, \$8,307.23. The Auditing Committee subsequently reported that the accounts were found correct, and recommended certain changes in keeping the accounts, which were referred to the Executive Committee for consideration.

The Secretary General read his annual report, reviewing the patriotic work accomplished by the National Society and the several State Societies. Attention was called to the fact that the United States Government now furnishes white marble headstones free of charge for marking the graves of soldiers or sailors of the Revolution or other wars. Information concerning these headstones may be obtained from the Quartermaster General, U. S. Army, Washington, D. C. The report was ordered to be printed.

The annual report of the Registrar General was read and ordered to be printed. The report showed that the total enrolment since 1889 has been 19,205 members and the present membership 11,493. There were added 854 members since the last Congress. The gradual net decrease in 1906 and 1907 has changed to net increase of 375 members during the last year. A thorough index of data concerning the services and families of the 60,000 pensioners of the Revolution is being compiled through the efforts and influence of this Society, and it is expected that in about a year this valuable material will be ready for publication.

Major Wm. Frye Tebbetts, Chairman of the Committee on Organization, made a report showing work done in Georgia, Mississippi, North Carolina, and South Carolina toward the formation of Societies in those States. Dr. Guyer, of the same Committee, reported on work done in New Mexico, and on the organization of the new Society of 22 members in Wyoming. He also reported the formation of a flourishing local Chapter at Colorado Springs. The reports were ordered to be filed and printed.

Dr. Rufus W. Clark, Chairman of the Committee on Education, read a report on the work accomplished by that Committee, and recommended the appropriations of twenty-five dollars for office expenses and one hundred dollars for printing during the new year. The report and recommendations were adopted by the Congress.

The Congress then, at 1 o'clock p. m., took a recess till 10 o'clock a. m., May 1, 1908.

At 10 o'clock a. m., May 1, the Congress re-convened at the Hotel Iroquois.

The first order of business was the presentation and award of the "Traveling Banner."

The Congress adopted the report of the Committee awarding the banner to the Iowa Society, the Colorado Society, which otherwise would have been entitled to the prize, having withdrawn from competition.

The banner was then formally presented to the National Society by Mr. Tuttle, of the Colorado Society, and accepted by the President General, who thereupon transferred it to the custody of Mr. Secor and Mr. Wentworth, of Iowa, who expressed the thanks of the Iowa Society.

A report from the Flag Committee was submitted in print and it was voted that the Society, through its President General, send a suitable expression of its sentiments with relation to the measures now pending before the U. S. Senate and House of Representatives to prevent and punish the desecration, mutilation, or improper use of the flag of the United States of America. [A telegram was read at the banquet at Buffalo announcing that the Senate Committee had agreed to report a

bill, and on May 20, 1908, the bill, with amendments, was passed by the Senate and sent to the House of Representatives.]

Mr. A. Howard Clark, Chairman of the Press Committee, made a verbal report, referring to press notices of the work of the Society, particularly in regard to the leaflet on information for immigrants. The report was ordered to be printed.

The Committee on National Parks presented a printed report, signed by W. V. Cox, Chairman, which was ordered to be published in the proceedings of the Congress. The report told of the efforts now in progress to establish a park in the historic Highlands of the Hudson River, and reservations in other regions.

Mr. Zebina Moses, of the Committee on Pension Rolls, reported on the progress made in compiling data from the Pension Office records.

Dr. Moses G. Parker presented the report of the Publication Committee, which was accepted. The recommendations of the Committee concerning the general distribution of the Official Bulletin having been adopted at the previous day's session of the Congress, were referred to the Board of Trustees and certain recommendations concerning the National Year Book were likewise referred to the Board.

Commander Moore, for the Committee on Naval Records, made a report showing steps taken to accomplish measures recommended by the last Congress toward the organization of an office of Naval Records in the Navy Department.

Admiral Baird, of the District of Columbia, reported for the Committee on National Anthem, that no effort had been made during the year to displace the "Star Spangled Banner."

The Secretary General presented the annual reports of the State Societies, and read summaries thereof. The reports were ordered printed in the National Year Book.

The Congress then listened to delegates from Vermont and Maryland, who offered the hospitality of Burlington and Baltimore for the meeting of the annual Congress of 1909, and invitations for other years were presented by the California Society, the Oklahoma Society, the Alabama Society, and others. Under Art. VII, Sec. 1, of the Constitution, the invitations were referred to the Board of Trustees for decision thereon.

The Secretary General presented a request from the U. S. Census Bureau, desiring that the attention of the Congress be called to the publication by the Bureau of the Census at Washington, giving the names of 400,000 heads of families as enrolled by the United States Census of 1790. These records were saved from proposed destruction largely through prompt action taken by the Congress of this Society in Washington in 1902. It was ordered that the subject be mentioned in the

next Official Bulletin. These schedules are printed as quarto pamphlets by States, and are sold only by the Director of the Census at one dollar a part.

The thanks of the Congress were extended to Compatriot Henry K. Bush-Brown for an invitation to members of the Society to attend the dedication of an equestrian statue of General Anthony Wayne at 1 o'clock p. m., June 20, at Valley Forge. The statue was made by Mr. Bush-Brown for the State of Pennsylvania.

The Congress then proceeded to the election of general officers and by unanimous vote in each case the ballot of the Congress was cast for the following candidates, and they were declared elected:

President General, Henry Stockbridge; Vice-Presidents General. George Williams Bates, William James Van Patten, John R. Webster, Dr. Clarkson N. Guyer, George Rowland Howe; Secretary General and Registrar General, A. Howard Clark; Treasurer General, Willard Secor: Historian General, Walter Kendall Watkins; Chaplain General, Frank Oliver Hall.

The order of seniority of the Vice-Presidents General was determined by lot as required by the Constitution.

The Secretary General announced the names of nominees by State Societies for representatives on the Board of Trustees, and by unanimous vote the Secretary General was directed to cast the ballot of the Congress for the nominees named and for the President of each of the State Societies that had failed to make nomination, as required by Sec. 4 of the Act of Incorporation and Art. V PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, MAY I, 1908.

A meeting of the new Board of Trustees, elected by the Annual Congress May 1, 1908, duly called by the President General, was held at 3 o'clock p. m., May 1, 1908, at the Hotel Iroquois, Buffalo, N. Y. Present: President General Henry Stockbridge, who presided, and about twenty members of the Board.

The following Executive Committee, nominated by the President General, under the provision of Art. V, Sec. 4, of the Constitution, was approved and confirmed by the Board:

It was voted that the Secretary General call the attention of State Societies to the importance of specific observance of the provisions of Art. IV, Sec. 5, of the Constitution, governing the transfer of members from one State Society to another.

It was voted that to the Executive Committee be referred the standardizing of State Society reports and of financial routine.

The Secretary General reported on the present condition of the Official Bulletin, and the following resolutions were thereupon adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary General be and is hereby authorized to publish the Official Bulletin of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, at the expense of said Society, to be issued from his office in Washington, D. C., four times a year in the months of May, October, December, and March: and

Resolved further, That in order to meet the expense of printing such publication and making distribution thereof by mail to each member of the Society during the year ending April 30, 1900, that the sum of eighteen hundred dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be and it is hereby appropriated out of the amount received by the Treasurer General from the annual membership dues, or any other fund in the hands of the Treasurer General not otherwise appropriated.

It was voted the condition of the South Dakota Society be referred to the Organization Committee, with the request that prompt action be taken to revive that Society to full strength.

It was voted that the Secretary General is hereby authorized to condense the genealogical records of new members in the Official Bulletin, but that the pedigrees be given in full in the National Year Book as heretofore.

It was voted that the edition of the National Year Book for 1908 be limited to 750 copies, to be mailed by the Secretary General to the general officers, ex-Presidents General, Trustees, delegates to the Con-

gress, members of National Committees, officers of State Societies, and the Presidents of local Chapters.

The Board considered invitations from the Maryland Society and the Vermont Society for the meeting of the Congress of 1909, and it was voted that the decision as to place of meeting be left to the Executive Committee.

It was voted that the question of continuing the special committees of the past year be referred to the Executive Committee.

It was voted that the appointment of a Committee of seven in regard to citizenship work and the resolution in reference thereto, offered in the Congress by Mr. Hale, be referred to the Executive Committee.

It was voted that the Executive Committee be empowered to act on such matters referred to the Board of Trustees by the Congress, or such new business as in the judgment of the President General may not require the action of a meeting of the Board.

The meeting then, at 4.30 o'clock, adjourned.

PROCEEDINGS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, MAY 2, 1908.

A meeting of the Executive Committee, duly called by the President General, was held at the Hotel Iroquois, Buffalo, at 5.30 p. m., May 2, 1908. Present: President General Stockbridge, who presided, Mr. McClary, of Illinois; Mr. Marble, of New York; Commander Moore, of the District of Columbia; Dr. Parker, of Massachusetts, and Secretary General Clark.

The President General announced that a member of the Society had offered a gold badge of the Society to be awarded at the next Annual Congress to the State Society showing the largest number of sons of members added to its rolls during the year. The offer was unanimously accepted and the President General was authorized to extend the thanks of the Executive Committee to the generous donor. The Secretary General was instructed to make announcement of this gift in the Offical Bulletin, and that special notice thereof be sent to the Secretary of each State Society.

It was voted that the several Standing and Special Committees be continued as during the last year, the personnel to be made up by the President General.

It was voted that the special Committee on Information for Aliens be continued. The draft of a second circular on "Information for Aliens

Concerning the United States; How to Become Citizens; What is Required; Rights and Duties," prepared by Judge Stockbridge, was adopted for translation and publication in as many languages as the Committee may deem advisable.

On motion by Commander Moore, an appropriation of two thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, was voted for the translation and publication of the new leaflet on Naturalization.

On motion by Mr. McClary, one thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, was voted to be expended under direction of the President General, for organization purposes during the ensuing year.

On motion by Mr. Marble, it was voted that the Secretary General be authorized to prepare such blanks as may be necessary to insure proper reports from State Societies to the Secretary General and Registrar General.

On motion by Mr. McClary, it was voted that the Secretary General, the Treasurer General, and Commander Moore be authorized to provide voucher forms or other blanks for receipts as well as disbursements by the Treasurer General.

The Trustees having referred to the Executive Committee the decision as to place of next meeting of the Annual Congress, the invitations from the Maryland and Vermont Societies were carefully considered, and on motion by Mr. McClary, seconded by Commander Moore, it was unanimously voted that the invitation of the Maryland Society be accepted, and that the Congress of 1909 be held at the City of Baltimore.

On motion by the Secretary General it was voted that the President General be empowered to act for the Executive Committee in matters not already acted upon that may need attention after the full proceedings of the Annual Congress, and of the Trustee's meeting on May I, and the meeting of the Executive Committee have been written up.

On motion by Commander Moore, an appropriation of five hundred dollars was voted toward the expenses of the Baltimore Congress.

It was voted that Commander Moore, of the Executive Committee, and President George R. Gaither and General Clinton L. Riggs, of the Maryland Society, be the National Committee of Arrangements in charge of the Baltimore Congress.

On motion by Commander Moore, the President General was authorized to communicate with associations of musicians and music publishers urging that in the medleys so frequently played by orchestras and bands neither the "Star Spangled Banner" nor any part of it should be included.

The President General at once acted under the foregoing authority and at a meeting of the American Federation of Musicians, recently held in St. Louis, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the leaders of all bands and orchestras, who are members of the American Federation of Musicians, are requested to omit from all medleys played by bands or orchestras under their direction "The Star Spangled Banner," or strains taken from it, and to encourage, on all appropriate occasions, the rendering of the national anthem as a separate and distinct feature.]

It was voted that the necessary expenses and the salary of the Secretary General and Registrar General be paid as during the past year.

There being no further business the Committee then, at 7 o'clock p. m., adjourned.

SOCIAL FEATURES OF THE BUFFALO CONGRESS.

An automobile ride around Buffalo, arranged for the afternoon of April 30, was prevented by snow and rain, invitations to a theater and to the Buffalo clubs being substituted therefor.

On the evening of April 30 the Congress and ladies were entertained at the home of Vice-President General and Mrs. Avery.

On Friday afternoon, from 3 to 6 o'clock, Mrs. John Miller Horton, Regent of the Buffalo Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, gave a reception at her home to the Buffalo members and to the officers and delegates of the National Society.

On Friday evening there was a banquet at the Hotel Iroquois for delegates and members of the Buffalo Chapter. Hamilton Ward, Vice-President of the Buffalo Chapter, acted as toastmaster. Addresses were made by Rev. Dr. Raymond, Mr. H. P. Bissell, and George D. Emerson, of Buffalo; by Cornelius A. Pugsley, of New York; Edwin Warfield, of Maryland; Joseph F. Tuttle, of Colorado; Dr. Moses G. Parker, of Massachusetts; retiring President General McClary, and President General Stockbridge.

Rev. Dr. Raymond spoke on "Patriotism," and the duty incumbent on every good citizen to strive for the education and uplifting of the thousands of aliens who come to America's shores and who have yet to learn the true spirit of American institutions. He urged the need of instruction in American history-instruction that instructs.

"This most important subject," said Dr. Raymond, "has not been taught yet as it should be taught in the schools, in the streets, and among all its citizens—America for Americans. We should keep in the minds of our people the real meaning of their inheritance, and that, I take it, is a large part of the work of this organization. The nation that forgets to honor its heroes will soon forget to be heroic. Honor is God's best gift to man. This nation has grown through sublime faith in God."

On Saturday, at 10 o'clock, delegates and ladies were the guests of the Buffalo Chapter on a trip to Niagara Falls and around the Great Gorge. A luncheon was served by the National Food Company at their establishment in the city of Niagara Falls.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S LETTER TO COMPATRIOTS.

BALTIMORE, October 7, 1908.

COMPATRIOTS: A year ago your President General addressed you a letter telling briefly of the work then in contemplation by the National Society, and the Society's most urgent needs.

The months since then have been busy ones for your officers and committees; the work then outlined to be done among immigrants has been actively prosecuted; a new circular has been issued for the benefit of those contemplating acquiring citizenship by naturalization; legislation for the better protection of the national flag has been advanced, and greater respect for the national anthem has been secured.

The apparent slow, but steady, decline in our membership which had been observed for several years has not only been checked, but there is now a steady advance. This appeared in the number of members reported by the State Societies at the Congress in Buffalo; and the registration of new members admitted from May I to October I is numerically greater than during the corresponding period last year. Notwithstanding this favorable turn, our membership is still far below what it should be. Individual work on the part of each of our members still remains our most urgent need. The next three months should be the most favorable portion of the year for this work. Will you not individually and collectively, do your utmost?

Our Society has passed the experimental stage of its existence; it has demonstrated that it has a reason for its being; it has found that there is work for it to do; and it is doing that work as far as its means permit. The Sons of the American Revolution has won and been accorded recognition as a national institution, not as an historical or genealogical association, but as a patriotic organization. The personnel of the Society forms a roll of which any may well be proud, including two Presidents of the United States, cabinet officers, men renowned in diplomacy, high officials in large number in both the army and navy, statesmen, and men prominent in professional and mercantile life throughout the length and breadth of our land.

The opportunities for effective patriotic work are opening on every hand, but we are held back by the lack of a membership of adequate proportions. It lies with each one of you to remove this bar to our progress. Give us more than your good wishes; give us your active, personal interest and aid.

OFFICIAL NOTICES.

The Executive Committee announces that through the generosity of a member of the Society, a full-sized gold insignia of the Society is offered to the State Society which, during the year ending April 30, 1909, shall, in proportion to its numerical size, enroll as members the largest number of sons of present members.

The "Traveling Banner," presented to the National Society by the Colorado Society, will be awarded at the next annual Congress to the State Society of one hundred members or more, that shows the largest percentage of increase in members during the year ending April 30, 1909.

The twentieth annual Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution, will be held in the City of Baltimore, April 30, and May 1, 1909.

There will shortly be issued to the Secretaries of State Societies blanks calling for information as to the work accomplished by each Society since its organization. Secretaries of State Societies are requested to have these reports made as full and returned as promptly as possible.

The National Year Book is nearly completed and will soon be mailed, as ordered by the Buffalo Congress and the Executive Committee, to the General Officers, Trustees, National Committees, officers of State Societies, and Delegates to the Congress. There will be no distribution to States in bulk as heretofore. The present Year Book includes the names and records of 186 actual sons of patriots of the Revolution who have been registered since April 30, 1889.

The United States Government now furnishes white marble headstones for marking the graves of soldiers or sailors of the Revolution and other wars; delivered at the nearest railroad station free of charge. Information concerning these headstones and inscriptions thereon, and the nature of proofs of service required, may be obtained by correspondence with the Quartermaster General, U. S. Army, Washington, D. C.

State Societies, Chapters and individual members are urged to continue and increase their efforts to add to the membership of the Society.

PROCEEDINGS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, SEPTEMBER 26, 1908.

A meeting of the Executive Committee, duly called by order of the President General, was held at the Hotel Belmont, New York City, at 1.30 p. m., September 26, 1908.

Present: President General Stockbridge who presided, Mr. McClary, Mr. Beardsley, Commander Moore, Dr. Parker, Mr. Richardson, and the Secretary General. Regrets were received from Mr. Marble, who was unable to attend.

The minutes of the meeting held May 2 in Buffalo, printed in the Official Bulletin for May, 1908, were approved.

The President General, acting under authority granted by the Executive Committee at its meeting of May 2, reported that he had communicated with the American Federation of Musicians and other organizations of musicians and with about fifty publishers of music throughout the country urging them to omit from all medleys played by bands or orchestras, "The Star Spangled Banner" or strains taken from it, and to encourage on all appropriate occasions, the rendering

of the national anthem as a separate and distinct feature. Favorable replies were being received from several publishers. The American Federation of Musicians at its convention in St. Louis, May 11-16, 1908, adopted a resolution requesting the leaders of all bands and orchestras to comply with this suggestion. The Federation also adopted a resolution requesting the Sons of the American Revolution to use all patriotic means to have restored to common use, especially in text books of the public schools, the third stanza of the Star Spangled Banner (beginning "And where is that band," etc., etc.,) and to preserve intact the national anthem as it was written by Francis Scott Kev.

On motion the Committee voted that expression of appreciation of the Federation's action be communicated to that organization.

A letter was received from Thomas R. Shipp, Secretary of the National Conservation Commission, requesting that the proper officer be designated to receive material with reference to the conservation of the country's natural resources, in which the Sons of the American Revolution might be interested. Secretary General Clark was designated to receive communications from this Commission.

Acting on a letter from a compatriot concerning the proper location of statues of John Paul Jones and John Barry, in the city of Washington, it was voted that the Executive Committee express to the Secretary of War the hope that the statues be not placed in Franklin Square, but that a more eligible or suitable site be selected such as the Naval Observatory circle.

Reports were received from Dr. Guyer, Chairman of the Committee on Organization in the West and Major Tebbetts, Chairman of the Committee on Organization in the South, showing progress in the formation of new societies in New Mexico, North Dakota, Mississippi, Georgia, and South Carolina. Acceptable papers have been filed in considerable number by applicants in these States.

The Secretary General announced that three hundred new members had been registered since May I, showing an increase over the registration during the same period last year.

Dr. Parker, chairman, reported for the Committee on Local Chapters, that information was being gathered as to the present condition of the Chapters in the several States. In view of the importance of this work it was voted that Mr. McClary and Commander Moore be added to this committee, and the Committee was requested to present definite recommendations, if possible, for consideration at the next meeting of the Executive Committee.

The President General submitted for consideration a series of questions to be sent to State Societies, calling for information as to work

accomplished by them since their organization. The form of questions was adopted and ordered to be printed and communicated to State Secretaries.

Commander Moore, Chairman of the Committee on Information for Aliens, reported that leaflet number two, entitled Naturalization of Aliens in the United States, telling in simple language, How to Become Citizens, What is Required, and Rights and Duties, had been printed in English in an edition of fifteen thousand copies. Arrangements were being made for its translation into various languages and its general distribution.

It was voted that mention be made in the next Official Bulletin of leaflets numbers one and two on information for aliens and the methods of their distribution.

The Secretary General reported that in compliance with direction of the Buffalo Congress, standard blank forms for State Society reports had been prepared and issued and that voucher blanks had been distributed to State Treasurers for use in payment of accounts to the National Society.

It was voted that the printing of official notices be continued in future numbers of the Official Bulletin.

The President General was requested to prepare a special letter to members of the Society for publication in the October issue of the Official Bulletin.

The Secretary General reported that, under authority granted by the Buffalo Congress, the Official Bulletin for May had been distributed to all members of the Society by mail direct from Washington, and that future numbers would be distributed in the same manner without expense to State Societies or to members.

An appropriation not to exceed one hundred dollars was voted for the use of the Flag Committee, General Vincent, chairman, for printing and other necessary expenses. It was announced that the Flag Committee would use every effort to secure the enactment by the House of Representatives, of Senate Bill 565, passed May 20, 1908, to prevent and punish the desecration, mutilation, or improper use of the flag of the United States of America.

The Committee then, at 6.30 o'clock, adjourned.

INFORMATION FOR ALIENS.

The Committee on Information for Aliens has, after many difficulties, had translated the leaflet, "Information for Immigrants Concerning the

United States," into the following languages: Italian, Polish, Yiddish, Magyar, Slovinian, Slovak, Croatian, Swedish, Greek, Bohemian, German, Norwegian-Danish and Lithuanian, and they are now ready for distribution.

Many copies in Italian and Polish have been distributed and requests for copies in the other languages have commenced to come in. The pamphlet has been adopted in several of our large cities for use in their night schools, and could be used to advantage in all public night schools where so many foreigners are being educated.

Leaflet No. 2, "Naturalization of Aliens, How to Become Citizens, What is Required, Rights and Duties," has been printed in English and submitted to the U. S. Department of Commerce and Labor for its approval and adoption. A few thousand copies have been distributed. It is hoped that the Department will shortly adopt it, when it will be translated into the same languages as No. I leaflet.

It is earnestly requested that compatriots will interest themselves in the distribution of these leaflets where they will do the most good. Applications for copies to Commander John H. Moore, U. S. N., 1755 P Street, Washington, D. C., will receive prompt attention. There is no charge whatever for furnishing or delivering these leaflets.

DOINGS OF STATE SOCIETIES.

THE CALIFORNIA SOCIETY on September 3 celebrated the 125th anniversary of the signing of the Treaty of Paris by holding a banquet at the Hotel St. Francis, San Francisco, when addresses were delivered by U. S. Senator George C. Perkins on "The Navy in Time of Peace." and Rev. William Rader on "Conservation of the World's Peace."

A local Chapter was organized at Los Angeles on May 18. Col. A. S. Hubbard was present from San Francisco as the representative of the State Society. As the city and county has a population of four hundred thousand, much is expected of this new local organization.

The Society has issued a pamphlet containing the Constitution, Byraws, and roster of members corrected to May II, 1908, and information for applicants and new members.

THE COLORADO SOCIETY has enrolled 36 new members since the Ruffalo Congress. A number of these, resident in New Mexico, will, at an early day, organize a new State Society. At Greeley, Colo., an enthusiastic Chapter is being formed.

On June 13 the Society presented to the City of Denver a United States flag for use on the new auditorium, an address on "The Flag" being delivered on that occasion by Compatriot J. F. Tuttle, Jr.

In a circular issued to Colorado members, calling upon them to do their utmost to secure new members, President Howard T. Vaille says:

"You are proud of the part which your ancestor or ancestors took in fighting for liberty, and the principles for which they hazarded their lives and property are dear to you. The Society of the Sons of the American Revolution is a patriotic organization. It has justified its existence in the past, and we intend that it shall in the future. There is a growing work for us to do, by reason of the large foreign immigration, which, at the rate of 1,300,000 per annum, is coming to America, thousands of the immigrants finding their way to Colorado. These new arrivals, for the most part, will make splendid citizens-in fact, many of them are more American in spirit today than some of our own citizens. The growth of anarchy and of socialism and the increasing disregard of law must be checked by the inculcating of true patriotism. We believe that those of us who have studied historical subjects in our Society meetings have become more intelligent, and, consequently, more patriotic Americans. Our Society, by arousing intelligent patriotism in its own members, makes its members better exponents of patriotism to others. We are going to carry on our work in the future along the same lines as in the past, namely, by the observance of national holidays, by the presentation of flags to public schools, by being ready to express ourselves as a Society in favor of any movement which tends to the welfare of our country, and in any other way which presents itself."

OFFICIAL BULLETIN

THE CONNECTICUT SOCIETY ON September 3 held a field day, the first of its kind, at Savin Rock near New Haven. A dinner at the Hotel St. Lawrence, a feature of the day, was presided over by Lewis B. Curtis, President of the Society. The speakers included Governor R. S. Woodruff; Gen. George H. Ford, who delivered an historical address on the British raid on New Haven; Senator Stiles Judson, Mayor Edward W. Hooker, ex-Treasurer General Birdseye, and Col. N. G. Osborn. In his address Senator Judson said:

"We are living in an era of large movements, and matters of sentiment are often lost sight of. There is an enormous influx of foreign population to our shores, and these people do not understand or know of our traditions. We may feel a special pride in the Revolutionary heroes, and back of them in the handful of colonists which settled Connecticut. Luminous was the beacon light streaming forth from the New England coast. But today the light is even more effulgent, due to the efforts of these same early settlers.

"Let us apply in our own political careers the spirit which animated our forefathers. Let the rights they handed down to us, which we have allowed to slip from us, be restored. Let us not disgrace our ancestors by apathy. Let us not give to professional politicians the rights our forefathers gave to us. Remember our New England manhood and right will prevail."

The Hawaiian Society on June 17 celebrated the anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill and the thirteenth anniversary of the founding of that Society, by a banquet at the University Club, Honolulu. As guests of the Society were Secretary of the Interior James R. Garfield, on an official visit to the Islands; Governor Frear, Territorial Secretary Mott-Smith, Captain Harber, of the U. S. S. Maine; Captain Veeder, of the U. S. S. Alabama, and Major Dunning, of the Twentieth U. S. Infantry. Toasts to the President, the Army, and the Navy were responded to by Secretary Garfield, Major Dunning, and Captain Harber, and a toast to Our Forefathers by Compatriot Peter Cushman Jones. President Effinger presided and Justice Ballou was toastmaster.

Following the banquet the annual business meeting of the Society was held, at which reports were read and the following officers, all of Honolulu, were elected for the ensuing year:

President, George Robert Carter; Vice-President, Dr. Chas. Bryant Cooper; Secretary, Lyle A. Dickey; Treasurer, Robert James Pratt; Registrar, Hon. Sidney M. Ballou.

THE IOWA SOCIETY, "believing that a careful study of American history is the best preparation for the duties coming with citizenship," has given to the colleges and universities of that State maintaining a department of history, appropriate bronze medals to be awarded each year to the student doing the best work in that department of study. Twelve such medals were awarded at the close of the last educational year to students in as many cities, the medal competed for in the Iowa Agricultural College, at Ames, being won by Vincente Ferriols, a Filipino. This year twenty-five institutions have been given authority to make similar awards.

An enthusiastic letter from E. R. Hutchins, President, is printed in "The Old Continental," published monthly by the Iowa Society in Des Moines, urging every member of the seven chapters now in that State to renewed effort in increasing membership to better further the objects of the Sons of the American Revolution, and to retain the traveling banner won last year. The Chapters and their Presidents are as follows:

The Louisiana Society celebrated the Fourth of July by decorating the tombs of Revolutionary patriots in the Old St. Louis Cemetery at New Orleans. First the assembly call was sounded at the tomb of Miguel Dragon, where Thomas Dabney Dimitry, State Secretary of the Society, and a lineal descendant of the Revolutionary hero before whose tomb he stood, read a brief eulogy recalling the services of Miguel Dragon as sergeant and lieutenant in the army of Galvez, the Spanish Governor of Louisiana. Mention was made of the service rendered by the Spanish officer in the campaign against the British by which they were prevented from going up the Mississippi and capturing the Illinois country. The ceremony of unveiling the emblem of the National Society and the raising of the Spanish and United States flags over the tomb followed. The grave was then covered with flowers, conspicuous among which was a wreath tied with buff, white and blue ribbons, the colors of the old Continentals.

Taps were then sounded and the Society marched to the tomb of Michel Fortier, a captain of artillery in the army of Galvez. Mr. Dimitry read the war record of Captain Fortier, covering his services under the Spanish Governor in Louisiana, Alabama, and Florida. The

records show him to have been an officer of the Orleans Volunteers, and his commission, signed by King Charles III of Spain, is still in the possession of Compatriot Alcee Fortier, who is a lineal descendant of the soldier whose memory was honored. Here also Spanish and United States flags were raised and flowers heaped upon the tomb.

A similar ceremony was held at the tomb of Benedict Francois de Pradelles, third lieutenant in the Regiment Royal des Deux Ponts de France, who served under Count de Rochambeau and earned distinction

at the siege of Yorktown.

The Massachusetts Society, with the coöperation of the Berkshire Bar Association and others, unveiled at Lanesboro, on August 20, a memorial tablet to Jonathan Smith, "whose calm and sensible speech carried the convention in Boston in 1787 for the ratification by the State of the Federal Constitution." A distinguished company of State officials and Berkshire County citizens was present. The idea of a tablet to perpetuate the memory of Jonathan Smith originated with the Berkshire County Chapter of the Massachusetts Society. Acting Governor Eben S. Draper and former Attorney General Herbert Parker were the principal speakers. Mrs. John M. Stevenson, regent of the Peace Party Chapter, D. A. R., also made a brief address.

The following inscription on copper plate was written by President Eliot, of Harvard:

IN MEMORY OF JONATHAN SMITH.

a plain farmer of Lanesboro, who by a speech full of good sense and good feeling carried the Massachusetts convention, September, 1787-February, 1788, by a vote of 187 to 168, in favor of ratifying the Federal Constitution.

". . . I have lived in a part of the country where I have known the worth of good government by the want of it. . . . I have been a member of the convention to form our State constitution, and had learned something of the checks and balances of power; and I found them all here. . . Take things in time, gather fruit when it is ripe. . . . We sowed our seed when we sent men to the Federal convention; now is the harvest; now is the time to reap the fruit of our labor. . . ."

The Malden Chapter of the Massachusetts Society held its ninth annual dinner on May 23. The speakers were Hon. Louis A. Frothingham, ex-Speaker of the Massachusetts House of Representatives; Mayor G. L. Richard, Rev. H. J. Kilbourn, ex-Representative George H. Fall, and Melville C. Freeman, Esq. Frank E. Woodward was elected President, and Walter K. Watkins, Historian General of the National Society, was chosen Secretary. Forty-three members and guests were present.

THE EMPIRE STATE SOCIETY has issued a Year Book of 108 pages containing the annual reports of the Secretary, Treasurer, and Registrar; names of present members, and names of members deceased, resigned, transferred, or dropped during the year; addresses at the eighteenth annual banquet and at meetings on February 18 and April 21; and a sermon presented before the Society on February 23.

THE OHIO SOCIETY has published a "Manual and Membership Roll," with lists of officers and members, an account of the last annual meeting of the Society, April 17, suggestions to applicants for membership, the local Constitution and By-Laws, and other information of interest to members.

The Western Reserve Society of Ohio has likewise printed a small pamphlet containing an historical sketch of the National, Ohio, and Western Reserve Societies, their aims, suggestions to applicants for membership, the local Constitution, a list of members, and interesting data as to troops and events in the Revolutionary War.

THE PENNSYLVANIA SOCIETY has adopted a plan of giving an informal luncheon once a month in Pittsburg. Such luncheons were held in August and September, attended by about fifty members, when informal natriotic speeches were made.

The Rhode Island Society on May 30 held its customary Memorial Day exercises at Hopkins Park, Providence, assisted by pupils of the Branch Avenue Grammar School. The program included the placing of a wreath on the statue of Commodore Esek Hopkins and a flag on his grave. Addresses were delivered by ex-Gov. Charles Warren Lippitt, President of the Rhode Island Society, and by Hon. R. B. Burchard, Speaker of the Rhode Island House of Representatives. An essay on Hopkins's Last Days as Commander, translated into Italian by a pupil of the Classical High School, was read before the large number of foreigners present.

On October 3 President Lippitt delivered an address at the dedication of the soldiers and sailors monument at Warren, R. I., in memory of the patriots of that town who have borne arms in the wars of our country.

THE SOUTH DAKOTA SOCIETY is being reorganized and strengthened through the persistent work of the Committee on Organization in the West. Publicity has been given to the work of the Sons of the American Revolution by a number of newspapers in the State.

The Vermont Society has published a pamphlet containing the Constitution, By-Laws, and Act of Incorporation of the Society and a membership roll revised to August 1, 1908.

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Rosettes and the Society ribbon are furnished direct on order of State Societies by Annin & Co., corner Fulton and William streets, New York City.

BADGES are made by J. E. Caldwell & Co., 902 Chestnut street, Philadelphia, and are sold to members on permits issued by the Registrar General, countersigned by the Registrar or Secretary of a State Society.

CERTIFICATES OF MEMBERSHIP, size 19 by 24 inches, engraved by the American Bank Note Company, and engrossed in the Registrar General's office with member's name and name of Revolutionary ancestor, are issued on order of State Societies at one dollar each. They are signed by the President General, the Secretary and Registrar General, and the President, Secretary, and Registrar of the State Society.

THE MEDAL OF HONOR AND DIPLOMA for service in the War with Spain in 1898 is awarded to new members upon filing with the Secretary General evidence of enlistment in the service of the United States during that war.

OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT GENERAL.

RECOMMENDATIONS IN REGARD TO WEARING INSIGNIA.

In order to secure greater uniformity in wearing of the insignia of the Society, the following suggestions are made, as supplemental to Article XV of the By-Laws:

I.—The rosette should be worn in the left lapel of the coat with ordinary house or street dress, but never in the overcoat. No rosette of any order or Society should be worn at the same time with the insignia. If a compatriot belongs to several orders, selection should be made of one rosette, two should not be worn at the same time.

II.—Insignia should be worn on the left breast, but when the insignia of this Society is used at the same time with those of other orders, it is recommended that the regulations of the United States Government for army officers be observed, which is as follows:

The badges are to be worn on the left breast of the coat, the top of the ribbons forming a horizontal line, the outer end of which shall be from two to four inches (according to the height of the wearer) below the upper line of the shoulder.

III.—Present or past officers who, under Article XV of the By-Laws, are entitled to wear the insignia at the collar, are recommended to so wear it for the dignity of the Society. But this should only be done with a dress suit or dress uniform. In case of a dress suit, the insignia should be drawn up to within an inch of the tie; in case of a uniform it should hang close to the opening of the military collar.

FLAG COMMITTEE.

Gen. Thomas M. Vincent, U. S. A., chairman of the National Flag Committee, has communicated with the Presidents of State Societies, calling attention to the flag bill (S. 565, printed below), which passed the Senate May 20, 1908, and is now pending before the Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives. Societies and individual members are urged to use their influence to secure the passage of this patriotic measure during the present session of Congress. General Vincent's letter, in part, is as follows:

Compatriot: At the meeting of the Executive Committee, National Society Sons of the American Revolution, September 26, 1908, it was recited that the Flag Committee would use every effort to secure the enactment, by the House of Representatives, of the Senate bill 565, which passed the Senate May 20, 1908—to prevent and punish the desecration, mutilation, or improper use of the Flag of the United States of America. * * * The President General was instructed by the National Congress, at the Buffalo meeting, to send a suitable message to the Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives—in charge of the bill before that body. It was believed that the message would be potent in its influence; and it is now the duty of the National Flag Committee, S. A. R., to use its best effort, in order to the speedy passage of Senate bill 565, by the House of Representatives. * * *

I have, in person, placed before the House of Representatives Judiciary Committee, considerable literature on the subject, inclusive of * * * the action of the U. S. Supreme Court, favorable to the constitutionality of Flag legislation, in the case of Halter and Heywood vs. State of Nebraska. The decision, March 4, 1907, was delivered by Mr. Justice Harlan. * * *

Let us continue to labor that the soul of the Flag may not be taken away! * * * Every member should put forth earnest personal effort with Senators and Representatives in Congress—particularly, when acquainted with them—and urge the enactment of a law during the present Congress. * * *

Our membership, of the Sons of the American Revolution, is about 12,000, divided among 42 State Societies, including the District of Columbia, France, and Hawaii. The President General in his last annual report contemplates 25,000 at a date not remote, if State Societies are energetic. Thus there will be along national lines a greatly effective and influential force—national in its organization, scope, and purposes. The most cherished desire, at this time, is to have a pure Flag; and, to that end, the Society has unification and coördination as a whole. * *

On pages 18 and 19 of the Senate, 57th Congress, hearing, will be found the "Regulations of Foreign Countries" prohibiting desecration of their flags.

In patriotism we must not longer stand beneath foreign lands.

Therefore, let it be enacted, by the present Congress of the United States, that the Star Spangled Banner shall not longer be desecrated.

The bill (S. 565) as passed by the Senate reads as follows:

A BILL

To Prevent and Punish the Desecration, Mutilation, or Improper Use of the Flag of the United States of America.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled. That any person who in any manner, for exhibition or display, puts or causes to be placed any inscription, picture, design, device, symbol, name, advertisement, words. characters, marks, or notice whatever upon any flag, standard, color, or ensign of the United States, or ensign evidently purporting to be such flag, standard, color, or ensign, or who in any manner appends, annexes or affixes to any such flag, standard, color, or ensign, any inscription. picture, design, device, symbol, name, advertisement, words, marks, notice, or token, whatever, or who displays or exhibits or causes to be placed or exhibited any flag, standard, color, or ensign of the United States, or flag, standard, color, or ensign evidently purporting to be such flag, standard, color, or ensign, upon which shall in any manner be put, attached, annexed, or affixed any inscription, picture, design, device symbol, name, advertisement, words, marks, notice, or token whatever, or who publicly mutilates, tramples upon, or otherwise defaces or defiles any such flag, standard, color or ensign, whether any such flag, standard, color, or ensign is public or private property, shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars, or imprisoned not more than six months, or both, for each offense: Provided, however. That flags, standards, colors, or ensigns, the property of or used in the service of the United States or any State, Territory, or the District of Columbia, may have inscriptions, names of actions, words, marks, or symbols which are placed thereon pursuant to law or authorized regulations.

Provided further, That this Act shall not apply to banners or flags carried by military or patriotic organizations authorized by law.

COMMITTEE ON INFORMATION FOR ALIENS.

The Committee on Information for Aliens report that since the issue of the October Official Bulletin over 40,000 copies of leaflet No. 1, "Information for Immigrants," have been distributed. The Illinois Society has been most active in obtaining the coöperation of the different settlement houses. Milwaukee, Cleveland, and Pittsburg have done good work among the mill hands. Enquiries for small lots have been received from nearly every State Society. Ouite a large number of the

leaflet No. 2, "Naturalization of Aliens," have been called for and enquiries for the same in two foreign languages. The question of the adoption of this leaflet by the Government is still before the Department of Commerce and Labor, and it is hoped will be settled in the affirmative before the end of the year, when translations will be commenced.

The naturalization leaflet reads as follows:

NATURALIZATION OF ALIENS IN THE UNITED STATES—HOW TO BECOME CITIZENS—WHAT IS REQUIRED—RIGHTS AND DUTIES.

The object of this little paper is to tell those coming from foreign lands how they may become citizens of the United States. It will also tell something of the rights which come to those who do become citizens. It will not try to tell any one how to vote, and it is not prepared by the government or by any political agent. It is written by the direction of a society made up of the descendants of the men who made an American citizenship possible. This Society is called the "Sons of the American Revolution."

There are many reasons why the foreign-born person who comes here should wish to become a citizen. Some of these are: (I) Because there are rights which are given to a citizen which are not given to one who is not a citizen. In nearly all the States only citizens are allowed to vote or to hold office; and in a country governed by the people it should be the aim of every one to take part in the choosing of the men by whom the government is to be carried on. (2) If a man is going to make a home for himself and his family here, if he is going to earn his living here, it is a duty to his family as well as to himself to take part, if he can, in the government by which his rights and those of his family are to be cared for.

Every one who is born in the United States is a citizen, whether his parents were born here or not, and whether they had become citizens of this country or not.

A foreign-born person is made a citizen by a proceeding in court. There are a great many courts where this can be done, and one or more will be found in every State. When a court has once made a man a citizen, he is a citizen in every part of the country, and will be accepted as a citizen on producing the papers given him in the court when he is naturalized. If this paper is destroyed or lost, a copy can be had from the court which gave the paper which has been lost.

One who wishes to become a citizen will want to know what will be required by the court which he asks to naturalize him. There are several things about which he has to bring evidence before the judge. The evidence must be statements made under oath by two persons who are citizens. The person who wants to be naturalized must show in this way:

i. That he has lived in this country for at least five years. It is not necessary that he should have lived all of that time in the same city or

town, but he must have lived in this country all of the five years, and one year in the State where he asks the court to make him a citizen. If he has lived part of the time here and part of the time in the old country the court will refuse his application.

2. That he is a person of good moral character. This does not mean that he must have any particular religion, or even that he must be a member of a church. It does mean that he must be a person who behaves himself, who does not steal, or cheat, swindle, or assault other people. It means that persons who break the laws are not looked on here as persons who will be good citizens and fit to make laws for people who obey the laws.

3. Evidence must also be given to the court by the person who wishes to be made a citizen that he believes in the form of government of this country. No man can believe in a thing which he knows nothing about. A citizen by his vote helps to govern the United States. It is necessary, therefore, that one who wishes to become a citizen shall know the way this country is governed. So one who does not know how this country is governed is not a proper man to have a part in the governing of it. He would not know how to use the rights of a citizen properly. It is not enough to know that there was once a man by the name of George Washington or to know the name of the man who is President at a particular time. One who wants to be a citizen should know how the laws are made, how the men who make them are chosen, and what officers see that the laws are obeyed.

4. Any one who believes that there should not be any government at all can not become a citizen. Any one who teaches or believes it is right to kill or try to kill or shoot or stab a man for no reason except that he is an officer of the government can not become a citizen. In this country the people choose their own officers, and in most cases for not more than four years. The officer is a servant, not a master, of the people. If he abuses his office, or if he uses his office to abuse the people, he can be removed by the courts or the President or the governor of the State, or when his term ends the people can put someone else in his place. So there can be no excuse for trying to kill, shoot, or stab an officer because he is an officer.

5. To become a citizen a man must be able to speak the English language. He can become a citizen without this only when he is unable to talk at all, or when he has declared that he means to become a citizen and has settled on some of the land owned by the government in the way the law provides.

At least two years before a foreigner applies to the court to make him a citizen, he must go before the clerk of the court and swear to a written statement that he means to become a citizen of the United States, but this statement does not, by itself, make him a citizen of the United States. At the time he applies to the court to make him a citizen he must have resided within the United States for at least five years and for one year immediately preceding such application in the State in which he makes application. A foreigner may go before the clerk of the court and swear to a written statement that he means to become a citizen of the United States at any time after he reaches the age of eighteen years.

What are the results of being naturalized?

I. The naturalized citizen has the same rights in regard to property that one who is born here has; the same right to earn a living for himself and his family; to enjoy that which he has earned and which is justly his; the right to vote for the men who are to make the laws and the men who are to see that they are carried out. The naturalized citizen has just the same rights in the governing of the country as one who was born here.

2. He has the right to be appointed to any public position or employment for which he is fit, or to be chosen by the people to any office in

the government except that of President.

3. When a foreign-born man is naturalized, his wife, if she is a person who could herself be naturalized, and his children under twenty-one years of age become citizens also by his act, if they are in this country. They thus become entitled to the rights of citizens.

4. If a man has become a citizen of the United States and afterwards goes back to the old country on a visit, he will be protected by this government from unlawful arrest or from being put in prison or punished unjustly. This does not mean that if he does wrong, or had done wrong before he came away, this government would stop his being punished. It means that if he behaves as a good man, and had not done anything to be punished for before he left the old country, this government will not let him be put in prison or punished without cause.

The United States expects its citizens to live in this country, to work here and earn a living; to support and educate their children here. So if a man, having been naturalized here, goes back to the old country, or to any other foreign country, within five years after he has been made a citizen, to live there permanently, he is no longer considered a citizen of this country and loses his rights as a citizen here.

Is it not a great thing that one who comes from another land can become a citizen here, and have a vote which will count just as much as that of the President himself? Is it not a great thing that each foreigner coming here can have every right that any one born in this country can have?

Is it not worth your while by your behavior and industry to do your

best to obtain this right for yourself and your family?

STATISTICAL REPORT OF STATE SOCIETIES AND CHAPTERS.

By direction of the Executive Committee, there was sent to each State Society on October 28 a blank form calling for information concerning the patriotic work accomplished by each State Society or Chapter since its organization. The data will be used in preparing a general statement on what the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution has done since 1880.

The blanks request information under the following heads:

1. Monuments, Tablets, Statues, and Busts Erected; 2. Other Memorials Erected or Established; 3. Number Revolutionary Soldiers' Graves

Permanently Marked; 4. Pictures Presented to Schools or Public Institutions; 5. Medals Presented to Schools or Public Institutions; 6. Books Presented to Schools or Public Institutions; 7. Flags Presented to Schools or Public Institutions; 8. Statuary Presented to Schools or Public Institutions; 9. Money Prizes Presented for Essays; 10. School Addresses or Celebrations; 11. General Public Celebrations; 12. Days and Events Celebrated by Society (not for general public); 13. Special Patriotic Work; 14. Special Historical Work; 15. Does Society Maintain a Library? 16. Does Society Issue a Periodical? 17. List of Society's Publications, with Dates and Brief Description; 18. Names of Members of National or Wide Reputation, Living and Deceased.

MEMORIALS.

The Prison Ship Martyrs Monument was unveiled at Fort Greene Park, Brooklyn, November 14, 1908. It was erected with the aid of a fund contributed, one-half by the United States Government, and one-half by several patriotic organizations and individuals, including State Societies and members of the Sons of the American Revolution. Governor Charles Evans Hughes, a member of the Empire State Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, accepted the monument in behalf of the State. The orator of the day was William Howard Taft, President-elect of the United States. The monument, 145 feet high, is a granite shaft, surmounted by an urn in which rests a glass hemisphere directly over eighty 100-candle power incandescent electric lights. It is built in memory of American patriots who died in the ship "Jersey" and other British prison ships anchored in Wallabout Bay during the War of the Revolution.

James Maccubbin Lingan, Second Lieutenant of Stephenson's Maryland and Virginia Rifle Regiment, taken prisoner at Fort Washington November 16, 1776, Captain of Rawlings's Additional Continental Regiment, killed during the Federalist riot at Baltimore, July 28, 1812, was buried in Harford County, Maryland. His remains were reburied in Arlington National Cemetery on November 5, 1908, with full military honors. Following the escort of United States troops were representatives of five generations of the soldier's descendants, and representatives of the Society of the Cincinnati, the Sons of the American Revolution, the Daughters of the American Revolution and other patriotic organizations.

VADDITIONS TO MEMBERSHIP.

Twenty-four State Societies show 173 new members enrolled by the Registrar General from October 1 to November 30, making a total of 473 new members since the Buffalo Congress. Those registered since October 1, as recorded in the present Bulletin, are as follows: Empire State, 27; Connecticut, 27; Massachusetts, 20; Maryland, 13; Colorado, 10; California, 9; Michigan, 6; New Jersey, 6; Indiana, 6; Pennsylvania, 6; New Hampshire, 5; Vermont, 5; Kansas, 5; Illinois, 5; Maine, 4; Ohio, 4; Nebraska, 4; Wyoming, 2; Hawaii, 2; Florida, 2; Minnesota, 2; Missouri, 1; Louisiana, 1, and Virginia, 1.

DOINGS OF STATE SOCIETIES.

THE CALIFORNIA SOCIETY has issued a charter to the Los Angeles Chapter, organized with ten members. The President of the Chapter is Gen. J. G. Chandler, and the Secretary H. C. Houghton.

THE COLORADO SOCIETY has chartered a Chapter at Greeley, Colo., and through Vice-President General Guyer is actively at work in organizing a Society in New Mexico. Forty-six new members have been added to the Colorado roll since the Buffalo Congress.

The Connecticut Society Board of Managers at a recent meeting in Hartford appointed a special committee, consisting of Judge Morris B. Beardsley, of Bridgeport; Clarence H. Wickham, of Hartford; Seymour C. Loomis, of New Haven; Gen. E. S. Greeley, of New Haven; Judge Hobart L. Hotchkiss, of New Haven, and William H. Burr, of Westport, to secure plans and erect a monument at Compo Beach, Westport, on the spot where the British landed their troops on their raid on Danbury.

THE NATHAN HALE BRANCH, of New London, announced that Morton F. Plant, of Groton, was admitted to membership by letter from the Empire State Society of New York, and that a campaign had been started for increasing the interest and membership in New London under the leadership of the new President of the Chapter, P. Le Roy Harwood.

THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA SOCIETY On November II held its first regular meeting of the season. Dr. Harvey W. Wiley made an address on the growth of patriotism in the United States. He declared that there has been an awakening of genuine patriotism, particularly among commercial and professional people. There is no longer that great

craving and fight for nothing but wealth. "Our politics is no longer opportunism, but is for what is right and good."

THE FLORIDA SOCIETY has distributed one thousand private mailing cards to selected names in the State of Florida, leading lawyers, bankers, clergymen, and military and civil officials, inviting them, if eligible, to join the Society. About two hundred letters have also been written, and President Cross expresses the hope of largely increasing the membership through this activity.

THE BEN FRANKLIN CHAPTER of the Iowa Society met at Des Moines, October 15, when Mr. John Judson Hamilton delivered an address on "Washington, the Man," in which he described Washington's personal characteristics as to stature, complexion, temper, habits, etc.

The Louisiana Society on All Saints' Day placed garlands on the tombs of Miguel Dragon, Benedict Francois van Pradelles, and Michel Fortier, in the old St. Louis cemetery in New Orleans, in memory of their service in the cause of American Independence. On July 4, last, the graves of these patriots were decorated by a committee of the Society, and it was subsequently decided to perform similar honors on every All Saints' Day. Thomas Dabney Dimitry, Secretary of the Society, and a number of ladies and gentlemen, members of the Society, and guests, some of whom are descendants of Dracos (Dragon) and of Fortier, visited each grave and on each there was deposited a wreath with streamers of the colors of the National Society, blue, white, and buff, and also a bouquet of large roses tied with white ribbon, on which was inscribed:

"A tribute from the Louisiana Society, Sons of the American Revolution, Nov. 1, 1908."

The Maryland Society held its annual meeting in Baltimore, October 19, 1908, the anniversary of "Peggy Stewart" Day, and of the Lord Cornwallis surrender at Yorktown. President General Stockbridge, Historian of the Maryland Society, reported on the work of the year, and in general on the duties of the historian of the Society. Remarks were made by Col. Charles Lyman, Commander John H. Moore, U.S. N., and Secretary General Clark, of Washington, ex-Vice-President General Pelham W. Ames, Rev. George W. Dame, and others. Officers elected were: President, George R. Gaither, Baltimore; Vice-Presidents, George W. Hyde, Admiral Yates Stirling, James E. Hancock, Thomas M. Maynadier, Gen. Clinton L. Riggs; Secretary, Dr. James D. Iglehart, 211 W. Lanvale street, Baltimore; Treasurer, R. Ross Holloway; Registrar, George W. McCreary; Historian, Prof. Arthur B. Bibbins; Chaplain, Rev. George W. Dame.

THE MASSACHUSETTS SOCIETY On October 17, 1908, celebrated the anniversary of the Battle of Saratoga and the surrender of Burgoyne, by a patriotic meeting and dinner at the American House, Boston.

The Society had as its guests three actual sons of the American Revolution. They were John Adams, of Gardner, aged 94; James Faxon, of Salem, aged 82, and Arra F. Clark, aged 80, of Dorchester. All were in vigorous health, Mr. Adams, the oldest, appearing perhaps as vigorous

as any of the trio.

The Society listened to an historical exposition of the causes of the Revolution from President Frederick W. Hamilton, of Tufts College. Dr. Hamilton declared that the Revolution was due to two problems, one political, the other military. He declared Washington to be the oreatest general of his time, excepting Frederick the Great. He also thought the American historians had given too much prominence to the Tory sentiment in this country at the time of the Revolution. He was inclined to minimize it. The military problem presented by the war, was to drive the British out of North America, or at least from what is now the United States soil. The British were not so powerfully supplied with troops as one might think, having at the beginning of the struggle garrisons at only a few points, such as Boston, Halifax, Quebec, and the Ohio valley, and a few distant points like Florida. He then described Burgoyne's invasion of the Hudson valley and why it failed. It failed because the other British generals at various points did not support him and because Washington saw through his plan and blocked him. This was the turning point in the Revolution.

The dinner was presided over by Edward C. Battis, of Salem, and a brief address was made by Nathan Warren, of Waltham, who described the presentation of sham battles at Waltham 60 years ago, and thought such representations were desirable.

The dinner was made enjoyable also by readings by Edwin D. Sibley. The attendance was about 100.

THE OLD SUFFOLK CHAPTER, of Chelsea, Mass., held its 98th regular meeting on October 20, 1908, when Walter K. Watkins, Historian General of the National Society, read a paper on "Tar and Feathers in Boston in 1774."

THE MALDEN CHAPTER, of the Massachusetts Society, held a meeting on November 28, when papers were read by President Frank E. Woodward on "Alexander Hamilton and the Constitution," and by William Schofield on "The Supreme Court as an Interpreter of the Constitution."

The Newtown-Battle Chapter, of the Empire State Society, held its annual meeting at Elmira, N. Y., on November 20, when a paper was read by Hon. Roswell R. Moss on "American Constitutional Independence—A Study of its Growth."

The Ohio Society has issued a recruiting circular, dated December 1, urging every member of that Society to assist toward increasing the roll by the addition of five hundred new names before April 19, 1909. The local Chapters are reported as enthusiastically taking up the matter of medals and prizes for the best essays on historical subjects.

The Pennsylvania Society held its third noon-day luncheon at Pittsburg on Friday, October 30, with thirty-six members in attendance. The meeting was a great success in its social features, quite a number of members being present who had not before attended these meetings, and in addition a number of new members were present who were thus enabled to meet the compatriots in a social way at once upon their admission to the Society, something that has not before been possible. Short and appropriate addresses were made by the President, Col. R. W. Guthrie, Col. A. J. Logan, Mr. F. A. Kimball, Chancellor S. B. McCormick, and Mr. A. Horne.

An informal social meeting of the Society was held at the Monongahela House on Tuesday evening, November 24, supper being served at 6 o'clock. Mr. Peter V. Rovnianek, editor and banker of Pittsburg, and a Slovak himself, and one deeply interested in the uplifting of the foreigners among us, gave a short talk on "Slavic Emigration," a subject which has a direct bearing on the excellent work the Society has undertaken in the distribution of leaflets containing information for immigrants concerning the United States.

Members were invited to bring as their guests any who are eligible and desirous of joining the Society by paying the regular subscription for the supper.

The Philadelphia Chapter Board of Managers met on November 10, and a committee was appointed to prepare resolutions in memory of Harry Blynn, President of the Chapter, who died on November 6.

THE TIDEWATER CHAPTER of the Virginia Society at its annual meeting in Norfolk, on October 19, elected the following officers: President, Frank E. Rogers; Vice-President, Fløyd Hughes; Treasurer, Tench F. Tilghman; Secretary and Registrar, William Henry Sargeant.

THE VERMONT SOCIETY held its annual meeting on November 11, when the following officers were elected: President, Hon. Charles H. Darling, of Burlington; Vice-President, William T. Dewey, of Montpelier;

Secretary and Historian, Walter Hill Crockett, of St. Albans; Treasurer, Clarence L. Smith, of Burlington; Registrar, Henry L. Stillson, of Bennington; Chaplain, Rev. Homer A. Flint, of Montpelier. Fifty dollars was voted to the Secretary for the collection of material for a history of Vermont's part in the Revolutionary War. In the evening a public meeting was held in the House of Representatives, when President John M. Thomas, of Middlebury College, delivered an address on "The Modern Substitutes for the Revolutionary Incentive."

THE WASHINGTON SOCIETY has contributed five hundred dollars (\$500) toward the erection of a statue of George Washington on the campus of the University of Washington at Seattle.

THE WISCONSIN SOCIETY has invested about \$1,000 in the publication of important works, entitled "Documentary History of Dunmore's War, 1774," and "Revolution on the Upper Ohio, 1775–1777." These books are compiled from the Draper manuscripts in the Library of the Wisconsin Historical Society, and published at the charge of the Wisconsin Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. The volume on Dunmore's War was issued in May, 1905. "The Revolution on the Upper Ohio" is planned to be in two volumes. The first volume was issued in February, 1908. The preface says:

The documents chosen for publication herein do not afford a continuous history of any one campaign or group of men. They do, however, shed light upon the principal incidents and the prominent characters of the long frontier stretching from the Greenbrier region in Southwestern Virginia to the post at Kittanning on the Upper Allegheny. The time is the first two years of the Revolutionary struggle—March, 1775, to May, 1777, inclusive—and deals with the defense of the border while still in the hands of the militia of the Western counties. The coming to Fort Pitt, June 1, 1777, of an officer of Continental rank, sent by Congress to take command of the West, marked an epoch in the military history of the region. It is with the advent of General Hand that our initial volume closes.

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The Twentieth Annual Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution will be held in the City of Baltimore, April 30 and May 1, 1909. The headquarters will be the Hotel Belvedere, Charles and Chase Streets. The preliminary program is as follows: Thursday, April 29, at 9 p. m., meeting of the National Executive Committee. A committee of the Maryland Society will be in attendance from 8 p. m. at the Belvedere, where badges and information can be obtained. Friday, April 30, 9 a. m., meeting of the National Board of Trustees. From 9 to 10 a. m. informal reception of delegates. At 10 a. m. opening of the Congress, with welcome by the Mayor of Baltimore. After lunch, Congress will continue business up to the election of officers. At 9 p. m. reception to delegates and their ladies in the parlors of the Belvedere

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by the Maryland Chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Saturday, May I, about 9 a. m., special train for delegates and ladies and members attending the Congress, to Annapolis, where election of officers and trustees will be held in the old Senate chamber of the State Capitol, followed by a meeting of the newly elected Board of Trustees After luncheon at the Executive Mansion, opportunity will be afforded to visit the grounds and buildings of the U.S. Naval Academy and other historic places, returning to Baltimore in time for the banquet, which will be held at the Hotel Belvedere at 7.30 p. m.

The Trunk Line, New England, and Central Passenger Associations have granted a rate of one fare and three-fifths for the round trip to Baltimore on the usual certificate plan. The territory included by these associations covers all roads east of Chicago, north of the Ohio river. and north of Charleston, W. Va., Roanoke, Va., and Washington, D. C. Delegates from the far west and the south will have the advantage of existing low rates to connecting points.

Besides the Hotel Belvedere the local committee refers to the Hotel Stafford, Mount Vernon Place; the Hotel Rennert, Saratoga and Liberty Streets; the New Howard, Howard near Baltimore Street, all on the European plan. The Caswell, Raleigh, and Junker, are stag hotels at one dollar per day, up. Information may be secured by correspondence with the hotels, or with Thomas M. ELIGIBILITY OF APPLICANTS FOR MEMBERSHIP will hereafter be based on one original claim, and when the applicant presents additional claims, they should in each case be made on separate papers marked "Supplemental Applications." Condensed supplemental forms are supplied to State Societies by the Secretary General.

MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, FEBRUARY 25, 1909.

A meeting of the National Executive Committee, duly called by direction of the President General, was held at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, New York City, at 2 o'clock p. m., February 25, 1909. Those present were President General Henry Stockbridge, who presided, and ex-President General Nelson A. McClary, Commander John H. Moore, U. S. Navy, Dr. Moses Greeley Parker, Mr. Morris B. Beardsley, President Cornelius A. Pugsley, of the Empire State Society, representing

Mr. W. A. Marble, who was absent in the South, and Secretary General A. Howard Clark. A letter was received from Mr. Richardson, of Ohio. who was unable to attend.

The minutes of the Executive Committee meeting, held September 26, 1008, were approved as printed in the Official Bulletin for October. 1908.

On motion by Mr. McClary, duly seconded, it was voted that statistical reports received from State Societies, in response to the circular of October 28, issued by order of the Executive Committee, and calling for record of patriotic work accomplished since the organization of each Society (described on page 7 of the December Official Bulletin), be referred to the Historian General to be digested and reported to the Baltimore Congress, and that the Secretary General request State Societies that have not sent reports to forward them promptly to the Historian General; the State reports to be returned to the Secretary General for future reference.

On motion by Doctor Parker, duly seconded, it was voted that the Secretary General be instructed to insert on the second page of application blanks, spaces for dates of birth, marriage, and death of each ancestor in each generation, and that on the third page be added the statement that "membership is based upon one original claim; when the applicant derives eligibility by descent from more than one ancestor, and it is desired to take advantage thereof, separate applications to be marked 'Supplemental application' should be made in each case and filed with the original."

The President General announced that a charter had been issued to the New Mexico Society, organized at Albuquerque on December 26, 1008, and that charters had been prepared for issuance to new Societies in Mississippi and Idaho, through the Committee on Organization. The action of the President General was thereupon approved by the Executive Committee.

Commander Moore reported that 100 bronze copies of the prize essay medal, first issued by the National Society in 1895, in silver and gold, for award to colleges, had, by authority of the President General, been struck and are furnished by the Secretary General for general use by State Societies at a cost of two dollars each, including a seal-skin medal case. The Executive Committee approved the above action.

The President General submitted a preliminary program for the Baltimore Congress, and it was approved. (See previous page of this BULLETIN)

On motion by Commander Moore, the Secretary General was in-

structed to note, as application papers are received, whether the applicant is a present or past member of another State Society, and if so such fact shall be communicated to the new Society before registration

President Pugsley extended an invitation to the members of the Executive Committee to be the guests of the Empire State Society at its annual banquet that evening at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, and, on motion by Mr. Beardsley, the invitation was accepted with the thanks of the Committee.

Mr. Pugsley submitted, in behalf of the Empire State Society, a proposal which had come before that Society that a military company be organized under the auspices of the National Society. Consideration of the plan was, on motion, postponed until the next meeting of the Committee.

Doctor Parker, Chairman of the Committee on Chapters, reported that at the September meeting of the Executive Committee there had been referred to the Committee on Chapters the draft of a plan of reorganization (see subsequent page for plan) with request that definite recommendations on the general subject of local Chapters be presented, if practicable, for consideration of the Executive Committee at its present meeting. The Committee reported that it does not recommend the adoption of the proposed changes in the Constitution. It does, however, submit certain recommendations as being in line with the purposes of the proposed changes. A tabulated statement, forming part of the full report of the Committee to the Baltimore Congress, shows that 75 Chapters in 17 State Societies have an aggregate of 2,180 members.

The Executive Committee, after considering the recommendations of the Chapter Committee, voted to concur in the same and voted that it does not deem it expedient to recommend to the next Congress any changes in the Constitution. The Chapter Committee recommendations are as follows:

I. Your Committee would recommend to those State Societies that have no fixed annual dues to establish such dues as soon as practicable at a minimum of \$1.50, while the annual dues of the National Society are 50 cents, thus making the minimum State fee \$1.00 and National Society fee 50 cents.

2. That the Chapters be officially recognized by the State Societies, if practicable, by making the Presidents of Chapters of a specified size exofficio members of the State Board of Managers.

3. That a standing committee of the National Society be appointed to advise the State Societies with reference to State and Chapter organization, to be known as the Advisory Committee on Chapters.

The Committee on Information for Aliens, Commander Moore, Colonel Lyman, and A. Howard Clark, reported that the United States Department of Commerce and Labor has approved leaflet No. 2, "Naturalization of Aliens in the United States," and that it is being translated into several foreign languages.

On motion, the report of the Committee was accepted.

The Secretary General announced the death at Columbus, Ohio, on January 10, 1909, of Rev. Rufus W. Clark, Chairman of the Committee on Education, and former Chaplain General of the National Society. Tributes to the memory of Doctor Clark, adopted by the Ohio and Michigan Societies, were announced to the Executive Committee, and formal action by the National Society was deferred until the Baltimore Congress.

The President General announced that Col, Charles Lyman had been appointed Chairman of the Committee on Education to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Doctor Clark,

Mr. McClary, in general charge of organization work, stated that the committees on organization of new State Societies report good progress. A Society was formed in New Mexico on December 26, and early organization is looked for in Idaho and North Dakota. In Mississippi the required number of eligible applicants has been secured, and a charter has been prepared for issuance as soon as organization is perfected. Early formation of a Society is also expected in Georgia.

The Secretary General reported that there has been a registration of 800 new members since the Buffalo Congress, a considerable increase over the same period in several past years.

There being no further business the Committee adjourned at 6 p. m.

DRAFT OF AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION,

SUGGESTED FOR CONSIDERATION OF COMMITTEE ON CHAPTERS.

ARTICLE IV.—Organization.

SECTION I. The several constituted bodies of this Association shall consist of

ist. A National Organization to be known as The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution

2d. State Organizations to be known as ——— State Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

3d. — Society or Chapter of the — State Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

SECTION 2. The National Society shall embrace all the members of the State Societies of the Sons of the American Revolution, now existing or which may hereafter be established under this Constitution.

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SECTION 3. State Societies shall comprise all the Societies or Chanters organized within the territory of the State, and may adopt a Constitution and By-Laws for their government, not inconsistent with the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society.

SECTION 4. Officers of State Societies shall be a President, Vice-President (one or more), Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, and Chaplain and a Board of Management, consisting of the above named officers and fifteen compatriots.

Section 5. There shall be an annual meeting of each State Congress for the purpose of electing State officers and delegates to the National Congress, and to transact such other business as may be brought before

Each Society or Chapter shall be entitled to one delegate for every fifteen members, and its President or Vice-President shall be ex-officio a delegate.

[Sections 6 to II are the same as Sections 2 to 7 of present Constitution, except the addition of "or Societies" in Section 7.]

SECTION 6. Whenever in any State or Territory in which a State Society does not exist, or in which a State Society has become inactive. or failed for two years to pay its annual dues to the National Society. fifteen or more persons duly qualified for membership in this Society may associate themselves as a State Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, and organize in accordance with this Constitution, they may be admitted by the Board of Trustees to the National Society as - Society of the Sons of the American Revolution," and shall thereafter have exclusive local jurisdiction in the State or Territory or in the District in which they are organized, subject to the provisions of this Constitution, but this provision shall not be construed so as to exclude the admission of candidates residing in other States.

Section 7. Each State Society shall judge of the qualifications of its members and of those proposed for membership, subject to the provisions of this Constitution, and shall regulate all matters pertaining to its own affairs. It shall have authority to establish local Chapters or Societies within its own jurisdiction, and to endow the Chapters or Societies with such power as it may deem proper, not inconsistent with the charter of the National Society or with this Constitution. It shall have authority, after due notice and impartial trial, to expel any member who, by conduct unbecoming a gentleman, shall render himself unworthy to remain a member of the Society.

SECTION 8. Each State Society shall submit to the Annual Congress of the National Society a report, setting forth by name the additions. transfers and deaths, and any other changes in the membership and the progress of the State Society during the preceding year, and making such suggestions as it shall deem proper for the promotion of the objects of the National Society.

Section o. Whenever a member in good standing in his Society shall change his residence from the jurisdiction of the State Society of which

he is a member to that of another, he shall be entitled, if he so elects. to a certificate of honorable demission from his own State Society, in order that he may be transferred to the State Society to whose jurisdiction he shall have changed his residence; provided, that his membership shall continue in the former until he shall have been elected a member of the latter.

Each State Society shall, however, retain full control of the admis-

sion of members by transfer.

SECTION 10. Whenever the word "State" occurs in this Constitution, it shall be held to include within its meaning the District of Columbia and the Territories of the United States.

SECTION 11. A Society may be formed in any foreign country by fifteen or more persons who are eligible to membership under this Constitution, which shall bear the same relation to the National organization as the State Society, subject to the provisions of this Constitution.

Section 12. A Society or Chapter may be formed by the authority of the Board of Management of a State Society, on the application of not less than ten persons eligible to membership in the National Society and residing in the same city or towns adjacent thereto, and may adopt 2 Constitution and By-Laws for its government, not inconsistent with the Constitution or By-Laws of its State or the National Society.

Section 13. Each Society or Chapter shall pay on or before the first day of March in each year to its State Society to defray the expenses of the National Society, fifty cents for each member thereof, and such other amount as its State Society may require to defray the expenses of the State organization.

COMMITTEE ON INFORMATION FOR ALIENS.

Since the December Official Bulletin was published over 134,000 copies of leaflets Nos. I and 2 have been issued. The different State Societies, headed by the Illinois Society, are taking a more active interest in the distribution of the leaflets, and most encouraging reports have been received of the actual good being done by them.

The annual banquet was held at the Arizona School of Music on the evening of February 24. Compatriot Ellinwood, retiring President, presided as toastmaster, and addresses were delivered as follows: The Mecklenburg Declaration of Rights, Richard E. Sloan; Virginia in the Revolution, G. W. P. Hunt; The Domestic Life of Thomas Jefferson, Francis E. Shine; New York in the Revolution, George D. Christy; Harvard in the Revolution, Guy L. Jones.

THE ARKANSAS Society held its annual meeting on February 22 and re-elected its former officers for another year.

THE CALIFORNIA SOCIETY has changed the date of its annual meeting to April 19. Washington's Birthday was celebrated by a banquet at the Hotel St. Francis, San Francisco, when there was an opening address by George C. Sargent, President of the Society, and a formal address by David Starr Jordan, President of Leland Stanford University, on "The United States as a World Power."

THE COLORADO SOCIETY continues active in promoting the organization of new Societies, under the energetic direction of Dr. Clarkson N.

Guyer, Vice-President General. At the Centennial celebration of the birth of Abraham Lincoln, held at Denver on February 12, Gen. Irving Hale, Doctor Guyer, Mr. J. F. Tuttle, Jr., and other compatriots took part in the exercises.

The Connecticut Society held its twentieth annual banquet at the Stratfield Hotel, Bridgeport, on February 22, with an attendance of 300 representative men of the State. Lewis B. Curtis, President of the Society, presided as toastmaster. Among the speakers were Henry Lee, mayor; Hon. Henry Stockbridge, President General; Hon. Cornelius A. Pugsley, President of the Empire State Society; Hon. Job E. Hedges, of New York, who spoke upon "Washington, a Guide for Today," and Rev. Watson L. Phillips, D. D., Chaplain of Governor's Foot Guard, New Haven, whose topic was "1775-1909."

After commenting on the growth of the Society, an increase of tenper cent during the year, Mr. Curtis spoke of the rapidly changing character of the country's population through immigration, and of the consequent present need of standing firm in upholding the principles of our forefathers.

Judge Stockbridge spoke to the topic, "Washington's Farewell Address," and said:

"If patriotic societies are to fulfill their purpose and be deserving of support and development they must be engaged upon all actual work in the present which shall have for its object not merely the accumulation of historical matter or the preservation of genealogical records, but shall tend to create a correct sentiment in present administration for its influence in the future. * * * It therefore demands that the legislative bodies of this country, whether they be aldermen, city councils, State legislatures, or members of the national Congress, should be composed of individuals who can be thus trusted with the maintenance of individual rights and that no more important work of practical patriotism exists today than the creation of a public sentiment which shall not only demand but shall insist upon having a type of legislators who will be free from all improper influence and that public sentiment can be greatly aided by the self-sacrifice of individuals in the performance of these duties for their fellow-citizens and themselves even at their own pecuniary loss."

THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA SOCIETY at its regular meeting on December 16, 1908, listened to an address by Hon. John Barrett, Director of the Bureau of American Republics, on "Our Sister Republics; or, the Wonderland of Opportunity." In the course of his address Mr. Barrett spoke of the great present efficiency of our diplomatic and consular service:

"No country has better ambassadors or ministers or consular officers abroad than the United States. The service is accomplishing wonders for our country. The reports sent in to Washington are most exhaustive, containing all the information that can possibly be of value in extending American trade and markets. Under the splendid administration of the State Department under Secretary Root, a member of this Society, probably the best administration of that department ever given by a Secretary since the department was established, it is utterly impossible to have incompetent men in diplomatic or consular offices."

The people of the United States have patronized these Latin-Americans, considered them of little importance, and have failed to realize the importance of a closer comity and commerce with them, Mr. Barrett said. And yet down in this "dago land," down in Peru, is the great city of Lima, with a university of 1,000 students that was 100 years old before Harvard was thought of. Our trade with Latin-American nations last year amounted to \$2,100,000,000, an increase in the last ten years of \$1,000,000,000, which is a record unparalleled by our country or Europe or the Orient.

On January 13 the District of Columbia Society held its annual ladies' night reception, attended by about four hundred members and guests. Justice Thomas H. Anderson, of the District Supreme Court, President of the Society, presided and spoke briefly. The other speakers were Mrs. Donald McLean, President General of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and Hon. Henry Stockbridge, President General of the Sons of the American Revolution.

At the annual business meeting of the District Society on February 22 the following officers were elected: President, Edward Bruce Moore, U. S. Commissioner of Patents; Vice-Presidents, William B. Thompson, Zebina Moses, Wm. A. De Caindry; Secretary, Chester M. Clark, Smithsonian Institution; Treasurer, Philip F. Larner, 918 F St.; Registrar, A. D. The invocation was by Rev. A. P. Higley, Chaplain of the Chapter; addresses were delivered by Hon. James H. Cartwright, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Illinois, and Hon. James Creighton, Judge of the Circuit Court; and the unveiling of the tablet was by Mr. Charles F. Mills, President of the Springfield Chapter.

THE IOWA SOCIETY publishes "The Old Continental" each month, narrating the doings of the State Society and its Chapters, and giving records of new members.

The Ben Franklin Chapter at Des Moines holds monthly meetings for the reading of historical papers. At the November meeting Dr. Gershom H. Hill made an address on "The Surgeons of the Revolutionary War." The Society is arousing interest in the study of American history by the award of prize essay medals to colleges and higher institutions of learning.

THE LOUISIANA SOCIETY on December 12, 1908, at its annual business meeting re-elected the officers of the last year with the exception that John Day was elected First Vice-President.

THE MAINE Society on February 22 held its eighteenth annual meeting and banquet at Riverton Park, with an attendance of 138 members and guests. The Secretary reported on the condition and work of the Society. The graves of 1,313 men who served in the army of the Revolution have been marked. The banquet was presided over by the retiring President, Hon. Frederic E. Boothby. The orator of the day was Hon. John S. Wise of New York, formerly of Virginia, who spoke of the lessons of the Civil War, and eulogized Washington, Lincoln, and Lee. Ex-Governor Robie of Maine and Dr. Seth C. Gordon made patriotic addresses.

THE MARYLAND SOCIETY is active in preparation for the entertainment of the Annual Congress of the National Society. Mr. E. F. Arthurs, 628 Equitable Building, Baltimore, has been elected Registrar of the Society in place of Mr. McCreary, resigned, and Mr. Ira H. Houghton has been elected Treasurer in place of Mr. Holloway, deceased. The Executive Committee of the Maryland Society in charge of the Congress consists of Hon. Henry Stockbridge, Chairman, 75 Gunther Building; Mr. E. F. Arthurs, Secretary, and the chairmen of the several committees in the management of the Congress.

THE MASSACHUSETTS SOCIETY and its several Chapters held several patriotic meetings during December, January, and February, of which full accounts have appeared in the Wednesday editions of the Boston Evening Transcript.

THE MALDEN CHAPTER on December 22 listened to "A Talk on Boston in Colonial Days," by Historian General Walter Kendall Watkins, and on January 8 the Chapter held its "Ladies Night," when Prof. Barrett Wendell, of Harvard University, gave an address on "Types of New England Character."

THE ROXBURY CHAPTER on January 14 listened to a paper by George B. Stevens, giving an account of the ill-fated Penobscot expedition fitted out at Boston in 1779.

"The Patria Society of Harvard" has been recently formed in Cambridge composed of Harvard students eligible to membership in the Society of Colonial Wars, the Sons of the American Revolution, and other hereditary patriotic societies. Its objects are to encourage patriotism in the University, to stimulate interest among students in the patriotic societies, and to promote social spirit. The President is Horace Holden, of Madison, N. J., a member of the New Jersey Society, S. A. R.

THE GEORGE WASHINGTON CHAPTER, of Springfield, invited the Massachusetts Society to celebrate the annual observance of Washington's Birthday in that city, instead of in Boston, as has long been the custom.

John C. Robinson, Vice-President of George Washington Chapter, was toastmaster at the banquet. The speakers were: Hon. A. S. Roe, of Worcester; John Adams, of Gardner, who is nearly ninety-five years old and an "Actual Son" of the American Revolution; Hon. Edward C. Battis, President of the State organization of the Sons of the American Revolution; Rev. John S. Lyon, D. D., of Holyoke, and Hon, Solon W. Stevens, of Lowell. Mr. Adams and Mr. Roe spoke only briefly. Dr. Lyon analyzed the content of the spirit that moved George Washington and his followers in the struggle for liberty and union. Solon W. Stevens gave an address full of patriotism and confidence. He referred to Lincoln and Washington as of equal greatness. He spoke of the great men whose centenaries fall this month-Lincoln, Darwin, and Mendelssohn. He quoted of Thackeray's tribute to Washington as "The first gentleman of his time," and emphasized its full meaning. The Michigan Society on January 29 held the second meeting of the fourth series of historical meetings inaugurated by the late Rev. Dr. Rufus W. Taylor read a paper on "Lafayette," dealing entirely with the experience and participation of Marquis de Lafayette in the Revolutionary War, and illustrating the good feeling with France, and the benefits to the United States that followed as a result of the unselfish devotion of the great Frenchman to the American cause. A discussion of the paper followed, participated in by Rev. Dr. W. B. Forbush, Dr. Charles W. Hitchcock, Messrs. H. P. Davock, Joseph Greusel, and Joseph Belanger, French Consul at Detroit.

Many expressions of regret were heard as to the loss sustained by the Society in the untimely death of Dr. Clark, the former President, and a committee consisting of Messrs. A. M. Henry, Joseph Greusel, and George W. Bates, was requested to prepare appropriate resolutions to be read at the February meeting of the Society.

The annual banquet was held at Hotel Pontchartrain, Detroit, on February 22, and was attended by a large number of members and ladies. The program included addresses on "Washington, the Patriot," by Judge James O. Murfin; "Washington, the Soldier," by Judge Harry A. Lockwood "Washington, the Statesman," by Hon. John B. Corliss, and

The monument at Greenwich to the memory of "The Jersey Tea Burners" has been completed and dedicated.

The monument to mark the battlefield of Princeton is now in process of erection, all the funds needed for the purpose having been obtained through National and State appropriations and private subscriptions by the Princeton Battle Monument Association. Ex-President General Franklin Murphy represents the Sons of the American Revolution in the movement and has given largely of his time, influence, and means to accomplish the erection of this memorial.

The Secretary's report for the year shows a present membership of 383, a net gain of 16.

Gov. J. Franklin Fort, President of the Society, presented Compatriots Addison Ely, Jr., and Guy Leverne Fake with diplomas and medals awarded by the National Society for their services in the War with Spain. Governor Fort reminded the compatriots that while it is a great thing to have been of those who made the country, it is a greater thing to be of those men of today who are doing something to make and maintain the country as a world power; that as the days of chivalry have passed the Spirit of Knighthood is still represented by the self-consecration of the men who respond to the calls of patriotism.

The picturesque feature of the banquet at the Narragansett Hotel was the presence of the Varnum Continental Guards of East Greenwich, guests of the Sons. The guests of honor were Governor Pothier, Chief Justice Dubois of the Supreme Court, and Mayor Fletcher. President Lippitt presided as toastmaster. He narrated the organization of the English and American armies during the Revolutionary War, and the part which the French allies took in behalf of the struggling patriots, particularly in fighting side by side with the Rhode Island contingent.

Governor Pothier in his address referred to the honor of descent from patriots of the Revolution. In conclusion he said: "The noble traits of Washington's character and his heroic and patriotic deeds should and always will encourage the American people to constant effort. The destiny of the Republic is in our keeping. Our responsibilities are greater because they have to be measured by the sacrifices and the risks incurred by the heroes of the Revolutionary War for independence and the establishment of a Democratic government—a model for the world."

Chief Justice Dubois said in part: "We are all obedient to the law. This obedience begins in our infancy. * * * Not all law is constitutional and statutory; there are fundamental laws underlying these, notably that of self-preservation. Out of this law rises the law of the preservation of society, which provides that the unit must perish so that society may exist. So it comes that it is written, 'It is sweet to die for one's country.'"

Edwin Aylesworth Burlingame, Historian of the Society, read an interesting paper on an act of the General Assembly of 1776 relative to prices to be paid for articles of domestic consumption.

Mayor Fletcher said in part:

"When any naval vessel plying the waters of the Potomac approaches Mount Vernon, the marine guard and the band are paraded, the ship's bell is tolled, and the colors are half-masted. When opposite the tomb of General Washington the bugle sounds 'taps,' the marines present arms, and all officers and men salute and stand at attention. It is an impressive and a beautiful ceremony, a fitting tribute to the memory of the noble patriot of whom all that is mortal reposes in that hallowed spot. It is a custom that should always be followed, for men like Washington should be exalted for all time as characters embodying the highest type of the true American. Washington, like Lincoln, stands at the head of those noble souls who elevated this nation to its lofty

plane among the world's great powers. Of him as of Lincoln well might President Roosevelt say in laying the cornerstone of the memorial to the martyred President: 'There have been other men as great and other men as good; but in all the history of mankind there are no other two great men as good as these, no other two men as great.'"

John Prescott Farnsworth, Poet of the Society, read a poem reciting the valorous deeds of the patriots of '76.

Brief remarks were made by Col. R. P. Brown of Providence Chapter No. 2, Vice-President Frederic W. Easton of Pawtucket Chapter No. 3, Capt. Nathaniel H. Brown of Kent County Chapter No. 4, of East Greenwich, with reference to the extension of the Society throughout the State.

The Wisconsin Society celebrated Forefather's Day on December 21, 1908, by holding a joint banquet with the Society of Colonial Wars at the Hotel Pfister in Milwaukee. The Wisconsin Society has been active in the distribution of the National Society leaflets on "Information for Immigrants" among the large population of aliens in Milwaukee. The addresses at the banquet were devoted to the general topic of Americanizing the immigrant. The "Evening Wisconsin," of Milwaukee, on December 22, contained the following editorial on the subject:

What can citizens whose immigrant ancestors came over in the May-flower do for immigrants who have only recently arrived? That

American patriotic societies exist for other purposes than self-glorification of their members has long been evident to all who have kept informed of their labors. An object to which the Sons of the American Revolution and the Society of Colonial Wars in this State have been committed for some time past is the education of the rising generation and of recent immigrants in American civic ideals. To this end a joint committee of the societies is engaged in the distribution of circulars in various languages containing information with reference to the government and laws of the United States.

At last evening's monthly meeting at the Pfister Hotel, the immigration problem was considered with especial reference to the Italian immigrants, and Sig. Conti, the Italian Consul in Milwaukee, was present by invitation as one of the speakers, the other speakers being E. W. Frost, Rev. Frederick Edwards, Rev. H. H. Jacobs, and Rev. W. F. Greenman.

Many suggestions were made, some of them highly practical, and in the course of the evening a deal of light was thrown upon the immigration problem in general. Much is done for all classes of immigrants by the beneficent operation of American institutions which guard human freedom and embody the spirit of human brotherhood. But while the spirit of the laws operates to protect the immigrant and uplift him materially and in all the aspects of citizenship, there are selfish agencies at work to exploit him, which oppress and pull him down. * * * The question of how to help the immigrants is a broad one. Its consideration in a spirit of brotherhood by broad-minded Americans attests their patriotism and humanity.

Gold Insignia.—The Executive Committee announces that through the generosity of a friend of the Society a full-sized gold insignia of the Sons of the American Revolution is offered, as in the past year, to the State Society which during the coming year shall add to its membership the largest proportional number of sons of active members. The insignia will be presented at the Annual Congress of 1910. It is recommended to the State Society so winning this insignia that it be given to one of the sons of members so secured.

THE "TRAVELING BANNER," presented to the National Society by the Colorado Society, will be awarded at the next Annual Congress to the State Society of one hundred members or more that shows the largest percentage of increase in members during the coming year.

LEAFLETS FOR ALIENS.—The Committee on Information for Aliens requests State Societies or members to send to the Chairman, Commander J. H. Moore, U. S. N., 1755 P street, Washington, D. C., the names of officers of organizations of foreigners in various cities to whom leaflets may be forwarded for distribution. The Committee is prepared to supply leaflet No. 1 in any quantity in English, Italian, Yiddish, and several other languages.

Leaflet No. 2, on naturalization, will be supplied in any number, in English only.

It will increase the influence of the Committee's work if State Societies will appoint subcommittees to promote the distribution of the leaflets.

Demit Letters are issued to members in good standing who desire transfer to another Society, but membership remains in the original Society until notice is received of acceptance by the new Society. See Art. IV, Sec. 5, of National Constitution.

PROCEEDINGS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, APRIL 29, 1909.

A meeting of the Executive Committee, duly called by order of the President General, was held at the Hotel Belvedere, Baltimore, at 9 p. m., April 29, 1909. Present: President General Stockbridge, who presided; Mr. McClary, Mr. Beardsley, Commander Moore, Mr. Marble, Doctor Parker, Mr. Richardson, and the Secretary General. The minutes of the meeting of February 25 were approved as printed in the Official Bulletin for March, 1909. Various matters were inform-

ally discussed, but no formal action was taken. Mr. Chester M. Clark was appointed to serve as Assistant Secretary General during the sessions of the Baltimore Congress. The Committee adjourned at 11 o'clock p. m.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, APRIL 30,

A meeting of the Board of Trustees, duly called by order of the President General, was held at the Hotel Belvedere, Baltimore, at 9 a. m., April 30, 1909. Present: President General Stockbridge, who presided; Vice-Presidents General Bates, Guyer, and Howe; Secretary General Clark; Treasurer General Secor; Historian General Watkins; General Anderson, of Virginia; Colonel Guthrie, of Pennsylvania; Mr. Pettengill, of Maine; Mr. Ames, of California; Mr. Marble, of New York; Mr. Dewey, representing Vermont; Mr. Eaton, representing Michigan; Doctor Parker, of Massachusetts, and others.

The minutes of the meeting of the Trustees held at Buffalo, N. Y., on May I, 1909, were approved as printed in the Official Bulletin and in the National Year Book.

On motion by Mr. Pettengill, the action of the President General and of the Executive Committee, in granting charters in the name of the Trustees to new State Societies organized in New Mexico on December 26, 1908, and in Idaho on April 8, 1909, and to applicants for a Society in Mississippi, was ratified and confirmed.

Doctor Guyer, Chairman of the Committee on Organization in the North and West, reported on the recent organization in Idaho and on work in North Dakota and other States.

Secretary General Clark, member of the Committee on Information for Aliens, reported on the distribution of leaflets Nos. 1 and 2.

On motion by Mr. Dewey, it was voted that the report from the Executive Committee, as to matters transacted at its meetings on May 2 and September 26, 1908, and on February 25, 1909, be approved.

There being no further business, the meeting of the Board adjourned at 0.45 o'clock.

ABSTRACT OF PROCEEDINGS OF BALTIMORE CONGRESS, APRIL 30 AND MAY 1, 1909.

The Twentieth Annual Congress was called to order in regular session at the Hotel Belvedere, Baltimore, Md., by President General Stockbridge, at 10 a. m., April 30, 1909.

The invocation was delivered by His Eminence James Cardinal Gibbons. Hon. J. Barry Mahool, mayor of the city, welcomed the Congress to Baltimore:

"I am glad to be here today as a citizen of no mean city to extend to you a welcome. Mr. Gaither no doubt said you would meet with a hospitable welcome and find bright skies in Baltimore. I cannot vouch for the latter, but the hospitality of Maryland is such that it shines even if the clouds are lowering.

"It is hardly necessary for me to mention that Baltimore is the home of the Star Spangled Banner, and I hope you will not fail to visit Fort McHenry. Maryland is a patriotic State; she has given her best time and again for patriotism, and the spirit of '76 has shot through all her history. We have always foes without and foes within; therefore this fire and spirit of patriotism, like the fires of the vestal virgins, must always be kept burning."

THE PRESIDENT GENERAL'S ADDRESS reviewed the condition and needs of the Society as follows:

"The main work of my predecessor, President General McClary, was, as you will recall, directed to building up the Society in numerical strength, and his term unfortunately closed before the full effect of his work manifested itself. The year now closing has enjoyed the fruits of his labors, and the number of new members enrolled has been in excess of that recorded for many years. * * *

"There has been some depletion of our roll by the dropping of inactive non-contributing members, but this, while showing an apparent diminution of strength, is in reality the reverse. An hundred earnest, active members are worth more than three times that number of nominal but inactive members, and the elimination which has been going on will, it is believed, result in giving us a more active, aggressive body of men for the patriotic work of the Society.

"A factor of weakness in our plan of organization is the question of local Chapters and the relation between them and the State Society. While the subject is not a new one, the entire lack of a general system and the ill results which flow from such a condition are becoming more and more manifest. At the last Congress this subject was briefly considered and referred to a special committee, and that committee has worked zealously during the year and will make certain recommendations to this Congress. The committee has not as yet been able to formulate a plan which it deems feasible to put into universal operation on account of the varying practices which have grown up in different States and become firmly rooted.

"It will be manifest that the essential requisite for substantial growth of our Society lies in making the Chapter the unit of organization, where the members come in frequent personal touch with one another; that a member of a State Society residing from one hundred to six hundred miles distant from the location of the State Society will have but a weak and uncertain interest in the organization, and not unnaturally comes to feel that his annual membership dues are entirely for the benefit of others, bringing him no adequate return.

"It is undoubtedly true at the present time that our State Societies are indisposed to relinquish a method of Chapter relation to State Societies with which they are familiar, but it is urgently recommended that a definite, uniform plan be prepared to be observed in those States where no Chapters have as yet been formed. If this be done and it shall then demonstrate in operation that it has the result of increasing materially the interest of the individual member and the growth and strength of the States adopting it, as compared with those in which a different method is pursued, it will become to the interest of the remaining States to accept substantially, if not in its entirety, a method which has demonstrated its practical value.

"It is therefore recommended that this Congress authorize the continuance of a committee upon this subject, and that such committee be empowered to formulate a plan with reference thereto which, when it shall have received the approval of the Executive Committee, may be made applicable to all States in which as yet no distinct Chapter organizations have been effected. * *

"The death of large numbers of our members leads by a sort of sequence to another matter. Even with our present membership of 11,500, it will occur to most that there are a large number of sons of our present members who are eligible and who are not enrolled upon our membership. These should be with us.

"No American of 21 is too young to take a stand for patriotism, or to be known as taking such stand. The bringing in of these young men would make a large addition to our membership. With a view to stimulating this, just after the close of the last session of our Congress one of our most zealous members offered a gold insignia of our Society to be awarded to that State Society which should add during the year the largest percentage of sons of existing members.

"The Committee on Alien Education and Information has not been idle. Though at first disappointed in the extent of the demand for the first leaflet issued, it has been gratifying to note that the requests for it continue to come in steadily. The second leaflet, on Naturalization, has been issued in English." * * *

THE CREDENTIAL COMMITTEE, Mr. John D. Vandercook, Chairman, reported 201 qualified members of the Congress in attendance, including 10 General Officers, 4 ex-Presidents General, and 187 delegates from 24 State Societies—the largest Congress in the history of the Society.

TRIBUTE TO RUFUS W. CLARK.—Vice-President General Bates, of Michigan, read a tribute to the memory of Rev. Rufus W. Clark, D.D.,

Chairman of the Committee on Education and former Chaplain General, who died January 10, 1909, and the resolutions were adopted by a rising vote.

THE TRUSTEES' REPORT reviewed the proceedings of the meetings of the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee during the year as published in the Official Bulletin.

Treasurer General Secor reported a balance on hand on April 24, 1908, of \$8,307.23; receipts during the year, \$6,449.80; disbursements, \$7,866.61; cash on hand April 24, 1909, \$6,890.42.

The Secretary General's Report reviewed the work of the Society through the several committees and by the State Societies. Two new State Societies have been organized in New Mexico and Idaho, and a total of 1,049 new members enrolled since the Buffalo Congress. The National Year Book for 1908 was published in an edition of 750 copies. The Official Bulletin, entered in the Washington post-office as matter of the second class, was distributed in May, October, December, and March to all members of the Society.

As directed by the Buffalo Congress, standard report blanks were issued to State Societies, calling for itemized record by name of all changes in membership during the year, as required by the Constitution. The statistical year is made to begin April I and end March 31. The returns under this regulation for the past year have been much more complete than heretofore.

There was also distributed to the State Societies a blank prepared by the President General and adopted by the Executive Committee, calling for a condensed statement of the patriotic work accomplished since each Society was organized. The returns have been compiled by the Historian General as his report to the Congress, and it is intended at an early date to issue a brief abstract for general use.

The Registrar General's Report showed a total of 20,261 members enrolled since April 30, 1889, and a present active membership of 11,515 after deducting all losses by death and other causes during the last twenty years. There are now forty-four Societies. The addition of 1,049 new members during the year is 202 more than the previous year, and more than 25 per cent above the average for the past six years. The largest State Societies are Massachusetts with 1,635 members, Empire State 1,328, and Connecticut 1,059.

Diplomas and medals for service in the war with Spain were awarded to 23 compatriots, making a total of nearly 700 since the Detroit Con-

gress, in 1899, when the custom was adopted on the first anniversary of the battle of Manila Bay.

The forms for application for membership have been modified by the insertion of spaces for dates of birth, marriage, and death of each ancestor in each generation. Membership is based on one original claim and additional claims are filed on supplemental papers.

The Colorado Society, of Societies with 100 members or more, made the largest percentage of gain in membership during the year ending April 30, 1909, and next in order was the Maryland Society.

The Michigan Society added the largest number of sons of members in proportion to its size, thus entitling it to the gold insignia presented by a member of the National Society.

THE HISTORIAN GENERAL'S REPORT consisted of an extended review of the work of each of the State Societies since their organization, compiled from data submitted in response to a circular issued by the Executive Committee.

The Committee on Education, Col. Charles Lyman, Chairman, submitted a synopsis of the educational work carried on during the year by the State Societies which report any activity at all in that line. The Committee call special attention to two lines of work now being prosecuted which seem to promise the best results. These are the distribution of leaflets to the foreign element of our population, and contests in the schools for medals and other prizes. It is suggested, however, that these contests should in all cases be conducted in such a manner as to attract public attention and excite public interest. This would be accomplished by having the prize essays read and the prizes awarded at public meetings, at which there might also be discussion of the essays themselves or of other suitable themes.

Particular attention was called to the vital importance to our country of the education of the foreign-born population in the principles of American institutions and the duty of the Sons of the American Revolution in this line of work.

The Flag Committee Report was presented by Mr. Edward B. Moore, President of the District of Columbia Society, in the absence of General Vincent, Chairman. The report reviewed legislation relative to punishment for desecration, mutilation, or improper use of the Flag of the United States. Thirty-four States have passed laws during the last ten years making such acts of desecration criminal, and it was hoped that the United States Congress might also pass such a law, but final action to that end has so far failed.

Organization Committee.—Dr. Clarkson N. Guyer, Chairman of Committee on Organization for the North and West, submitted a report on work in North Dakota, South Dakota, New Mexico, and Idaho. The New Mexico Society was organized at Albuquerque on December 26, 1908, and the Idaho Society at Boise, on April 8, 1909.

The report of Major Wm. Frye Tebbetts, Chairman of Organization in the South, showed that the requisite number of eligible applicants were approved for a Society in Mississippi, soon to be formally organized. In Georgia and South Carolina progress was reported.

Pension and Muster Rolls,—Mr. W. L. Marsh, for the Committee on Pension and Muster Rolls, reported that but little progress has been made in the Pension Bureau in the work of carding the Revolutionary pension papers. The total number of cases is 62,069. Of these 11,713 have been summarized and carded.

In January, 1909, a resolution was introduced in the Massachusetts State Senate urging the propriety and advantage of making public these records of the War of the Revolution.

The Committee recommended that delegates of this Congress use their influence individually, and by State Society resolutions, with the Senators and Representatives in the United States Congress from their respective States, asking them to take such action as may be necessary to complete the summary cards or digests of the Revolutionary pension papers at an early date.

The Delaware Society subsequently presented to the Congress a resolution urging early publication of the rolls of Revolutionary soldiers, and the resolution was referred to the Executive Committee for action.

The Committee on National Parks submitted a printed report, signed W. V. Cox, Chairman, giving an account of work done by the States and by the National Government in the establishment of national parks and the improvement and preservation of historic sites, particularly in the State of New York. The Committee also called attention to the setting apart by the United States of Forest Reserves, and the preservation of forests, and the establishment of National Military Parks.

LOCAL CHAPTERS.—Dr. Moses Greeley Parker, Chairman of the special committee on local Chapters, reported on progress made toward the more effective organization of Chapters. He referred to the committee's recommendations published in the March Official Bulletin, and stated that there are at present 76 Chapters numbering 2,760 members.

The Colorado Society has recently organized a Chapter in Denver, which includes all members of the State Society who are not enrolled in either the Colorado Springs or Greeley Chapters.

On motion of Doctor Parker, it was voted that the special committee on local Chapters be made a standing committee under the name of the Advisory Committee on Chapters to further consider the details of this plan and communicate with the several State Societies, and aid them to the extent of their ability, with directions to report to the Executive Committee when called on for such report.

THE PUBLICATION COMMITTEE reported, through Doctor Parker, that the National Year Book for 1908 had been published in an edition of 750 copies, and mailed direct from Washington to the General Officers, Trustees, National Committees, Officers of State Societies, and Delegates to the Buffalo Congress. This method of distribution was found more effective than sending the books in bulk to State Secretaries. The Committee recommended a like distribution for the 1909 Year Book.

The Official Bulletin was entered as second-class matter May 7, 1908, at the post-office in Washington, D. C., under the Act of Congress of July 16, 1894. It was issued in May, October, December, and March in an edition of 12,000 copies for each number, and was mailed to every member of the Society. The appropriation for the work was \$1,800 and the actual cost was \$1,767. The Committee's recommendation that a like appropriation be made for the coming year was referred to the Executive Committee.

COMMITTEE ON INFORMATION FOR ALIENS.—Commander John H. Moore, U. S. N., Chairman, reported as follows:

"During the year 358,529 copies of leaflet No. I have been distributed. The following languages were called for: Bohemian, 15,934; Croatian, 10,150; Danish, 9,315; English, 39,779; German, 15,885; Greek, 8,635; Italian, 47,080; Lithuanian, 5,811; Magyar, 51,770; Polish, 98,815; Slovak, 7,445; Slovinian, 8,215; Swedish, 9,135; Yiddish. 30,560.

"This work has been accomplished through the aid of our different State Societies, the Daughters of the American Revolution, and the Department of Commerce and Labor. Leaflet No. II, 'Naturalization of Aliens, How to Become Citizens, What is Required, Rights and Duties,' having been approved by the Department of Commerce and Labor, it was printed in English and over 50,000 copies have been distributed.

"The demand for both leaflets has been steadily increasing. A number of our large corporations have distributed thousands among their workmen. They have been used extensively in the night schools of our larger cities, and Neighborhood Houses and Welfare Clubs have distributed them in large numbers.

"It is to be regretted that with the change of administration the Department of Commerce and Labor will no longer publish our leaflets. We are greatly indebted to the Hon. T. V. Powderly, Chief of the Division of Information, for his hearty coöperation during the past year, and we will undoubtedly in the future have his support in the distribution of our leaflets through his branch offices at labor centers.

"We can see no reason why our Society should not continue the publication and distribution of these leaflets unaided, as it is undoubtedly one of the most patriotic works that our Society was organized to per-

form.

"We do not recommend the distribution of the naturalization leaflet in foreign languages, as aliens to become naturalized must master our language to a certain degree, and supplying them with it in English will be only another incentive for them to study our language."

The report of the Committee was supplemented with statements by Mr. Marble and Mr. Richardson as to progress made in distributing the leaflets in New York and in Cleveland. Mr. Richardson spoke of the importance of getting in touch with large manufacturing establishments and other employers of foreign labor. The importance of educating aliens was also discussed by Major Veale, of Philadelphia, and attention was called to the advantage of cooperation between this Society and church clubs in solving social and economic questions in connection with immigration.

The afternoon session was opened with prayer by the Chaplain General, Rev. Dr. Frank Oliver Hall.

THE TRAVELING BANNER.—Dr. Clarkson N. Guyer, representing the Colorado Society that presented the "traveling banner" to the National Society in 1907, made the presentation address to the Maryland Society, which, next to Colorado, had made the greatest percentage of gain in membership during the year. Colorado this year, as well as last, relinquished its right to receive the banner, but gave notice that it would enter the contest for the year to come. President Gaither received the banner in behalf of the Maryland Society.

STATE REPORTS.—The Secretary General submitted the annual reports of the State Societies and they were ordered printed in the proceedings of the Congress.

Delinquent Members.—The following resolution, offered by a delegate from California, was referred to the Executive Committee:

"Resolved, That no member of a Society shall be a delegate to or a member of an annual or special meeting of a Congress or shall be elected as an officer or be a member of a committee of the National Society unless he is a member in good standing in the State Society to which he belongs."

PORTO RICO.—Mr. Marble, of New York, read a letter from Compatriot Wilcox, of Porto Rico, calling attention to conditions there and to the propriety of the Sons of the American Revolution taking definite action toward the promotion of American patriotism among the people of that island. The letter was referred to the Executive Committee with the request that the matter be taken up by correspondence with Judge Wilcox.

GRAVES OF THE "SIGNERS."—Major Veale, of Philadelphia, called the attention of the Congress to the work done by the Pennsylvania Society in placing in good condition the grave of John Morton, signer of the Declaration of Independence, in the old Saint Paul burial ground at Chester. He also told of the publication, through a committee of the Philadelphia Chapter, of an illustrated pamphlet giving a history of the graves of the Pennsylvania Signers, where they are located, how they are marked, and what care is bestowed upon them. A similar pamphlet has since been published regarding the Connecticut Signers. Major Veale urged that like action be taken in the other original States, and offered to assist in the preparation of the pamphlets if the State Societies would send him photographs of the graves.

It was thereupon voted that each of the remaining eleven original States be requested to have prepared a publication similar to that already issued in Pennsylvania and Connecticut.

Mrs. Donald McLean, ex-President General, and Mrs. Matthew T. Scott, President General, of the National Society of Daughters of the American Revolution, were introduced and addressed the Congress.

JEFFERSON MONUMENT.—Mr. Caleb Clark Magruder, Jr., offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

"Resolved, That a committee be appointed, of which the presiding officer and his successor shall be members, to investigate what plans, if any, have been formulated by the Thomas Jefferson Memorial Association regarding the erection at the National Capital of a suitable monument to Thomas Jefferson as the author of the Declaration of Independence; and if such committee shall find that no such plans have been formulated, or are in contemplation, that then said committee, upon approval of the Executive Committee, be authorized to issue to the several State Societies an earnest appeal to lend their coöperation toward the realization of such project."

Washington's Inauguration Anniversary.—On motion by Historian General Watkins, it was voted that the Congress place upon its records recognition of the fact that the day of the meeting of this Congress was the 120th anniversary of the inauguration of President Washington and also the 20th anniversary of the formation of this Society as a national organization.

CHANGE OF INAUGURATION DAY.—On motion by Rev. J. L. Hartsock, of New York, it was voted that this Congress request the Congress of the United States to change the date of the inauguration of the President of the United States from March 4 to April 30, the date of the inauguration of President Washington in 1789.

LIBERTY BELL.—A resolution was offered, discussed, and referred to the Board of Trustees concerning the exhibit of the "Liberty Bell" at the Seattle Exposition.

[At the Annapolis session, on May I, the vote referring the resolution to the Trustees was reconsidered, the question further discussed, and it was voted to lay the resolution on the table.]

Telegrams were received from Col. Arthur H. Price, President of the Oklahoma Society, and from Robt. E. Lee Cresap, Secretary of the Florida Society, sending the greetings of those Societies to the National Congress.

At 4 o'clock the Congress adjourned, to meet in the State House at Annapolis on May 1.

Annapolis Session.—The Congress reconvened in the State House at Annapolis at 2 p. m., May 1. President General Stockbridge introduced Governor Crothers, who spoke of the present need of the active application of a practical patriotism. "The Sons of the American Revolution is exemplifying that spirit, and is helping to raise the standard of citizenship."

Dr. Arthur B. Bibbins, Historian of the Maryland Society, read an account of the historical happenings in the old Senate chamber.

Warfield Resolutions.—Ex-President General Pugsley, President of the Empire State Society, offered the following resolutions, which were unanimously adopted:

"Whereas, during the administration of Honorable Edwin Warfield, former President General of this Society, as Governor of the State of Maryland, the old Senate chamber in the State House at Annapolis, which we have this day visited, was restored to the form, style, and appearance it had at the time there occurred therein Revolutionary incidents of such great historic importance and of such hallowed memories; therefore

"Be it resolved, by the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, in Congress assembled in the city of Annapolis, that we extend to our compatriot and former President General, Honorable Edwin Warfield, an expression of our appreciation of the patriotic service that he has rendered to his State and the nation in accomplishing

this work.

"Resolved further, That we extend to Compatriot Warfield our sincere thanks for this evidence of his interest in the great cause of patriotism, and for the credit he has reflected upon the organization of which he has been such a useful member."

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.—The President General declared election of officers to be next in order.

Hon. Morris B. Beardsley, of Bridgeport, Conn., was nominated for President General, and by unanimous vote the Secretary General was instructed to cast the ballot of the Congress for his election.

Major Veale, Dr. C. N. Guyer, Mr. Sargent, Mr. Secor, Colonel Pescud, and Mr. Henry M. Baker were nominated for Vice-Presidents General, and, being balloted for, the first five were declared elected, and the order of their seniority was determined by lot, as required by Art. V, Sec. I, of the Constitution. The other General Officers were then duly elected. The result of the election was as follows:

ELECTION OF TRUSTEES.—The Congress then proceeded to the election of a Trustee for each State Society. The Secretary General announced the names of nominees filed by State Societies prior to April I, and by unanimous vote the Secretary General was instructed to cast the vote of the Congress for the election of such nominees and for the election of the Presidents of State Societies that had failed to make nominations as required by Sec. 4 of the Act of Incorporation and Art. V, Sec. 2, of the Constitution. The result of the election was as follows:

GOLD INSIGNIA.—The President General announced that the gold insignia presented by a friend of the Society to be given to the State Society enrolling during the past year the greatest proportional number of sons of members had been awarded to the Michigan Society, and Secretary Williams C. Harris received the insignia in behalf of that Society.

On motion by Mr. Dewey, it was voted that:

"There shall be sent to the Historian General, each year on April 1, by the Historian of each State Society, a full account of the patriotic work done during the year and celebrations observed or participated in, with lists of the memorials placed during the year. These returns shall be compiled by the Historian General and presented to the Congress in his annual report. This report may also include any original matter not before published relating to the Revolution."

Votes of Thanks.—Resolutions of thanks were unanimously voted to Governor Crothers, to the committees and members of the Maryland Society, to the Maryland Chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and to others who had extended such generous hospitality to the delegates and guests at the Congress.

There being no further business, the Congress, at 4 o'clock, adjourned without day.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, MAY 1, 1909.

A meeting of the new Board of Trustees elected at Annapolis, Md., May I, 1909, duly called by the President General, was held at the Hotel Belvedere, Baltimore, at 6 p. m., May I. Present: President General Beardsley, who presided; President E. B. Moore, of the District of Columbia Society; Mr. Ames, of California; President Pugsley, of the Empire State Society; Vice-President General Guyer; Colonel Guthrie, of Pennsylvania; President Curtis, of Connecticut; Mr. Stockbridge, of

Maryland; Mr. Wentworth, of Iowa; Historian General Watkins, Treasurer General Burroughs, and Secretary General Clark.

The President General nominated the following Executive Committee, and, on motion by Mr. Pugsley, the nominations were approved:

The selection of place of meeting for the Twenty-first Annual Congress in 1910 was referred to the Executive Committee.

It was voted that the present plan of printing and distributing the Official Bulletin under the direction of the Secretary General be approved and continued, and that an appropriation of \$1,800 be made for the expenses thereof.

An appropriation not to exceed \$1,000 was voted for printing and distributing the National Year Book for 1909, and the Secretary General was authorized to condense the contents as may be deemed advisable with the approval of the President General.

An appropriation not to exceed \$1,500 was voted for the printing and distribution of leaflets Nos. 1 and 2, under the direction of the Committee on Information for Aliens.

An appropriation of \$75, or so much thereof as may be necessary, was voted for printing and incidental expenses of the Committee on Education, subject to the approval of the President General.

It was voted that the time of transfer of certain funds of the Society from present interest-bearing accounts be left to the judgment of the Treasurer General and the President General.

It was voted that the question of continuance of special committees be referred to the Executive Committee.

It was voted that the President General be authorized to refer to the Executive Committee for their action any matters not acted upon by the Trustees and such new business as in the judgment of the President General may not require the action of the Board.

The Secretary General was authorized to have manufactured a new supply of medals to be awarded to members for service in the War with Spain, subject to the approval of the President General.

It was voted that the necessary expenses and the salary of the Secretary General and Registrar General be paid as during the past year.

There being 10 further business, the Board then, at 7 o'clock p. m., adjourned.

PROCEEDINGS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, MAY 2, 1000.

A meeting of the Executive Committee, duly called by the President General, was held at the Hotel Belvedere, Baltimore, at 9 a. m., May 2, 1909. Wilcox, a member of the Society, resident in Porto Rico, referred to the Committee by the Congress, was read and the President General was authorized to appoint a committee to correspond with Mr. Wilcox and to determine to what extent it may be practicable to proceed toward the organization of a Society in Porto Rico, or how far it may be possible to operate through the schools in advancing American patriotism in the way proposed by him.

It was voted that the place of meeting of the Congress of 1910 be referred to President General Beardsley, Mr. Curtis, and Mr. Marble as a special committee.

It was voted that the President General be empowered to act for the Executive Committee in matters not already acted upon that may need attention after the full proceedings of the Baltimore Congress and of the Trustees' meeting on May I and the meeting of the Executive Committee on May 2 had been written up.

It was voted that condensation of reports of officers and of State Societies for publication in the National Year Book be left to the discretion of the Secretary General.

It was voted that until otherwise decided there be no further setting up or making electrotype blocks of leaflet No. 2 in foreign languages.

It was voted that the draft of a constitution proposed for the use of new State Societies and for the possible improvement of present Societies be submitted to each member of the Executive Committee for examination before publication.

The Secretary General was authorized to announce that, beyond the regular distribution, such copies of National Year Books as are available will be supplied to members on payment of postage.

A resolution from the Delaware Society, calling upon the Congress of the United States to publish the muster and pension rolls of the Revolutionary War, was referred to the Special Committee on Pension and Muster Rolls. A resolution referred to the Executive Committee by the Congress as to status of members not in good standing in State Societies was considered and on motion was laid on the table.

It was voted that the present special committees be continued. The Committee then, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., adjourned.

Saturday evening the delegates were the guests of the Maryland Society at a most elaborate banquet in the ball-room of the Belvedere, participated in by more than three hundred delegates and members, and at the same time about a hundred ladies of the party and Maryland Daughters were given a banquet in the adjacent assembly hall.

Gen. Clinton L. Riggs, Vice-President of the Maryland Society, introduced Hon. George R. Gaither, President of the Society, as toastmaster, who welcomed the compatriots of the Congress and spoke of the deeds of Maryland in the Revolution. nois, "The Society in the Great West"; ex-President General Cornelius A. Pugsley, "Ladies and Maryland"; President General Judge Morris A. Beardsley, of Bridgeport, Conn., "The Future of the Society"; and retiring President General Judge Henry Stockbridge.

THE HAWAIIAN SOCIETY announces the death, on March 23, of Rev. Sereno Edwards Bishop, D. D., born in Hawaii February 7, 1827. He was a son of Artemas Bishop, an early missionary to the Hawaiian Islands. He graduated from Amherst College in 1846. For many years he was correspondent of the Washington Star under the name Kamehameha. An article of his in the Review of Reviews in 1891 was the origin of the title "Crossroads of the Pacific," since so generally applied to the Hawaiian Islands.

The Idaho Society was organized at Boise, Idaho, on April 8, 1909, with twenty charter members. Dr. Clarkson N. Guyer, Mr. Joseph F. Tuttle, Jr., and Mr. Frank M. The Massachusets Society, on June 19, dedicated at Valley Forge their bay of the Cloister of the Colonies in the Washington Memorial Chapel, being the first State Society to donate a bay.

The Connecticut Society has completed plans for the erection of a beautiful memorial on Compo Beach, where the British landed in their raid on Danbury.

These are but a few items of accomplishments which it is hoped will render this a record year for our Society.

The work among the immigrants is being vigorously carried forward by the energetic and able committee who have it in charge, and a large number of leaflets are being distributed among the newcomers to our shores.

The report of the Registrar General at the Baltimore Congress showed a gratifying increase in our membership, but much remains to be done along this line, and I wish to recall and repeat the appeals of my immediate predecessors on this subject.

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DOINGS OF STATE SOCIETIES.

THE CALIFORNIA SOCIETY on Sunday, September 5th, commemorated the 126th anniversary of the Treaty of Paris by song, praise and addresses, under the auspices of the Bishop, Rector and Clergy of Trinity Episcopal Church, San Francisco. Addresses were delivered by Rt. Rev. Wm. Ford Nichols, D. D., Bishop of California; and by Hon. Edward Robeson Taylor, Mayor of San Francisco, on the "Perpetuity of the American Nation,"

This Treaty, whereby George the Third, King of England, acknowledged the thirteen American Colonies of the United States to be Free. Sovereign and Independent, was dated at Paris the 3d of September, 1783, ratified by the Continental Congress January 14, 1784, and proclaimed the same date. Signed by D. Hartley, member of Parliament, on behalf of his Britannic Majesty, and by John Adams, Benjamin Franklin and John Jay on the part of the United States, acknowledging New Hampshire, Massachusetts Bay, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia, to be Free, Sovereign and Independent States.

Mr. Edwin Bonnell, 101 Montgomery St., San Francisco, has been elected Secretary and Treasurer of the Society, former Secretary Moss having resigned from that office.

THE COLORADO SOCIETY continues active in building up its own organization and in recruiting members as nuclei for new State Societies in the West.

The Colorado Springs Chapter held its annual business meeting and banquet on April 30, when patriotic addresses were delivered by President Houghton of the Colorado Society, and Compatriot J. F. Tuttle. The Chapter elected the following officers: President and Chairman of the Board of Managers, Dr. W. W. Arnold; First Vice-President, A. Cornforth; Second Vice-President, O. E. Collins; Chaplain, L. E. Sherman; Secretary, E. B. Beeson; Treasurer, L. H. Gowdy, re-elected; Historian, Lucius H. Rouse, re-elected; Registrar, M. E. Stubbs; Board of Managers, J. P. Barnes, F. H. Pettingell, B. A. Banta, M. Slaughter, W. B. Price.

THE CONNECTICUT SOCIETY, on September 16, held its annual outing at Morris Cove, near New Haven. About one hundred members of the Society, besides others prominent in public life of the State, were in attendance. At the meeting following a shore dinner, Col. N. G. Osborn

acted as toastmaster. Among the informal speakers were President General Beardsley, President Lewis B. Curtis, Gen. George Hare Ford, and ex-Gov. George P. McLean. Representative George H. Chandler delivered the address of the day on the importance of preparation for war as a means for preserving peace. Gen. E. E. Bradley made an historical address, as the place of meeting was near where British troops, under command of General Tryon, landed during the Revolutionary War, in an attempt to burn the town of New Haven.

On June 8 President General Beardsley was tendered a reception and banquet at Bridgeport by the General Silliman Chapter, when a large silver loving cup was presented to him as a testimonial from the board of managers and officers of the Connecticut Society. President Wells of the local Chapter, presided, and Hon. Stiles Judson served as toastmaster. Among the speakers were ex-President General Pugsley, Judge Battis, President of the Massachusetts Society, President Curtis of the Connecticut Society, Henry C. Sherwood, and Rev. John De Peu.

At a meeting of the Board of Managers of the Society, on June 21, a design for the Compo Beach monument was presented by the sculptor, H. Daniel Webster of New York. It represented a full-sized minute man, in bronze, picking off the British troops from behind two large boulders. Two tablets are also to be placed upon these boulders. The expense is estimated at about \$3,000. The Board of Managers voted to approve the design submitted, the details to be left with the special committee, subject to the acceptance by the State commission of sculpture. Roderick P. Curtis, of Southport, subscribed \$175 to build an iron fence around the park.

The District of Columbia Society participated in the public celebration on July 5 of Independence Day, by the Commissioners of the District of Columbia and prominent local organizations. Patriotic addresses were delivered and an appropriate program of ceremonies was observed.

Many members of the Society took an informal part in the dedication on July 3 of a shaft to the founder of the Grand Army of the Republic. On this occasion the President of the United States and many prominent men delivered addresses.

Although on account of the absence from this city of many members during the summer months it has been found not feasible to hold regular meetings from May until November, the time has been devoted to strengthening the organization internally. The President of the Society, Commissioner of Patents Edward B. Moore, is at present visiting various European capitals on official business.

Eight new members have been elected since the last issue of the OFFICIAL BULLETIN. The losses by death have been heavy.

THE FLORIDA SOCIETY, at its 13th annual meeting on April 19, elected the following officers, all of Pensacola: President, John Hobart Cross; Vice-President, Frank B. Bruce, Secretary, R. E. L. Cresap; Registrar-Treasurer, F. F. Bingham.

It was voted to repair and keep in perfect condition the grave of Dorothy Walton, wife of George Walton, one of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence from Georgia. The grave had recently been discovered in one of the cemeteries in Pensacola.

THE IOWA Society during the last school year offered medals to wenty-five colleges in Iowa for the best essays on American history. Nineteen colleges accepted the offer and fifteen of them carried the comnetition through, presenting medals to the following winners: Salene M. Williams, Central University, Chariton; H. Hale Smith, State University, Tamoine: James Haynes, State Teachers' College, Cedar Falls: Warren Howard Hartman, Cornell College, Belle Plaine; Alice Miller, Simpson College, Indianola; Arthur E. Yount, Leander Clark College, Toledo; Harold Sanborn Craig, Upper Iowa University, Fayette; Hazel Rhodes, Tobin College, Duncombe; Myrtle Rice, Tabor College, Tabor; Harold Greene, Iowa College of Agriculture, Scranton; William Lee, Memorial University, Mason City; Zula Floyd Correll, Morningside College, Odebolt: Madara D. Fezler, Iowa College, Rock Island, Ill.: Edwin Stringfellow, Drake University, Oskaloosa; Paul B. Galer, Iowa Weslevan University, Mt. Pleasant: Hattie Scheerer, Tobin College, Fort Dodge.

In addition to the offer of medals to colleges by the Society, medals were offered to high schools and competitions had in six schools, viz: Offered by O. B. Fry, at North High, Des Moines, won by Ethlyn Reinking; offered by F. M. Hubbell, at West High, Des Moines, won by Paul Stanley Booth; offered by J. C. Copeland, at Chariton, won by Anna H. Slattergren; offered by Eugene Secor, at Forest City, won by Maud Ray; offered by A. B. Beall, at Sioux City, won by Ruth Worth; offered by L. E. Orcutt, at Council Bluffs, won by John W. Brooks.

Secretary Elbridge D. Hadley has been particularly active in this work. He says:

"The patriotic public spirit that prompted these offers at the expense of the donors should be commended. They stand out a class by themselves in their interest in the promotion of the objects of these competitions. Some others were anxious to bring about results in high schools in which they were interested, but circumstances were not favorable. It is probable that the high schools will be given greater attention next

year, but that a medal of different design will be struck for use in such

"Several of the History Medals were publicly presented to the recipients by compatriots who were conveniently located to be present at the public exercises of graduation or commencement."

The Maine Society, on June 15, participated in the unveiling, at Eastern Cemetery, Portland, of a monument in memory of nearly a hundred soldiers and sailors of the Revolutionary War whose graves have been located within the city limits. The monument was erected by the Elizabeth Wadsworth Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The principal addresses were by Mrs. Alfred A. Kendall and Judge Oliver G. Hall, President of the Maine Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. The invocation was by Rev. Joseph Battell Shepherd, rector of St. Paul's Church and Secretary of the Maine Society. In his oration Judge Hall said in part:

"For 20 years these societies have worked to revive the old reverence for the holy things of the Revolutionary era. The panorama of that war, which was becoming a faded picture, and more especially Maine's place in it—always obscure—its figures faint of outline—is being restored.

"You are assembled to recall and honor the names of some of these patriots which were in danger of being forgotten, and to dedicate and pass on to the generations to follow, this memorial to the manhood and heroism of some of them who long have slept in undistinguished graves; men

'Who cared not to be great, But as they saved or served the State.'

"You thus rescue from the clutch of oblivion names which are henceforth to be remembered, and not only remembered but ennobled; for it is the teaching of history that it is better to be nobly remembered than to be nobly born.

"At no time before, in the century and a third of our nation's life, has there been a more opportune civic movement than the organization of these patriotic societies, whose main purpose is to inspire the American people with a more profound reverence for the principles of government founded by our forefathers.

"The spirit of gratitude toward them needs fostering. Their lives, their sacrifices in laying the foundation of the government need frequently to be recalled.

'Lest we forget-lest we forget.'

"No other names, however great, in the history of the intervening years should be permitted to eclipse or obscure them. Their names, their fame, their achievements—from the greatest to the humblest—are the peculiar care of the Daughters and Sons of the American Revolution. Whoever may have won greatness; whoever may deserve honor and gratitude among the patriotic and noble men and women of this country, and they have been many, as the wreaths still fragrant in all

the graveyards of the land proclaim, it is for these societies to see to it that the Revolutionary fathers and mothers shall still have their just meed of honor and gratitude."

In the Portland Sunday Times of June 13 there was printed an article by Nathan Goold, Librarian of the Maine Society, in which he reviews the part taken by Portland in the War of the Revolution, and records the names of 92 Revolutionary patriots whose graves have been located and marked.

The Massachusetts Society, on June 19, the 131st anniversary of the evacuation of the encampment by the Continental Army, dedicated the Massachusetts bay in the Cloister of the Colonies of the Washington Memorial Chapel at Valley Forge. The bay is the gift of the Society, erected at a cost of \$2,000, one-half of which sum was contributed by individual members and the remainder appropriated from the Society treasury. About twenty-five Massachusetts officers and members attended the dedication. The exercises are printed in full in "The Washington Chapel Chronicle" of July 15, 1909, published at Valley Forge. Addresses were made by Mr. Charles French Read, Chairman of the Committee on Dedication and Historian of the Society; Hon. Edward C. Battis, President; Rev. James De Wolf Perry, D. D., of the Diocese of Pennsylvania. Rev. Lewis Wilder Hicks, Chaplain of the Society, delivered an oration on "The Soldier of the American Revolution at his best at Valley Forge," which has been separately published.

The inscription carved in the structural stone of the bay is as follows: To the Glory of God—In honor of their Ancestors—and in lasting memory—of the—Soldiers of Massachusetts—encamped at Valley Forge during—the winter of 1777-1778,—this Bay is erected by the—Massachusetts Society.—Sons of the American Revolution,—1909.

It is planned that each of the thirteen original colonies shall be represented in the Cloister.

On September 25 the Massachusetts Society held its annual fall meeting at Salem. The principal events of the day were the dedication of a memorial tablet to Capt. Jonathan Haraden, a Revolutionary naval captain, the decoration of his grave in the Broad Street cemetery, and the paying of tributes to his memory by addresses at a banquet in Ames Memorial Hall. The tablet was placed on the house where Captain Haraden died. The inscripton is as follows:

Captain Jonathan Haraden,—A Patriot Distinguished For—His Daring, Skill And Success—As a Commander of Armed Vessels—in The War For American Independence Lived Here—During the Later Years of his Life,—He Commanded the Massachusetts State Brigantine

Tyrannicide In—1777-8 And The Privateer Ships—General Pickering—In 1780, And Julius Cæsar in 1782.—He Died Here November 23d, 1803—Aged Fifty-Nine Years.—"He Was a Hero Among Heroes."—And His Name Should Live In—Honored And Affectionate Remembrance.—Placed By the Massachusetts Society—Sons of the American Revolution—September 25th, 1909.

Besides the officers of the Massachusetts Society those present at the banquet included Rev. Howard F. Hill, President of the New Hampshire Society; President William Chace Greene, of the Rhode Island Society, and about 200 members and invited guests. Addresses were made by Presidents Battis, Greene, and Hill, and Gen. Philip A. Read, U. S. A. An extended account of the life of Captain Haraden was given by Dr. Frank A. Gardner, President of the Old Salem Chapter.

Dr. Elmer H. Copeland has been elected President of Seth Pomeroy Chapter of Northampton, Mass., to succeed President Story, who died on July 24.

The New Hampshire Society held its annual meeting, at Concord on September 8, and elected the following officers: President, Rev. Howard F. Hill, Concord; Vice-Presidents, F. W. McKinley, Manchester, H. H. Metcalf, Concord, William F. Whitcher, Woodsville; Secretary, Rufus H. Baker, Concord; Historian, Henry H. Metcalf, Concord; Registrar, William P. Fiske, Concord; Chaplain, Rev. Lucius Waterman, Hanover. On October 8 there was admitted to membership James B. McGregor, aged 108, born at Newport, N. H., September 6, 1801. His father, Joel McGregor, served as private in the Third Connecticut Line and was a prisoner in the "Sugar House," New York.

The New Jersey Society, on June 29, celebrated the 131st anniversary of the battle of Monmouth, at Spring Lake, N. J., about 250 members and guests being in attendance. Addresses were delivered at the New Monmouth Hotel by Judge Edward S. Atwater, President of the New Jersey Society; Governor Fort, ex-President; Rev. Dr. William F. Whitaker, and Rev. Dr. A. A. Willitts, of Spring Lake, who is eighty-eight years old. Dr. Willitts chose "Patriotism" as his topic. He urged those present to take an interest in all matters pertaining to the welfare of the government and praised New Jersey in glowing terms. He declared that women are already doing their share in maintaining patriotism.

Governor Fort spoke in part as follows:

"The more I see of public life the more I am impressed with patriotic societies. We are living in rapid times, and men do not seem to care where the times are leading us to. Nearly all of the great inventions

have come within our day. In the midst of wonderful industrial and scientific progress we are likely to forget what we are, how we are and why we are. We have a great State and a great nation, and the question arises how long can we keep them right. To do so we must stand for civic righteousness. We must leave behind us clean lives, pure service and a record of the public weal promoted. It is better for our children to leave them that than to leave them money. Let us keep our eye upon the public good, and patriotism is going to live after we go. * * * Every man in this republic and every woman should do his or her share. Those are just the things that societies stand for."

Judge Atwater, spoke of the Battle of Monmouth as one of the most interesting of the Revolution. He told of the circumstances that led up to it and its results, and mentioned its most striking incidents. He also told of the growth of the Society and its objects.

"One of our objects," he said, "is patriotism that makes for good citizenship, in voting at primaries and general elections, to have opinions on public questions and to stand for them. The stability of our government depends on the intelligence and patriotism of the people."

THE EMPIRE STATE SOCIETY took an active part in the Hudson-Fulton celebration in New York during the week of September 27-October 2, particularly in the Historical parade on September 28, in manning the floats representing "Washington's Coach," "Pulling down the statue of King George," and "Publishing the Constitution." The Society erected a reviewing stand with 2,100 seats for the use of its members and friends during the week. Many members of the Society served on committees in charge of various features of this great celebration.

The Ohio Society, through the Benjamin Franklin Chapter at Columbus, has for the past three years participated in a movement to revive what is termed an "Old-fashioned Fourth of July Celebration," the exercises including music, addresses, and reading of the Declaration of Independence.

THE OKLAHOMA SOCIETY, on June 17, held a reception at the home of Secretary Buxton at Oklahoma City, with the Daughters of the American Revolution as guests.

The Oregon Society, on the evening of September 23, celebrated the 130th anniversary of the naval battle between the "Serapis" and the "Bonhomme Richard." The paper of the evening, on the life and public services of John Paul Jones, was furnished by Compatriot H. L. Bates, principal of the Tualatin Academy at Forest Grove. About seventy-five gentlemen were present, a larger attendance than ever before at that character of a gathering. Gen. Thomas M. Anderson was called on and spoke extemporaneously.

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The Rhode Island Society, on May 30, carried out the program announced in the May Bulletin. At Hopkins Park, Providence, tribute to the memory of the soldiers and sailors of the Revolution, with special reference to Admiral Esek Hopkins, was paid by the Sons of the American Revolution, assisted by the pupils of the Branch Avenue grammar school. The program consisted of singing of patriotic songs, addresses by William C. Greene, President of the Society; and by William A. Spicer on "Lessons of the Day;" the reading of the Declaration of Independence in Italian by Compatriot Amasa M. Eaton; an address in Italian by Mr. Marseglia; an essay on "The Significance of Memorial Day," by Miss Cameron, of the Branch Avenue school, and an original address on Esek Hopkins by Albert Sumption, another pupil of the school.

Toledo is said to be "an ideal modern convention city, rich in historical interest." A cordial welcome and ample accommodation for the business of the Congress and the comfort and entertainment of delegates are promised by those extending the invitation.

Details will be announced by special notice to State Societies as soon as the programme is completed, and full particulars will be published in the March Official Bulletin. Information may be obtained from the Committee on Arrangements.

Gold Insignia.—The Executive Committee again reminds Compatriots that through the generosity of a friend of the Society a full-sized gold insignia of the Sons of the American Revolution is offered, as in the past year, to the State Society which during the present Society year shall add to its membership the largest proportional number of sons of active members. The insignia will be presented at the Toledo Congress. It is recommended to the State Society so winning this insignia that it be given to one of the sons of members so secured. The Michigan Society received the insignia at the Baltimore Congress.

THE "TRAVELING BANNER," presented to the National Society by the Colorado Society, and awarded to the Maryland Society at the Baltimore Congress, will be awarded at the Toledo Congress to the State Society of one hundred members or more that shows the largest percentage of increase in members during the present Society year. The Colorado Society has twice been entitled to the Banner and generously declined to accept it, but this year enters the competition.

The Committee can supply leaflet No. 1 in any quantity in English, Italian, Yiddish, Polish, Magyar, Slovinian, Slovak, Croatian, Swedish, Greek, Bohemian, German, Norwegian-Danish, and Lithuanian. Leaflet No. 2, Naturalization, is in English only.

PROCEEDINGS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, NOVEMBER 20, 1909.

A meeting of the National Executive Committee, duly called by order of the President General, was held at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, New

York city, at 1.30 p. m., Saturday, November 20, 1909.

Present: President General Beardsley, who presided; Mr. Nelson A.

Present: President General Beardsley, who presided; Mr. Nelson A. McClary, of Illinois; Commander John H. Moore, U. S. N., of the District of Columbia; Mr. William A. Marble, of New York; Dr. Moses G. Parker, of Massachusetts, and Mr. Louis B. Curtis, of Connecticut, members of the Committee; also Secretary General A. Howard Clark and Treasurer General John H. Burroughs.

The minutes of the meeting of the Committee at Baltimore on May 2,

1000, were read and approved.

The Special Committee on place of meeting of the Twentieth Annual Congress (President General Beardsley, Mr. Curtis, and Mr. Marble) reported that an invitation from the Anthony Wayne Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, the Chamber of Commerce, and citizens of Toledo, Ohio, to hold the Congress of 1910 in that city had been accepted. It was voted that the action of the Special Committee be approved and confirmed. It was voted that Mr. Nelson A. McClary, of Chicago; Col. Isaac F. Mack, of Sandusky, Ohio; Mr. William H. Marlatt, President of the Ohio Society, and Mr. William S. Walbridge and Mr. George E. Pomeroy, of the Anthony Wayne Chapter of Toledo, be a Special Committee, with authority to add to its membership and to have full charge of arrangements for the Toledo Congress under the provisions of Article XII of the National By-Laws.

It was voted that an appropriation of five hundred dollars (\$500) be placed at the disposal of the Special Committee on Arrangements

towards the expenses of the Toledo Congress.

The President General presented a communication from a committee appointed by the Board of Managers of the California Society to arrange with the National Board of Trustees if possible to hold the Congress of the National Society in San Francisco in 1911. The President General was requested to express the thanks of the Executive Committee for the invitation, which will be referred to the Toledo Congress and the next Board of Trustees.

The President General read a letter from Major Moses Veale, Chairman of the Memorial Committee, stating that a meeting of the committee was held on November 3 in Philadelphia, when Major Veale, Gen. Clinton L. Riggs and Professor Arthur B. Bibbins of Maryland, and Mr. Frederick H. Clarke of New Jersey, were present. Various

proposed memorials were discussed, including a monument in Independence Square, Philadelphia, to the memory of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence.

OFFICIAL BULLETIN

Commander Moore, of the Committee on Organization in the South, reported on progress made in South Carolina, and it was voted that Commander Moore be authorized to visit South Carolina in the interest of the Organization Committee with the hope of bringing about an early formation of a Society in that State.

The Secretary General read a letter from Judge Charles S. Lobingier, of Manila, a member of the Nebraska Society, concerning the organization of a Society in the Philippines, and the letter was ordered to be referred to Doctor Guyer, Chairman of the Committee on Organization in the North and West.

The Committee on Information for Aliens reported on progress made in the distribution of leaflets Nos. 1 and 2.

The Secretary General, for the Publication Committee, reported the completion and distribution of the National Year Book for 1909, as authorized at the Baltimore Congress. The surplus copies for all years are now exhausted except for 1903, 1905, and 1907. The Official Bulletin was printed and sent to all members in May and October at a total cost of \$696.21.

The Committee on Local Chapters, Doctor Parker, Chairman, reported progress, and it was voted that the Chapter Committee be given still further time to consider some method for a more definite unification of the organization of local chapters under the State Societies, and to report recommendations to the next meeting of the Executive Committee.

The Secretary General reported that the badge and rosette of the National Society have been registered in the office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts under the statutes of that State.

It was voted that Mr. McClary and Secretary General Clark be appointed a Special Committee to prepare a condensed statement of the patriotic work accomplished during the last twenty years by the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, to be used as a recruiting circular.

The President General presented letters from the Presidents of twenty-seven State Societies, showing the present condition and needs of the Societies, plans for future work, and offering suggestions for the development of the organization.

On motion by Mr. Curtis, it was voted that Commander Moore and Treasurer General Burroughs be appointed a Special Committee to consider and report on the advisability and feasibility of establishing an interest-bearing permanent fund or endowment fund, the income of which shall be used for such special purposes as may be decided upon by the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee.

There being no further business, the Committee then at 5 p. m. adjourned.

ADDITIONS TO MEMBERSHIP.

Twenty-four State Societies show an aggregate of 135 new members enrolled by the Registrar General from October 1 to November 30, 1909, as follows: California, 11; Colorado, 2; District of Columbia, 2; Illinois, 15; Indiana, 1; Iowa, 3, Kentucky, 4; Maine, 3; Maryland, 3; Massachusetts, 12; Michigan, 2; Minnesota, 3; Missouri, 1; Nebraska, 1; New Hampshire, 1; New Jersey, 13, New York, 24; Ohio, 8; Pennsylvania, 13; Rhode Island, 6; Texas, 2; Vermont, 1; Washington, 1; Wisconsin, 3. The enrolment includes Governor Deneen of Illinois, U. S. Assistant Attorney General Col. William Wallace Brown, and a number of other men of prominence. From New Hampshire is enrolled a compatriot, James Bellows McGregor, 108 years old, whose father, Joel McGregor, born 1760, died 1861, was a soldier in the Revolution. The next oldest member is Elijah Clark Sears, of the Connecticut Society, born June 23, 1805.

V DOINGS OF STATE SOCIETIES.

President General Beardsley, under date of November 1, wrote to the President of each State Society as follows:

BRIDGEPORT, CONN., Nov. 1, 1909.

There will be a meeting of the Executive Committee of the National Society, at New York City, Nov. 20, 1909. I am desirous to have before them the latest and fullest information about the different State Societies. Will you please send me a letter that will reach me before that date, telling us the condition of your Society; whether you are prospering; whether you are increasing your membership; some account of the work you are doing; and if you have difficulties and discouragements, what they are, and how our Committee can aid you.

Please also add any suggestions that you think will help us to increase the efficiency of the National Society.

Responses were received from twenty-seven Presidents, and much of the data is included in the paragraphs hereunder.

THE ARKANSAS SOCIETY is taking steps to arouse greater interest throughout the State, and there is some prospect of at least one local Chapter being organized through the aid of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

THE CALIFORNIA SOCIETY has appointed a special committee consisting of Col. A. D. Cutler, Mr. O. B. Baldwin, and Vice-President General George C. Sargent, "to take in hand the matter of securing the attendance of the Annual Congress of the National Society in San Francisco in 1911." The Society has established a Chapter in Los Angeles and expects soon to reorganize the Chapter in San Diego.

Every opportunity is taken advantage of to bring the Society prominently before the public by observing the anniversaries of the most notable events of the Revolution and by discussions of patriotic subjects.

On the occasion of banquets, receptions, and informal smokers guests are invited who are eligible and applications frequently result from the interest thus aroused. A press committee is charged with the duty of seeing that proper notice is given of these events in the daily papers. The last joint reception of the Sons and Daughters at the St. Francis Hotel, San Francisco, during Portala week, was pronounced the most successful as well as the most notable event of that period, and brought in a number of new applicants.

Col. A. D. Cutler, 510 Kohl Building, San Francisco, has been elected Treasurer, and Mr. Edwin Bonnell, 101 Montgomery St., has been made Secretary of the California Society.

THE COLORADO SOCIETY held a patriotic church service on Sunday evening, November 21, at St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Denver, in commemoration of the evacuation of New York by the British, November 25, 1783, when a sermon was delivered by the Chaplain of the Society, Rev. R. B. Peery, Ph. D., on "The Hand of God in History."

The Denver Chapter has established regular monthly meetings from October to April. "Keen interest is shown by a large number of members in these meetings and in the work planned by the State Society." On November 18, the topic of the meeting was "Japan" with addresses

by Gen. Irving Hale on "Japan as a World Power," and by Rev. R. B. Peerv on "The Rise of Japan."

On October 21 addresses were given by Compatriot William H. Seeds on "The United States, A World Power," and by Compatriot Harper Leiper on "Our Island Possessions." Mr. Seeds reviewed some of the important events indicating the broad power and influence of the United States. "Great wealth is not in itself a matter for boasting and often leads to arrogance and conceit, and may become a source of weakness. The development of our natural resources has brought an almost unexampled material prosperity that has played no small part in our attaining high position and influence."

"If this nation is to last long and its influence to continue great, the character of the nation must be founded upon the eternal principles of truth and righteousness. The individual members must be brought, and kept, under the influence of these great principles.

"In our relations as a government with other governments, we have almost invariably observed these laws and that fact is but a reflex of the national character; and what we have stood for as a nation promises a continuance in the path already followed.

"It behooves the true patriot, the real lover of his country,—to develop in his own inner self that loving, kindly spirit, that accepts all mankind as brothers."

THE CONNECTICUT SOCIETY has raised the funds requisite for the erection of a monument on Compo Beach in Westport to commemorate the landing of General Tryon in his raid on Danbury. The foundations are laid and the clay model is almost completed. It will be a bronze statue rather more than life size, of a Minute Man kneeling on one knee, musket in hand, watching for the enemy.

The District of Columbia Society held its regular meeting on November 17, when an address was delivered by Rev. J. Henning Nelms on the patriotic education of the negro. Mr. Paul Brockett of the Smithsonian Institution was elected Secretary in place of Mr. Chester M. Clark, who has removed to Boston. Monthly meetings will be held until May, 1910.

In many of the public schools in the District of Columbia on November election day the pupils were permitted to go through the motion of voting and the teachers explained to them the process of voting in the States and the meaning of the ballot. In the night schools, attended by hundreds of foreigners, lessons on citizenship and naturalization were given, the ballot was explained, and the Sons of the American Revolution leaflets were distributed.

The Illinois Society celebrated Yorktown Day, October 19th, by a banquet at the Chicago Athletic Association, attended by about 125 members and guests, including ladies. The presiding officer and toastmaster was Mr. Samuel E. Bliss, Vice-President of the Society. The speakers were President General Morris B. Beardsley, Major-General Frederick D. Grant, U. S. A.; Rev. John Timothy Stone, and Mrs. Ames, the State Regent of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

At the annual election on December 3 the following officers were chosen: President, Samuel E. Bliss, Metropolitan Trust and Savings Bank, Chicago; First Vice-President, John D. Vandercook; Second Vice-President, Henry B. Ferris; Secretary, Louis A. Bowman, Room 400 First National Bank Building, Chicago; Treasurer, Francis J. Cushing; Historian, Thomas M. Smith; Registrar, Llewellyn R. Atkins; Chaplain, Rev. John Timothy Stone; Sergeant-at-Arms, William P. Reed.

THE KENTUCKY SOCIETY held its annual meeting and banquet at the Tavern Club, Louisville, on October 19. The following officers were elected: President, George Lewis Danforth, Third and Main Sts., Louisville; Vice-President, Dr. L. H. Blanton, Danville; Secretary, Chas. Thruston Johnson, 207 Columbia Building, Louisville; Registrar, Benjamin La Bree, New Port; Treasurer, George Twyman Wood, 430 W. Main St., Louisville; Historian, George Griffith Fetter, Louisville; Chaplain, Very Rev. Charles Ewell Craik, Louisville.

THE LOUISIANA SOCIETY is planning to inaugurate a series of contests on historical subjects in the public schools of New Orleans. An immigration station on a large scale is to be established at that port by the U. S. Government and the Society proposes to do effective work in the distribution of the leaflets "Information for Immigrants." Vice-President General Peter F. Pescud, President of the Louisiana Society, says: "We are firm believers in the good effect upon aliens the educational work advocated by the National Society accomplishes, and will be only too glad to coöperate with the National Committee to render the cause service in every way in our power."

The Society on All Saints' Day, November I, continued its custom of strewing with flowers the graves of the Revolutionary soldiers buried in the old St. Louis Cemetery, New Orleans, some of the descendants of these patriots participating in the ceremonies. Among the graves thus decorated were those of Miguel Dragon, Sergeant in the Louisiana Militia in the Army of Galvez in 1779; Michel Fortier of the same service, and Benedict Francis Prandellis, an officer in Rochambeau's Army.

THE MARYLAND SOCIETY held its annual meeting at Hotel Belvedere, Baltimore, on October 19, when the following officers were elected: President, Admiral Yates Stirling, 209 W. Lanvale St., Baltimore; Vice-Presidents, James E. Hancock, George W. Hyde, T. Murray Maynadier, Gen. Clinton L. Riggs, Hon. Henry Stockbridge; Secretary, Dr. James D. Iglehart, 211 W. Lanvale St., Baltimore; Treasurer, Ira H. Houghton, 12 E. Lexington St., Baltimore; Registrar, Edward F. Arthurs, 628 Equitable Building, Baltimore; Historian, Prof. Arthur B. Bibbins, 2600 Maryland Ave., Baltimore; Chaplain, Rev. George W. Dame, D. D., Baltimore.

The Society received a set of handsomely engrossed and framed Resolutions from the New Jersey Society, thanking the Maryland Society for its hospitable entertainment at the last Congress at Baltimore and Annapolis.

Historian Bibbins reported as of special local interest the restoration of Mount Clare, the oldest pre-Revolutionary memorial in Baltimore, to its original design, as built by Charles Carroll, the barrister, in 1756. Carroll was one of the most distinguished men of his time and the author, in part, of most of the conspicuous State documents, the Maryland Declaration of Rights and the State Constitution. The Society purposes to gather in pamphlet form all available data regarding the Maryland signers of the Declaration, with photographs of the signers themselves, their homes and graves.

Vice-President James E. Hancock read a paper on "The Development of the Southern Campaign that Led up to the Surrender at Yorktown," including the surrender of Cornwallis and the closing of the war by the signing of the treaty of peace between England and the United States. The reader gave an epitome of the battles of Cowpens, Kings Mountain and Guilford Courthouse, of Greene's retreat through the Carolinas, of Cornwallis' retiring to Wilmington and to Yorktown, and of the final master stroke of Washington and Lafayette in surrounding Cornwallis at Yorktown and forcing his surrender.

Dr. Igelhart exhibited several photographs of the home of Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, portraits of him and his wife, and photographs of the chapel and monument in the Doughoregan Manor, in which Carroll was buried.

THE NEW HAMPSHIRE SOCIETY has issued a circular letter containing a series of questions intended as aids to persons inquiring about eligibility for membership in The Sons of the American Revolution. The letter enumerates sources of authentic records of service and states how satisfactory references may be obtained. President Howard F. Hill, of Concord, states "That carefully prepared hortatory circu-

lars have proved no good;" "individual solicitation is the only efficient means" of inducing eligible persons to become members.

The Maine Society reports that over 1,300 Revolutionary soldiers are known to have been buried in that State. President Oliver G. Hall hopes to see the time when every one of those soldiers who left descendants shall be represented in the Sons of the American Revolution.

THE MASSACHUSETTS SOCIETY is taking special interest in the development of the local Chapters, fifteen being already organized in that State. The Chapter Presidents are invited to attend the regular monthly meetings of the State Board of Managers.

The Boston Chapter held a "military night" at Young's Hotel on November 30. The Chapter President, John Stuart Barrows, Commander of Troop A, First Squadron of Cavalry, Mass. Vol. Militia, National Lancers, presided. Among the military members and guests in uniform were Brig.-Gen. William A. Pew, Jr., Brigadier General Darling, Commodore Sawyer, U. S. N. (retired); Col. R. H. Patterson, U. S. A.; Col. E. H. Eldredge, Capt. G. E. Lovett, Sergeant Paul, Corporal McIntire, and Private Moffett, of Troop A.

General Pew described the military maneuvers during the past summer participated in by the Mass. State Militia, of which he was in command, and by the regular troops of the U. S. Army. President Barrows suggested the desirability of the Sons of the American Revolution providing a memorial tablet to mark the birthplace in Boston of Gen. Henry Knox, who achieved distinction in the artillery service during the Revolution.

The Michigan Society held the first meeting of the season of 190910 on October 23, at the Hotel Ponchartrain, Detroit, when some
seventy-five members and guests tendered a reception, at noon, to Rev.
Frank Oliver Hall, D. D., of New York City, the Chaplain General
of the National Society, S. A. R. Luncheon was served at one o'clock,
in the private dining rooms, after which an hour was spent in informal
speechmaking by visiting compatriots, who were introduced by Mr.
Frank D. Taylor, President of Michigan Society. Dr. Hall, the guest
of honor, spoke on "Our Country," and was followed by Rev. R. F.
Johonnot, of Illinois; Hon. E. F. Endicott, Vice-President of Massachusetts Society; Rev. F. A. Gray, of Boston, and Rev. R. Perry Bush,
of Chelsea, Mass. Rev. Lee S. McCollester, Chaplain of Michigan
Society, recalled old associations with Dr. Hall, who was a college
classmate. All the speakers were in attendance at a church convention
in session in Detroit.

The Society has issued a Calendar for 1909-10, including announcement of the fourth series of historical and social meetings, names of members of the Society, and of its officers and various committees. The subjects for the historical meetings are as follows: November 19, "John Hancock," paper by Mr. Guy B. Cady; "Battle of Trenton," paper by Mr. C. Frederick Heyerman; January 28, "Nathan Dane," paper by Gen. H. M. Duffield; March 25, "Paine's Common Sense, an Influence That Determined National Independence," paper by Mr. George W. Bates; May 27, "Ethan Allen," paper by Mr. Enoch Smith.

THE NEBRASKA SOCIETY, on November 30, united with the Daughters of the American Revolution in a banquet at the Hotel Rome, Omaha, in celebration of the 127th anniversary of the acknowledgment by Great Britain of American Independence. It was attended by about 150 members of various patriotic State organizations, including a number from Lincoln, Fremont, and elsewhere throughout the State. President Ralph W. Breckenridge presided as toastmaster.

Mrs. Oreal S. Ward, State Regent, the first speaker of the evening, responded to the toast, "The Daughters of the American Revolution." She spoke of the growth of the order throughout the country, which had now a membership of over 75,000, and that its patriotic work and influence was increasing accordingly. She urged efforts to bring more members into the Sons' organization and thus enlarge its patriotic usefulness.

General Charles F. Manderson, responding to the sentiment, "The President of the United States;" told of the presidents he had met and known and observed that regardless of the politics of the President elected, he had ably and patriotically filled that office.

"Yorktown and the United States of Today" was the toast, in responding to which John L. Webster paid a tribute to the work accomplished by the founders of the government. He gave to Washington, Lafayette, Rochambeau and Hamilton special credit for the achievement culminating in the surrender at Yorktown.

Rev. Frank L. Loveland spoke of "America's Future." He maintained America would endure regardless of the prophecies of some men. He attributed the decadence of former republics and empires to the fact that they existed for but one or two ideas, and with the culmination and practice of these ideas that decadence inevitably followed. America was founded on a broader basis and upon progressive ideas of liberty and for the benefit of all the people, rather than for the aggrandizement of the few.

The New Mexico Society reports a present membership of 30 and President John W. Elder expresses the hope that there will be 50 on the

roll by February 22. The Society mourns the death on November 8 of Alexander McKay Whitcomb, one of the pioneers of Albuquerque.

The New Jersey Society is preparing a Year Book giving a history of the Society for the past five years. A committee has been appointed to prepare a report on the New Jersey Signers of the Declaration of Independence, with a view to securing the proper marking of their graves, as recommended at the Baltimore Congress.

Compatriot George C. Sterling, of Montclair, is forming a local Chapter at that place, and on January 4 its organization will be perfected.

The Orange Chapter, on November 9, gave a reception at East Orange to Judge Atwater, President of the State Society, and to the Elizabethtown Chapter, and the members who are organizing a Chapter at Montclair.

The Empire State Society held its twentieth Annual Banquet on Saturday evening November 20, at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, New York City. It was attended by three hundred members of the Society and friends, including ladies. President C. A. Pugsley presided as toastmaster. President General Beardsley presented greetings from the National Society. Addresses were delivered by Rev. S. Edward Young, of Brooklyn, on "The Noblesse Oblige of the Sons of the American Revolution;" President Jacob Gould Schurman of Cornell University, on "Revolutions—Old and New;" William H. McElroy, on "A Hopeful View of Things," and Hon. William H. Wadhams on "Patriotic Service in Political Life."

The Painted Post Chapter, of the Empire State Society, was organized at Corning, N. Y., December 28, 1908, and was incorporated under the laws of the State of New York on February 10, 1909. The Chapter has published an historical sketch on "The Settlement of Steuben County," presented at a banquet of its members on June 24, 1909, by its historian Mr. Uri Mulford.

THE OHIO SOCIETY has obtained from the National Society twelve bronze medals to be awarded for prize essays on the principles of the American Revolution.

The Anthony Wayne Chapter, together with the Chamber of Commerce and the citizens of Toledo, is enthusiastically planning for the Twentieth Annual Congress of the National Society to be held in that city April 30 to May 3, 1910.

THE OREGON SOCIETY announces prizes totaling \$100 to be awarded to the pupils of the public schools of the State of Oregon, for essays on subjects connected with the War for Independence.

One prize of \$10.00, and three of \$5.00 each will be awarded for the first, second, third, and fourth best essays, respectively, written by high school pupils on one of the following subjects: (1) The Influence of Alexander Hamilton upon the Republic; (2) The Turning Point of the Revolutionary War.

The committee has divided up the state, exclusive of the high schools, into three districts comprised of the following counties: No. I—Multnomah County; No. 2—All the counties lying east of the Cascade mountains; No. 3—All the counties lying west of the Cascade mountains;

tains except Multnomah.

One prize of \$10.00 and three of \$5.00 each will be awarded in each district for the first, second, third, and fourth best essays, respectively, written by grade pupils on any one of the following subjects: (1) The Capture and Trial of Major André; (2) The Winter at Valley Forge; (3) The Women and Children of '76—Their Trials and Privations.

The Pennsylvania Society is compiling a list of the places of burial of all who served in the War of the Revolution and are buried in that State, or are ancestors of members of the State Society and buried elsewhere. Printed blanks have been used in gathering the data. These show the name, place and date of birth and of death, and locate the grave whether it be in a city, village, or country graveyard. President Stanton commends this plan to other State Societies. Thomas Stephen Brown, Historian of the Society, 1101 Berger Building, Pittsburg, Pa., will furnish sample copies of the blanks mentioned.

The Society has been active in the distribution of the immigrant leaflets and reports the work interesting and profitable.

The Membership Committee is making a list of men eligible to the Society and the names are divided with discretion among members who are expected to personally see the eligible person, and if the first visitor fails in any case another visitor is tried. This plan of "personal touch" is expected to bring good results.

The Rhode Island Society has been assigned a room in the Esek Hopkins Homestead at Providence. The heirs gave the City of Providence the house and about six acres of land for a public park. The city cares for the house. A suitable tablet has been placed on the homestead. The Society is furnishing the high schools in the State, for the use of classes in history, with an outline map of Rhode Island, about 8 by 10 inches in size, indicating the location of 39 forts, 6 beacons and watch towers, and 14 Coast Guard Stations of the period of the Revolution.
